

Evidence of Social, Educational & Employment Disparities [1]

Poverty
Twice as many Deaf citizens living in poverty as the non-disable population (26.2 % compared to 14.1%)

Highest Educational Attainment
• Half the rate of BA/BS
degrees among the Deaf
community (15.8% compared
to 32.1%)

Employment Rate 20% less employed than non-disabled population (53% compared to 74%)

Imagine if Services Were Available Statewide...... A Case Study of Regional Services currently available

Northwest Human Services' Connection Program <u>currently</u> serves Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing residents in <u>only</u> three counties in Oregon and on a case-by-case basis, providing counseling, case management, advocacy, crisis intervention, and other services. <u>One</u> full-time staff member serves these needs. Current State of the Deaf Community in Oregon

Annual Births & Locations [7]

- 100 infants/year with hearing loss
- over **50%** along the I-5 corridor

K-12 Educational Placement [6] 848 Students who receive Special Education services 86% in Mainstreamed classes with interpreters
