YOUTH ARE HOMELESS OR RUNAWAY IN THE UNITED STATES.

Homeless youth are individuals under the age of eighteen who lack parental, foster, or institutional care. These young people are sometimes referred to as "unaccompanied" youth.



Last year, the **Oregon Alliance of Children's Programs** aggregated their data to measure positive outcomes for runaway and homeless youth.


OUTREACH



STREET OUTREACH AND DAY SHELTER SERVICES FOCUS ON HARM REDUCTION.

Of 28,580 individuals contacted, 62% accessed: food, shelter, educational, job and life skills support.

SHELTER



SHELTER PROVIDES 24/7 BASIC CARE AND OVERNIGHT STAYS.


76% exited to a safe home

61% reunited with family

43% accessed behavioral health services

78% connected to educational services

TRANSITIONAL LIVING



TRANSITIONAL LIVING SUPPORTS YOUTH AS THEY TRANSITION TO ADULTHOOD THROUGH HOUSING AND SKILL-BUILDING.

87% connected to a supportive adult 83% accessed behavioral health services 74% attended school, graduated, or obtained GED at exit

Running away from home dramatically increases the risk of youth victimization – physical and/or sexual – by both friends and strangers. They are at a much greater risk of being a part of Lacking the skills, education, and resources to find legitimate employment, runaway and homeless youth become easy prey for pimps and drug dealers, show higher rates of gang involvement, have higher rates for attempted suicide, and have higher rates of mortality than their counterparts in the general population.
