**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:** Requires students seven years of age or younger beginning educational program with education provider for first time submit certification that student has received dental screening within previous 12 months. Requires certification be provided within 120 days of date student begins educational program. Specifies allowable exceptions to submitting certification. Requires education providers provide to parents or guardians specified information related to dental care. Directs State Board of Education, in consultation with Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and Oregon Board of Dentistry, to adopt by rule standards for implementation. Establish specified reporting requirements for school districts and Oregon Department of Education (ODE). Defines “dental screening” and other terms. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

**ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

- Importance of oral hygiene and care for both dental and overall health
- Need to shift to screening and preventative care, rather than treatment
- Concern regarding additional time and resources needed for school nurses to potentially conduct screenings
- Availability of free and low-cost dental services through non-profits in Oregon
- Measure as modeled after other required screenings in Oregon (e.g. vision)
- Data resulting from measure will help to assess problems and priorities

**EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:**

-6 amendments (proposed) clarify requirements for who may conduct dental screening. Require dental director establish guidelines for training of persons conducting screening. Clarify that certification may be provided by person who conducts dental screening at location not associated with education provider or who conducts regular dental screenings of student. Require dental director appointed by OHA develop standardized information for distribution by education providers. Clarify reporting timelines and requirements. Add that ODE submit summary of reports to dental director as well as interim legislative committees on education.

-7 amendments (proposed) propose same revisions as -6 amendments, but do not explicitly state that “a school nurse” may conduct dental screening.

**BACKGROUND:** Dental disease is one of Oregon’s most pressing public health problems. A recent study notes, “the majority of Oregonians — poor or rich, female or male, old or young, whatever their race or ethnicity — suffer from oral disease.” The causes of this epidemic include inadequate education and prevention, lack of supplies and a shortage of providers serving low-income people. Left untreated, this preventable disease can be devastating to lifelong health, educational success, productivity and self-image. It’s also been linked with serious illnesses like diabetes and heart disease.

House Bill 2972-A requires that each education provider require a student who is seven years of age or younger and who is beginning an educational program with the education provider for the first time to submit certification that the student received a dental screening within the previous 12 months.
