Local Government Mandate:

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Analysis:

HB 2459, with the -1 amendment, is the fee bill for the Oregon Marine Board and would increase statutory fees to generate revenue sufficient to maintain Boating Safety and Boating Facility programs. These fee increases are anticipated to generate \$4.7 million Other Fund revenues and \$500,000 Federal Funds to the facility investment program.

The bill amends the following fee amounts as follows:

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Increases fees related to registering and titling of boats, floating homes and boathouses.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Review of agency operations and responsibilities
- Significant time since many fees have been increased
- Boat ramps and other infrastructure needs
- On-water law enforcement

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:

Changes the registration fees for boats greater than 12 fee from \$5/foot in the original bill to \$4.50/foot.

BACKGROUND:

The Oregon State Marine Board is the state's regulatory agency for recreational boating. The Board provides education, enforcement, access and environmental stewardship to help make boating a safe and enjoyable experience. The Board receives approximately 66 percent of its funding from boat registration fees, boat titles and the motorboat fuel tax; many of these revenue sources have remained unchanged since 2003, while revenues from the motorboat fuel tax has decreased by 19 percent in that same time. As a result, the Board's revenues have been unable to keep pace with expenditures since 2009.
