1971 – The Oregon Need Grant







OREGON LEGISLATURE - 1971

It is the intention of the <u>Legislative Assembly</u> to establish two types of student aid programs for those enrolled in community colleges and institutions of higher education.

The <u>need grant</u> program shall be based on the student's financial situation.

The **scholastic grant** program will be based on the student's financial need and his academic aptitude and achievement.





1999 – COMMISS The Oregon Opportunity Grant



BASIC ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Be an <u>Oregon resident</u> and a <u>U.S. citizen</u> or eligible noncitizen. (Members of Native American tribes with traditional ties to Oregon may be considered Oregon residents.)

Be an <u>undergraduate</u> student with no prior baccalaureate degrees.

Be enrolled <u>at least half time</u> (i.e., at least 6 credit-hours) at a participating <u>Oregon-based</u> postsecondary institution (community colleges; public universities, including Oregon Health Sciences University; 4-year private nonprofit universities).





BASIC ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS - CONT.

Have demonstrated <u>financial need</u>, based on financial resources of the student and student's family, if applicable, as reported on the FAFSA.

Have <u>no defaults</u> on federal student loans and owe no refunds on federal student grants.

Meet all federal <u>Title IV</u> eligibility requirements regarding Selective Service registration and drug-selling convictions.





OTHER BASICS

The grant is available for <u>up to 4 years</u> (12 quarters or 8 semesters) at full-time, full-year enrollment.

Awards are prorated for half-time or partial-year enrollment.

Students must maintain <u>satisfactory academic progress</u>, as defined by the school attended.

Students must <u>reapply annually</u> by filing a Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

Students who are enrolled in courses leading to degrees in <u>theology</u>, divinity, or religious education are <u>not eligible</u>.

In years with limited funding, only students who are enrolled at least <u>half time</u> <u>fall term</u> retain eligibility for the grant.










OPPORTUNITY GRANT: FUNDING DOES NOT MATCH ELIGIBILITY

OOG ELIGIBLE STUDENTS AND RECIPIENTS 2007-08 THROUGH 2013-14





2015 – Proposed Opportunity Grant Redesign



WORK GROUP ANALYSIS

Work group closely reconsidered the program elements of the Opportunity Grant in light of:

- Longstanding access vision for the program
- 40-40-20 goals and completion agenda of the State
- Promoting the ability of underserved students to access the grant
- Rewarding success and completion
- State and institutional aid relationship
- Underfunded Shared Responsibility Model
- Concern for integrity of the current model given limited funding
- Lack of predictability for students in current OOG methodology, (i.e. first-come first-served)





WORK GROUP RECOMMENDATIONS

Increase predictability
of the Grant to support
persistence and
completion.

Strategically target the Grant to focus on improving access and completion for the most financially needy students.





INCREASED PREDICTABILITY

Establish a rolling application deadline ending first-come, first-served eligibility.

Provide a **two-year guarantee** for eligible students with a "meaningful" grant amount that varies based on the **circumstances of the student** and the amount of aid needed to influence the student's ability to pursue education beyond the secondary level.

Funding beyond the first year would be determined based on the student meeting progress and achievement benchmarks.





TARGETED USES

Eligibility will continue to be based on each student's <u>financial need</u> and demographic data as reported in the FAFSA.

The \$70,000 income cap will be amended and a <u>new index</u> set for need eligibility.

When funding levels are insufficient, the grant will be awarded to students with **highest need first**, with special focus to underrepresented racial and ethnic groups.


Underserved student status will be based on the definitions in the OEIB **Equity Lens**.

The other initial eligibility criteria remain the same.






Number of Eligible Applicants by Expected Family Contribution




Oregon Opportunity Grants Average Grant Dollars Disbursed per Recipient








Oregon Opportunity Grant Number of Recipients by Sector

DESIGN TEAM RECOMMENDATIONS

Students with greatest <u>financial need</u> (i.e. Expected Family Contribution of \$0) will receive first priority for grant awards.

Guaranteed <u>renewal</u> of grant in second year for students who continue to meet eligibility requirements.

Students in **years three and four** may still receive the Grant, although higher academic standards may be established.

If <u>additional funds</u> are available after all \$0 EFC students are served, additional students will be awarded grants based on their Expected Family Contribution.

Eliminates early deadline and "first-come, first-served."





BUDGET AND AWARD IMPLICATIONS

Governor's Recommended Budget is \$143,263,216, which is an increase of 22% above the Current Service Level of \$117,328,768.

At the current maximum grant level of \$2,100 per full-time student per year, the actual average grant award is \$1,680.


Using the <u>current methodology</u> and this funding level, we estimate we could serve about 85,280 students over the biennium (42,640/year). Current biennium served about 67,800 (33,900/year).

Under the **proposed methodology** and this funding level, we estimate we could serve about 90,720 students over the biennium (45,360/year) with a maximum grant level of \$2,100 per full-time student per year and an actual average grant award of \$1,579.






Grant Recipients by Sector - Current and Proposed Methodology

2015 – Fifteen to Finish Proposal



FIFTEEN TO FINISH

Federal definition of "Full-time Student" is 12 credit hours per term or semester.

A student attending four years of university at the Federal full-time rate will accumulate 144 quarter hours or 96 semester hours.

The Opportunity Grant is only available for four years of full-time, full-year study.

Most Bachelor degree programs require at least 180 quarter hours or 120 semester hours to graduate.

To graduate in four years, a student would need to average 15 credits per quarter or semester.

There are additional costs to increasing from 12 to 15 hours, in tuition, time, and workload.





FIFTEEN TO FINISH GOAL

The Higher Education Coordinating Commission and the Executive Director of OSAC will develop a pilot <u>supplemental grant</u> that will recognize and incentivize students who consistently complete an average of 15 credit hours per quarter/semester.

This supplemental grant will recognize and support the extra effort and costs necessary to support this level of coursework.

The standard requirements and qualifications for the Oregon Opportunity Grant will not be affected.

Students attending at the full-time or half-time standards for the Opportunity Grant will not be affected.
