

Investing in preschool

and changing lives

High-quality preschool works. It closes the opportunity gap and gets children ready for kindergarten and on track for 3rd grade success. The Children's Institute and Ready for School campaign are advocating for a \$30 million investment during the 2015-17 biennium to make high-quality preschool available to more children from low-income families – to prevent the achievement gap before it begins.

Oregon is failing its youngest children

- Oregon is in the bottom quarter of all states nationally for access to preschool for 4-year-olds, enrolling only 10 percent.
- The Oregon Head Start Pre-K program has funding to serve only about 55 percent of eligible children.
- Seventy-two percent of 3- and 4-year-olds from lowincome Oregon families – about 32,000 children – don't have access to high-quality preschool.

We can improve Oregon preschool, and put children on track for success

This modest investment (in HB 5016), along with our proposed policy legislation (HB 3380), would:

- begin building a preschool system that aligns with Head Start but also allows for a mix of other providers;
- set quality standards, while ensuring preschool services are connected with Oregon's K-12 system;
- serve an additional 1,500 Oregon children each year, and be open to children from families who aren't eligible for Head Start services but also can't afford private preschool.

Why invest?

A child's first eight years are critical in laying the foundation for his or her future success. And there is no greater return on investment in education than early learning.

- Research shows preschool provides benefits to society of roughly \$8.60 for ever \$1 spent.
- Low-income children who attended high-quality preschool programs are 40 percent less likely to need special education services or be held back a grade, 30 percent more likely to finish high school and twice as likely to attend college.
