My desire is to instill a greater sense of need and urgency as it relates to the above mentioned legislation.

Second, although I am a small business owner in the city of Salem currently, I do possess some first-hand knowledge and experience as it relates to ATV's and their recreational use. Back in 2004, my wife Brenda and I helped some friends for a summer who then owned Spinreel Dune Buggy Rental located off Hwy 101 on Spinreel Rd. just north of Coos Bay, OR. Over the course of six months we were there, I became very familiar with the diverse terrain of the Oregon National Dune and Recreation Area. Not only did I supply assistance to the riders who rented from us, but would also assist private riders as well. ATV use and recreation can be fun for the whole family, but it can also be extremely dangerous. As you know, the ONDRA is quite large and the need to help individuals who were lost or broke down would occur on a daily basis.

Third, I also witnessed and was contacted by riders who had friends, family, or loved ones involved in ATV accidents. While the majority of these were minor in nature, there was a significant number that would require emergency services and EMT to be present to administer first-aid to the individuals. I remember the EMT's appreciation as we would meet them at the State Park across from Spinreel to guide them over and through the maze of dunes to the victims in need of medical assistance. However, I also remember their frustration as they would not always be able to reach the victims in their emergency vehicles because emergency vans and ambulances are not equipped to be driven in most places of the ONDRA.

Fourth and finally, I want to voice my sincere support for HB 3455 and its' ability to provide financial support to emergency services as well as representation on the ATV Advisory Committee. In my opinion, placing a fire district and EMS representative onto the ATV Advisory board is absolutely necessary. I believe adequate terrain transportation is a NECESSITY, when the welfare of the recipient is mandatorily predicated by time lost if the emergency services and EMT's do not have the ability to reach the victims quickly. PASS this legislation and make sure emergency services have the equipment it needs to provide adequate services!

At my earliest recollection, when I heard a siren I thought there was a 'fire' and that firefighters were on their way to extinguish it, but today's expectations are completely different and the jobs being performed have changed to meet the demands of the public. We now respond to 75%-80% medical related emergencies and I do not see that trend changing.

My fire district covers 135 square miles in Northeast Oregon and that expands even more when figuring in special rescue operations that we also provide. ATV use is growing in popularity and I support getting our youth away from a television and pursuing more outdoor activity. The ATV recreational area in our county is growing in popularity and so are the potential demands for services. We provide EMS and Rope Rescue services in conjunction with our local Search and Rescue agency to the surrounding mountains and recreational use areas and have found it at times difficult to reach patients in our everyday Fire/EMS trucks. As budgets shrink and demands for services increase, we are always seeking new avenues to of obtaining needed equipment as are many other fire districts.

Dear Sir or Madam,

The fire service has experienced many changes throughout the years. The biggest changes are the services that fire agencies provide and how we provide those services. Traditionally firefighters were just that, firefighters; the folks who showed up to put the fire out. Today fire agencies not only respond to fires, but medical emergencies and technical calls for service. Departments that provide medical response find themselves allocating well over 80% of their time to EMS responses and providing basic and advanced life support measures.

I represent a fire district of 30 square miles on the Oregon coast. North Bay Fire responds to ATV accidents in and around the Dunes NRA, as well as public and private lands. We also provide mutual aid to the Hauser Fire District. Hauser provides a sand response and patient transport to north Coos County. Funding to Staff and equip this type of a response can be challenging, as most departments are volunteer and are under-funded. Departments are not only providing emergency medical services, but face the challenges and logistics that go along with providing service. It is not uncommon to have our recreating population grow by the thousands depending on weather and the time of year. The impact is felt by all agencies that respond.

The addition of fire and EMS representation on the ATV Allocation Board appear to be the two remaining pieces that have been left out of the puzzle. Fire and EMS representation could potentially benefit the patients we treat, who in most cases require well trained responders, an urgent response, specialized equipment, rapid treatment and transport to the hospital. All of the aforementioned are performed by the fire and EMS personnel who respond.

Thank you in advance for your consideration of LC 3538, which would include Fire and EMS representation on the ATV Allocation Board.
