History & Structure of OCE

- Established December, 1999 through the passage of Ballot Measure 68.
- Semi-independent agency.
- Revenue is generated through sale of products and services, no general fund support, and separate from Department of Corrections.
- Administrator serves at the pleasure of the Director of the Department of Corrections.

The mission of Oregon Corrections Enterprises, in partnership with the Department of Corrections, is to promote public safety by providing inmate work and training opportunities in a self-sustaining organization.

Constraints

Supervision of inmate electricians

- ORS 421.423 Use of inmate labor for electrical or plumbing work. An inmate in the custody of the Department of Corrections may not perform electrical or plumbing work unless under the direct supervision of a regular status employee of the department who is a licensed electrician or plumber.
- OCE will pursue legislation to allow OCE employees to supervise inmate electricians.
