


Six-year Graduation Rate of Entering Freshmen 1997 through 2007 Cohorts (Oregon's Public Universities)

Students Pay More ... as Oregon Invests Less






Student Success Tied Directly to On-Campus Supports



Entering Freshman Retention to Second Year 2003-2013




FG= First Generation

2014: <u>43</u> weeks of work p/year to cover tuition



Oregon Public Higher Education* Percentage Share of State General Fund Appropriations







Cost per degree among lowest at Large Universities






EASTERN OREGON UNIVERSITY

- Support student affordability: mitigate tuition increases, expand outreach, education opportunities for Latino, under-served populations
- Deliver bi-lingual programs in diverse communities in natural resources, allied health, others--aligned to needs of region.
- Invest in student academic and success services to increase graduation rates.
- Increase access through Eagle Cap College Center, High School Initiatives to provide dual-credit courses in rural schools.
- Connect community and regional economic development needs with student and faculty research, engagement in the Center for Rural Studies.

OREGON TECH

- Improve retention and increase degrees of students of color through additional staff and student mentors to provide comprehensive support services.
- Implement Early Intervention Alert program to target students most at risk of dropping out, including adding learning specialists, to lower drop-out rates and increase degree attainment.
- Lower student financial barriers and borrowing impacts by expanding Oregon Tech Pathway to provide supplemental aid to low- and moderate-income students through tuition remissions.




OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY

- Restore "September Scholars" 3-week bridge program for 1,000 at-risk students.
- Invest \$4 million to support underrepresented student retention, particularly from migrant and seasonal farmworker families
- Expand financial aid and staff support to help students navigate admissions, financial aid, registration and schedule planning.
- Expand community college and high school partnerships. Add staff to bolster STEM and other initiatives to encourage disadvantaged student enrollment in college.


PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY

Graduate 500 more students per year and increase the 6-year-graduation rate by 2020.

- Expand highly successful pre-college
 Bridge programs for at-risk highschoolers, with 93% college-going rate.
- Hire 53 additional advising staff and adjust curriculum to be more culturally appropriate and improve retention, graduation rates. PSU currently has only 1 adviser per 600 students.
- Make college more affordable by reducing time-to-degree: Expand the 4year-degree guarantee; award credit for prior learning; offer flexible degrees; improve services for transfer students.

Southern Oregon University





SOUTHERN OREGON UNIVERSITY

- Expand Pirates to Raiders program to at least three additional middle and high schools, to work with students and parents to understand the benefits of a college education, and the preparations necessary to enroll.
- Expand financial aid staff to help 600 additional students.
- Put more resources into Raider Academy.
 The program helps with retention of first-generation, low-income students who are most risk of not completing their degree.




UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

- Expand PathwayOregon to serve an additional 600 students. Program ensures that all high-achieving, lower-income students have tuition and fees fully paid through combination of federal, state and UO funds.
- Establish the \$10,000 Graduation Assistance Grant for 400 lower- to middle-income Oregon students who don't qualify for Pell Grants and have exhausted federal loan eligibility, to improve graduation rates.
- Increase number of tenure-related faculty by 120. Current ratio of students to tenured faculty is 35 to one, far higher than national ratio.

WESTERN OREGON

- Increase fee remission scholarships. Additional money would support undergraduate students with financial need and students in education master's program in high-need areas, such as STEM and English Language Learners.
- Increase student academic support services to retain students most at risk of not completing their degree.
- Expand high school to college transition programs.
