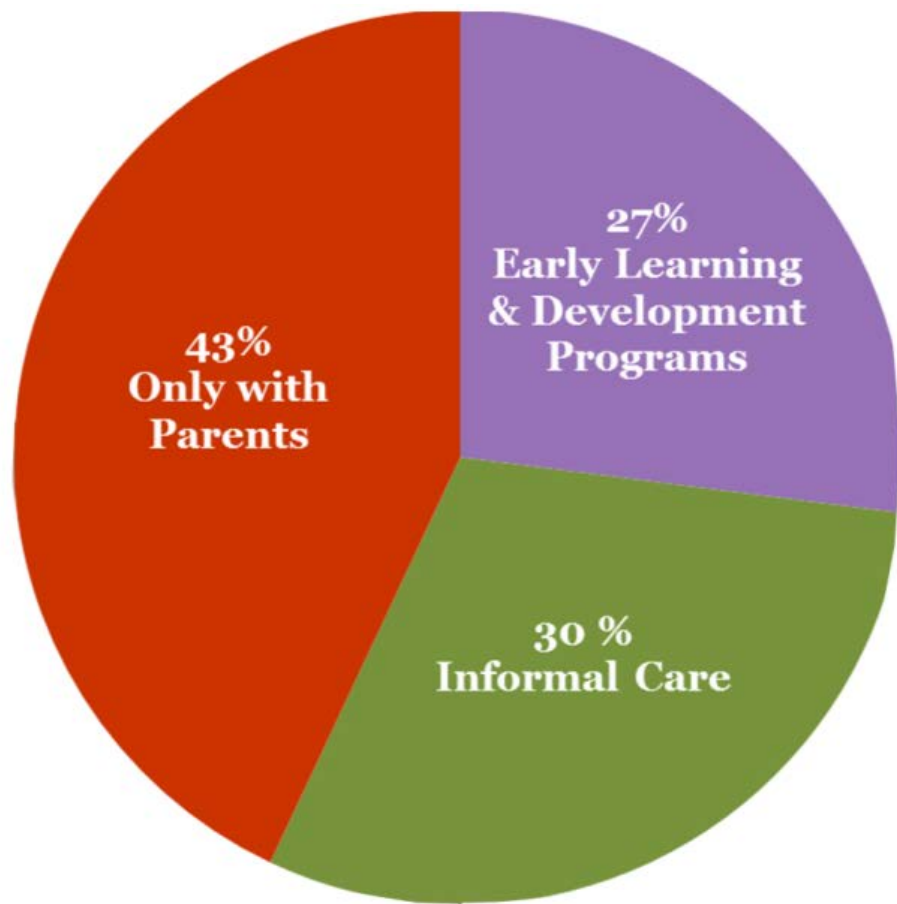

Majority of Children Under Age Five Experience Out of Home Care

Early Learning and Development Programs – includes licensed center and family child care, Head Start, Oregon Pre-K, paid care in nonrelative’s home, and group activities

Informal Care – Care in a child’s home by a relative or nonrelative, care in a relative’s home, and unpaid care in nonrelative’s home

Only with Parents – includes children whose parents reported “no child care or educational program, paid or unpaid, for this child”

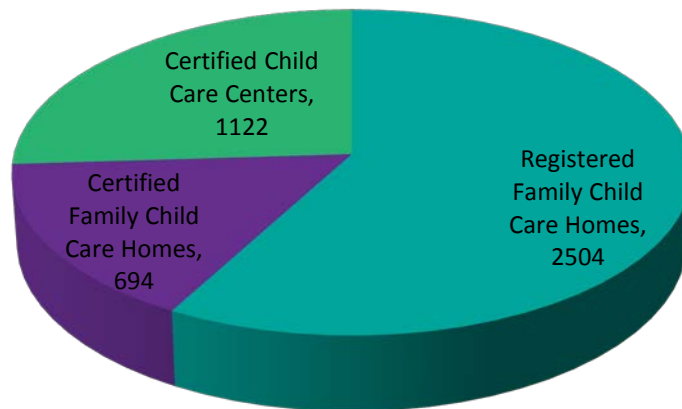
Consumer Protection for Parents

 - Child care rule revisions
 - Complaints and public inquiries

Licensed Child Care in Oregon

8



- Certified Child Care Center
- Certified Family Child Care Home
 - Up to sixteen children in providers own home
- Registered Family Child Care Home
 - Up to ten children in providers own home

There are approximately 4,320 licensed child care facilities in Oregon.

License Exempt Child Care

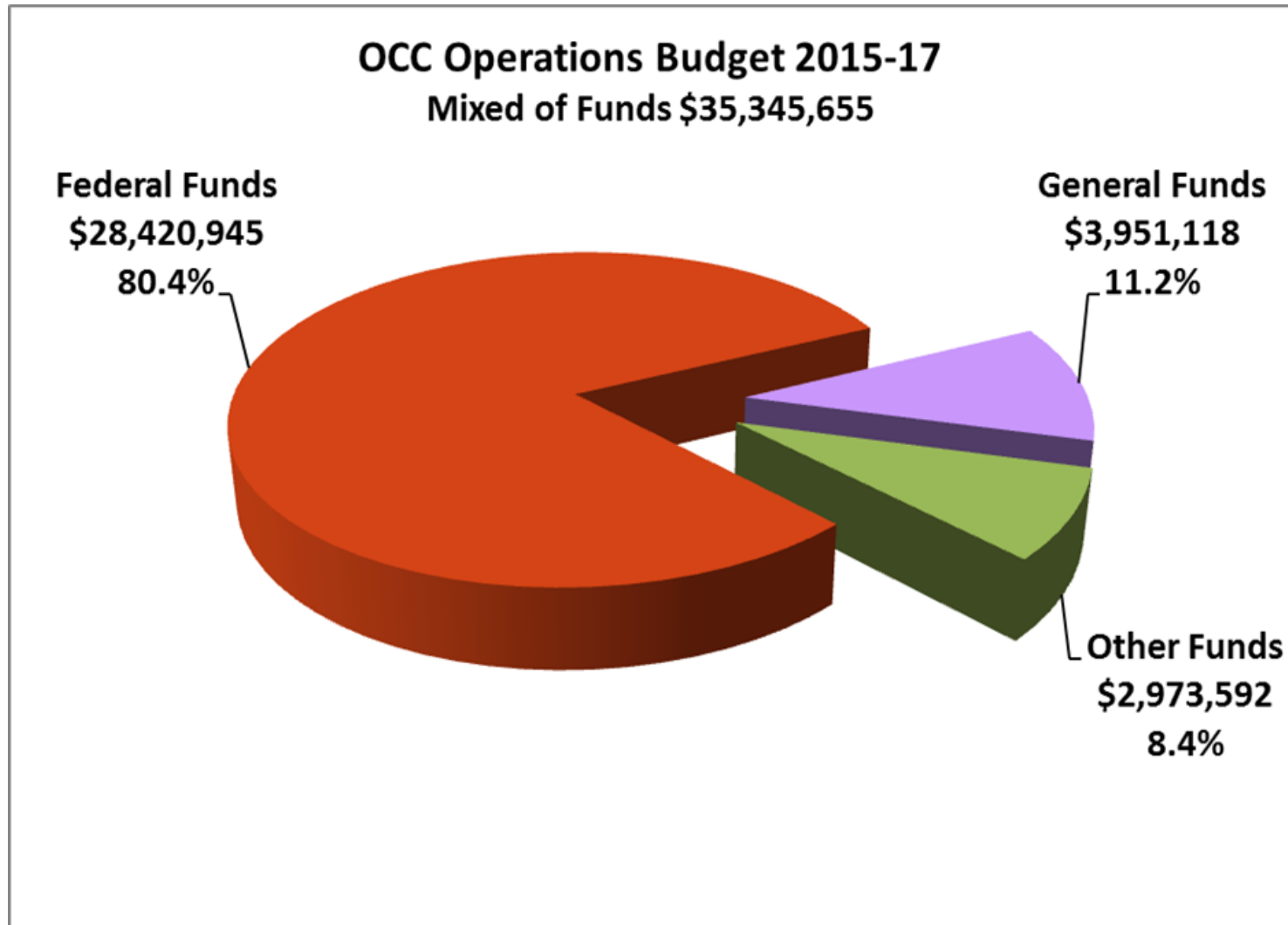
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Examples:

- Family child care providers serving three or fewer children
- Preschools serving three- and four-year olds for fewer than four hours per day
- Child care facilities operated by a government agency

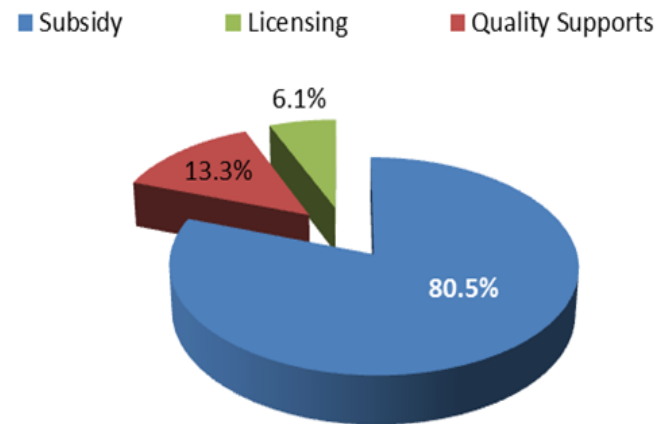


Child Care and Development Fund

- Provide financial assistance for child care to low-income families so they can work.
- Provide funding to improve the quality of child care and increase the supply and availability of high quality care.

CCDF Allocations 2013-15

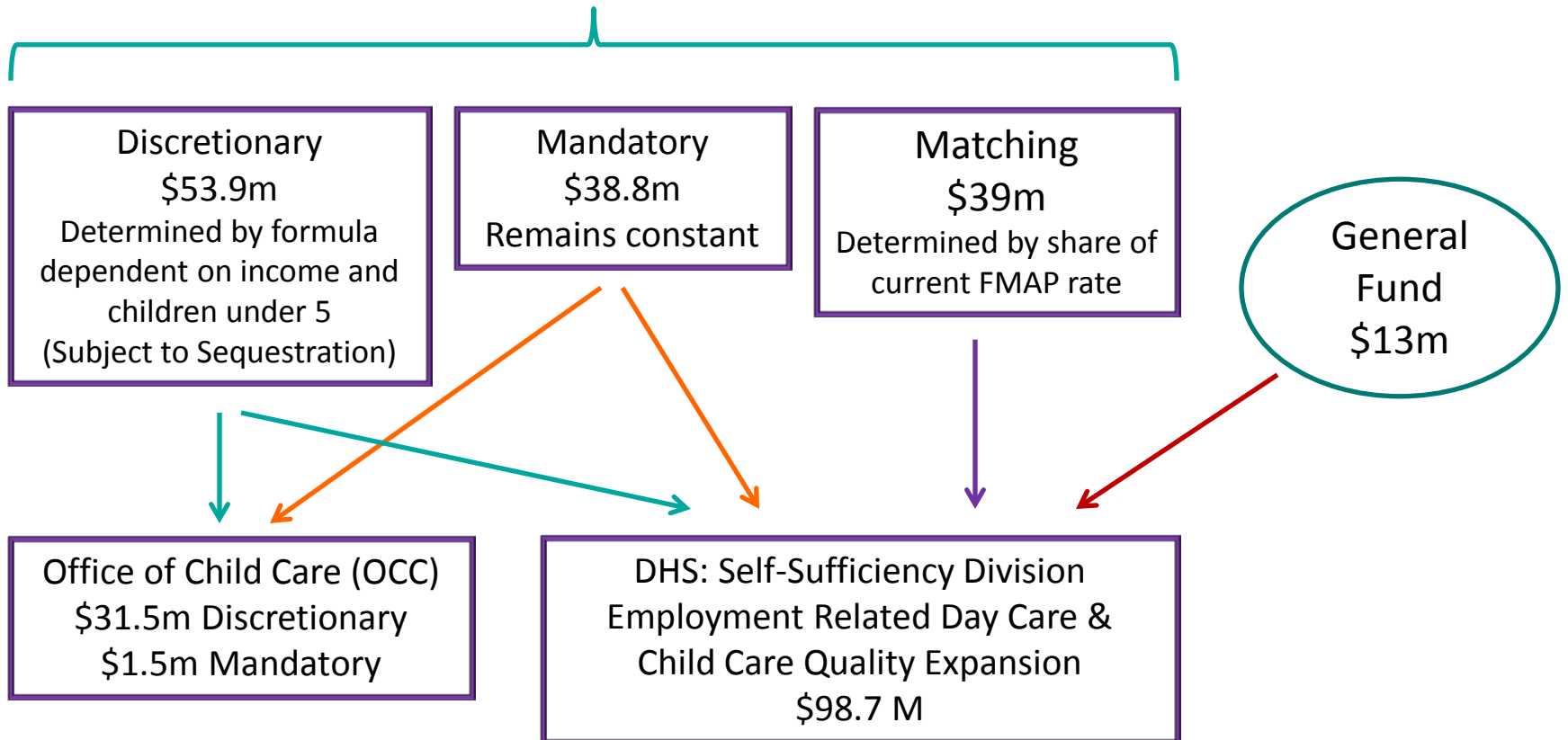


Total CCDF 2013-15: \$131.7 million

Changes to CCDF Rules

13

- ❑ New monitoring & safety requirements
 - ❑ On-site monitoring of license exempt providers
 - ❑ Compliance by 11/19/2016
 - ❑ Fingerprinting and background checks
 - ❑ Compliance by 9/30/2017
- ❑ Enhanced requirements for parent and public access to complaints and compliance information
 - ❑ Compliance by the earlier of a) 11/19/2017 or b) 1 year after monitoring in place
- ❑ New pre-service & on-going training requirement

New Monitoring Requirement

14

- On-site health and safety monitoring of all providers receiving ERDC payments

- Already covered for licensed providers

- Between 3,000 and 4,600 additional monitoring visits that the OCC will need to conduct each year.
 - 2015-17: \$1,689,696
 - 2017-19: \$4,491,092

New Fingerprint & Background Check Requirements

15

- New fingerprinting requirements
 - Applies to all ERDC providers and all licensed child care

- New background check requirement
 - More intensive FBI background check

- Combined Cost
 - 2015-17: \$77,235
 - 2017-19: \$1,367,330

New Training Requirements

16

- Pre-service Training – License Exempt
 - Current - 2 hour online Health & Safety
 - New - First Aid, CPR, Child Abuse, Health & Safety, Orientation, Emergency & Disaster Prep

- On-going Training – License Exempt
 - Current – None required
 - Federal rules still being clarified

- Combined Cost
 - 15-17: \$702,000
 - 17-19: \$1,872,000

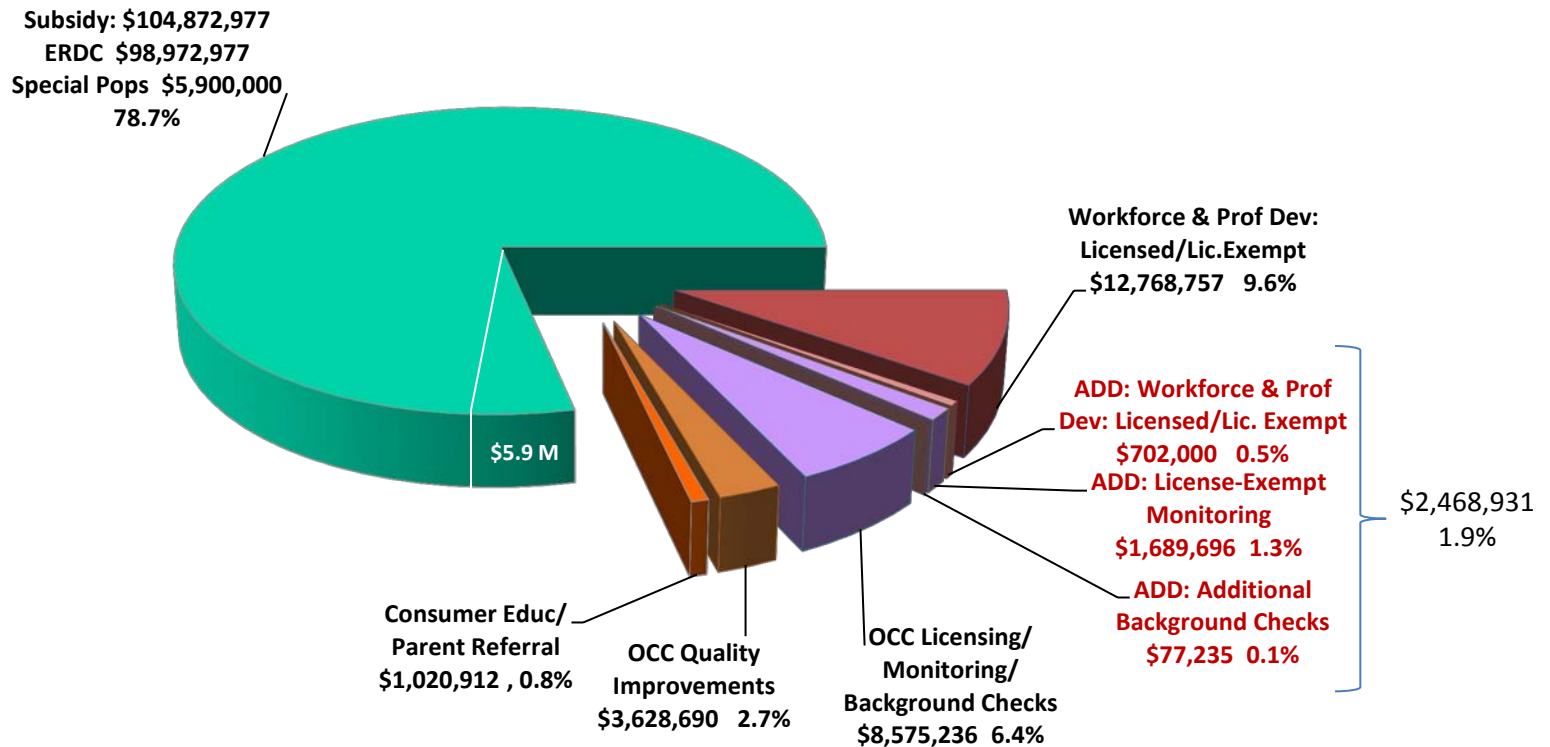

CCDF Budget 2015-17

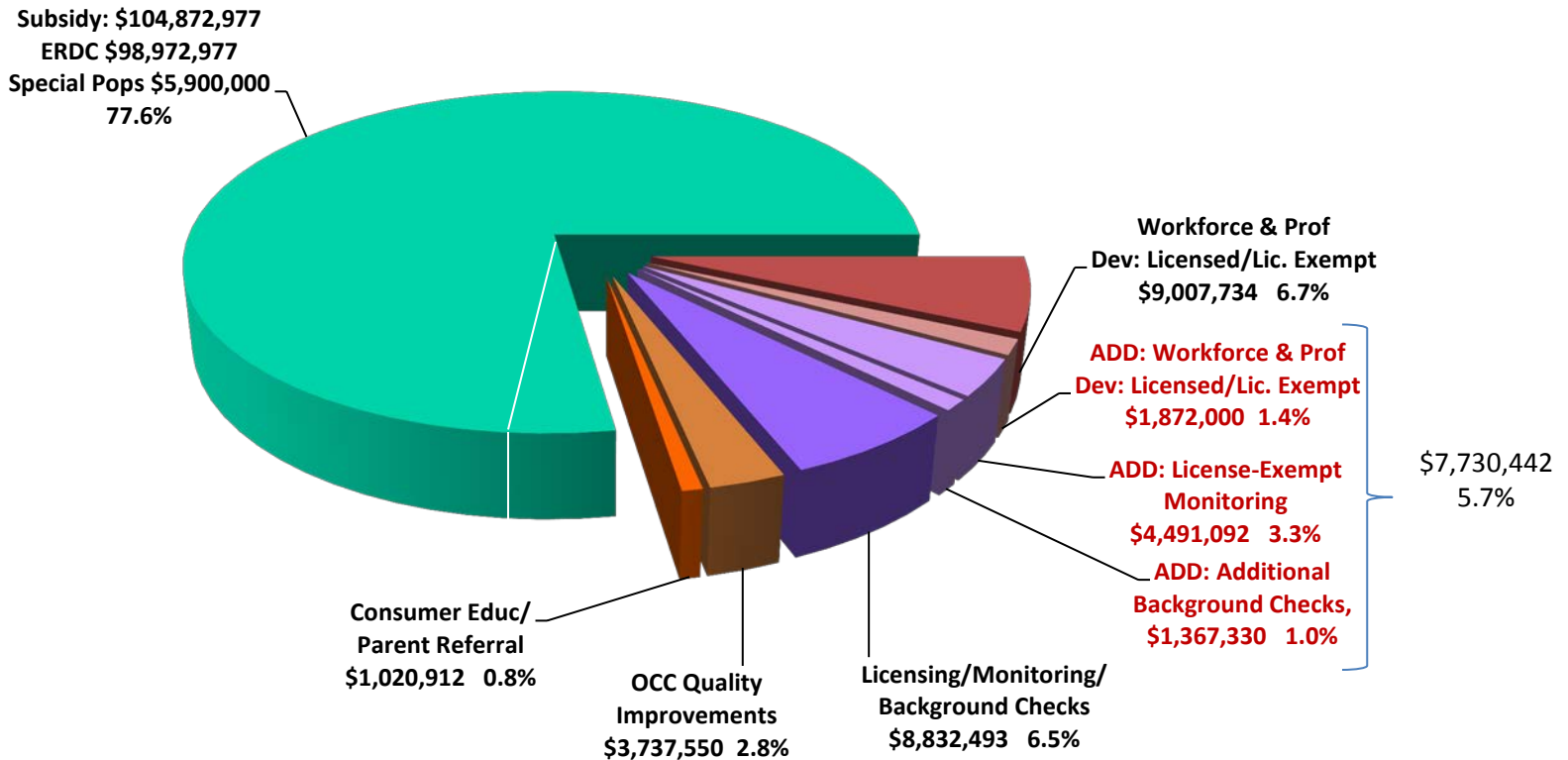
CCDF Only Budget 2015-17

Cost of new regulations absorbed by quality and professional development

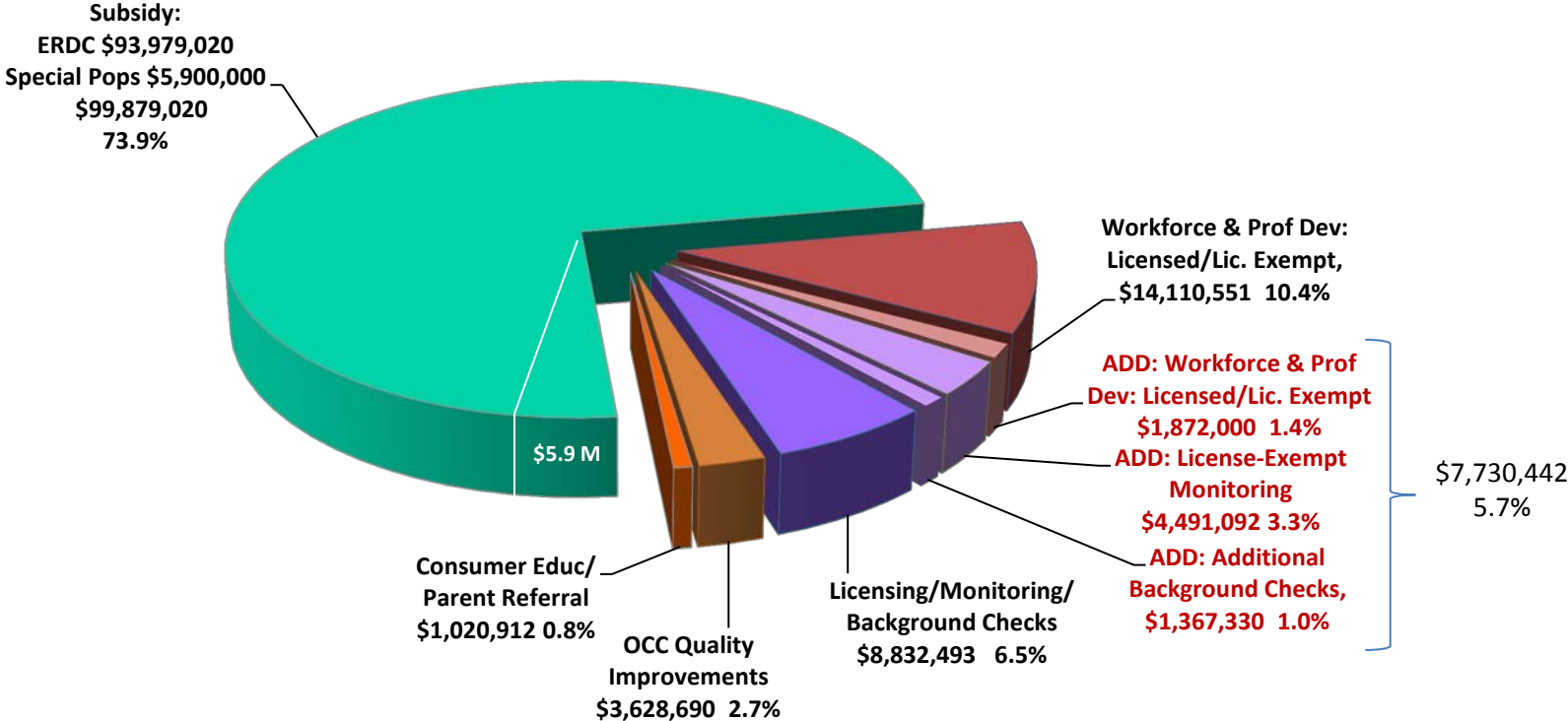
**CCDF Only 2017-19

Oregon's Child Care Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS)

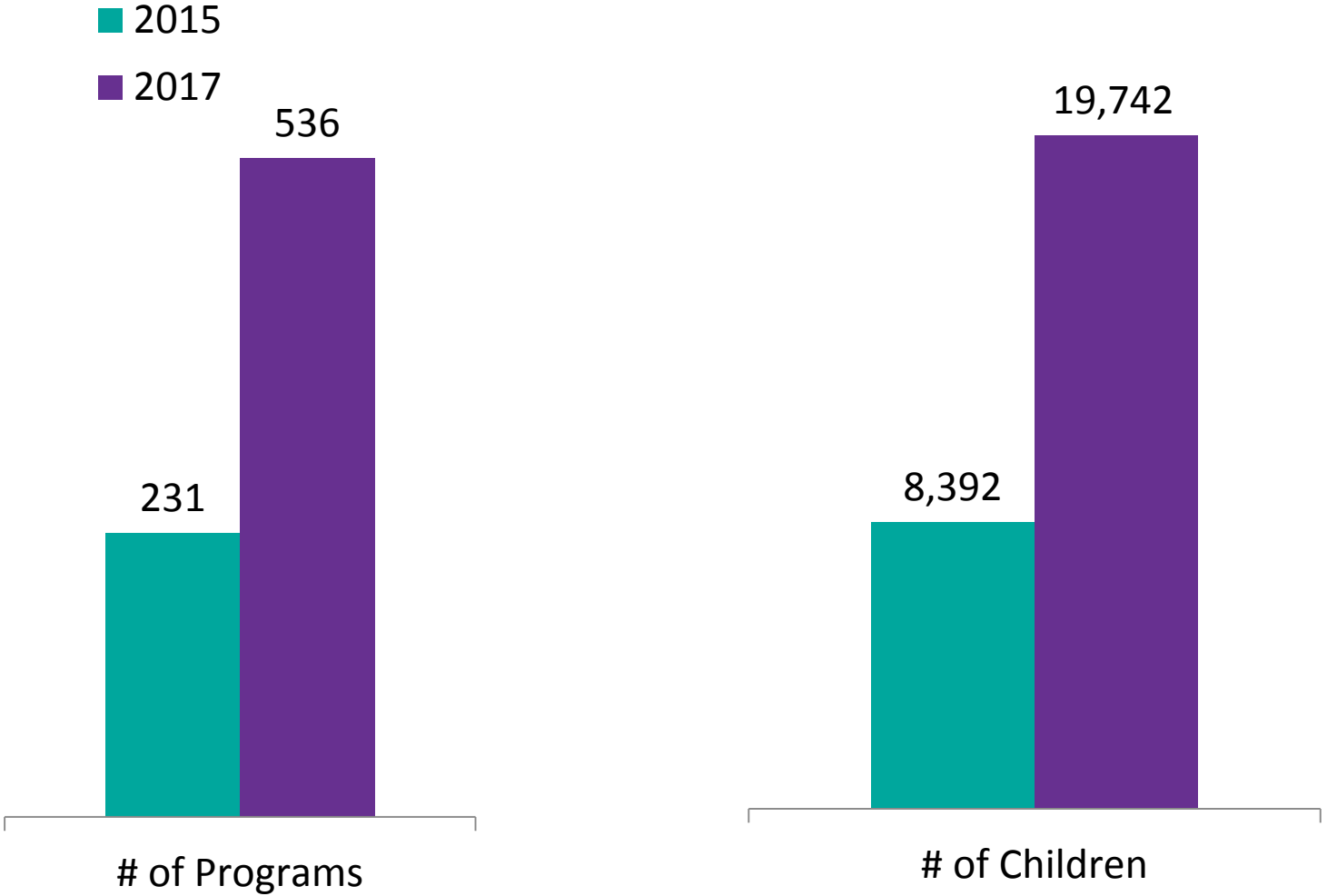
21

- Early Learning Challenge Grant focused on system building
 - Quality Rating and Improvement System
 - Integration of QRIS and early childhood professional development system
 - Launch of Early Learning Hubs

- Leveraging existing resources & staff
 - Increased focus on coaching and supports for quality
 - Role of Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies
 - Child care licensing staff

- Leveraging new opportunities
 - HB 2015 – ERDC policy reform
 - HB 3380 – Mixed-delivery Preschool

Sustaining Race to the Top

27

- Convert seven Limited Duration positions to permanent:
 - Office Manager/Executive Assistant
 - Director of Policy & Programs
 - Fiscal Policy Analyst
 - Communications Director
 - Age 3 to Grade 3 Alignment Specialist
 - Hub Manager
 - QRIS Specialist

Early Learning Information System (ELIS)

Early Learning Race to the Top Grant – ELD received a federal Race to the Top Grant in 2012. One of the outcomes of this grant was to create a Quality Rating Improvement System (QRIS) for the state of Oregon.

ELIS will expand the QRIS system and allow ELD to:

- Create a facility level data system eliminating paper based collection systems
- Integrate the QRIS with licensing information
- Improve early learning child care facility data to easily provide parents with quality child care facility information

Early Learning Information System (ELIS)

The goal of ELIS is to:

- Deliver a comprehensive web based tool that will manage and present child care facility information for regulatory and consumer purposes
- Manage data for a comprehensive background check process that helps ensure the safety of children in child care facilities
- Track and report QRIS facility data as a key component to improving kindergarten readiness

Next Steps:

- Working with State CIO's Office develop business case(May 2015)
- Develop RFP (Summer 2015)
- Vendor selection (Early fall 2015)
- ELIS system fully implemented by December 31, 2016
