**Subject:** HB 2642 Relating to non-ablative procedures

**Work Session Recommendation** 

House Bill 2642 establishes the nine-member Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the Health Licensing Office (HLO) in the Oregon Health Authority (OHA). The bill authorizes the Health Licensing Office to certify the practice of advanced non-ablative esthetics. Certification must be renewed biennially.

The measure previously had hearings in the House Committee on Health Care on 2/18/2015, and 3/30/2015.

The – A8 amendment, the original staff measure summary, and the fiscal impact statements are attached to this memo, and available on the Oregon Legislative Information System (OLIS).

## The -A8 amendment

The -A8 amendment

- Adds to the requirement that a certificate holder must enter into an agreement with a health care professional who has schedule III, IV or V prescriptive authority the requirement that a certificate holder must enter into an agreement with a licensed physician or a licensed nurse practitioner.
- Adds \$386,294 Other Funds limitation to the Oregon Health Authority for the purposes of certifying the practice of advanced non-ablative esthetics.
- Adds \$118,249 Other Funds limitation to the Higher Education Coordinating Council for the Private Career Schools to work with organizations interested in teaching students or instructors pursuing an education to become an advanced esthetician.

## **Fiscal Impact**

The bill allows the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians to be self-funded via fees charged to applicants and certificate holders for applications, new and annual renewal certifications, examinations, and other activities.

The Private Career Schools under the Higher Education Coordinating Council will work with OHA and organizations interested in teaching students or instructors pursuing an education to become a certified advanced esthetician. HECC also has the authority to establish a fee to recover some of the costs associated with new program review and approval.

#### **Local Government Mandate:**

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

## Analysis:

House Bill 2642 establishes the nine-member Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the Health Licensing Office (HLO) in the Oregon Health Authority (OHA). The bill authorizes the Health Licensing Office to certify the practice of advanced non-ablative esthetics. Certification must be renewed biennially. The bill contains an emergency clause and is effective on passage. The Health Licensing Office is authorized to take action before the July 1, 2016 operative date. The bill allows HLO to begin certifying individuals as of July 1, 2016, and includes a grandfathering period of 18 months.

Page 1 of 2 HB 2642 - A8

The – A8 amendment allocates \$386,294 Other Funds to the Oregon Health Authority, and \$118,249 Other Funds to the Higher Education Coordinating Council. The – A8 adds to the requirement that a certificate holder must enter into an agreement with a health care professional who has schedule III, IV or V prescriptive authority the requirement that a certificate holder must enter into an agreement with a licensed physician or a licensed nurse practitioner.

## Health Licensing Office, Oregon Health Authority

<sup>1</sup> The Health Licensing Office estimates the fiscal impact of this bill to be \$386,294 Other Funds; 2 positions; and 1.28 FTE for the twelve months of the 2015-17 biennium. This amount includes startup costs as well as Personal Services, and related Services & Supplies for two Public Service Representative positions. Because HLO is at operational capacity, to implement this new board and handle the regulation of a new category of estheticians, HLO will need additional staffing to carry out the provisions of this bill.

<sup>2</sup>The bill allows the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians to be self-funded via fees charged to applicants and certificate holders for applications, new and annual renewal certifications, examinations, and other activities. Based on the assumption provided by bill proponents that approximately 25% of the current Cosmetology Esthetician certificate holders (14,246 in February 2015) will seek to become a Certified Advanced Esthetician within the first year of operations, HLO estimates certifying 3,562 Certified Advanced Estheticians by end of the 2015-17 biennium. Based on this volume, HLO anticipates establishing the following fees:

- (1) Application New Certificate = \$100;
- (2) Certificate New = \$200;
- (3) Certificate Renewal = \$200;
- (4) Examinations = \$35.

## Higher Education Coordinating Council (HECC)

<sup>3</sup>The Higher Education Coordinating Council estimated the fiscal impact of this bill to the Private Career Schools to be \$118,249 Other Funds and 0.50 FTE per biennium. This amount reflects the Personal Services and related Services & Supplies for one part-time Education Specialist to oversee the licensing of education programs for this new field. The position will work with OHA and organizations interested in teaching students or instructors pursuing an education to become a certified advanced esthetician. If SB 218 passes, HECC would have the authority to establish a fee of up to \$1,000 for new program approval to recover some of the costs associated with new program review and approval.

## WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Creates a nine-member Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the Health Licensing Office. Specifies members appointed by the Governor. Defines "nonablative" to mean an action that does not result in the wounding of skin. Requires annual renewal of certified advanced esthetician (CAE) certificate. Clarifies the agreement between the CAE and health care professional. Requires disclosure of the existence of professional liability insurance. Directs the Board to adopt rules to conduct business, to establish sanitation and safety requirements and to establish a professional code of conduct. Establishes standards and requires esthetician to be certified with the Board to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures. July 1, 2016 is the operative date. Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

In Oregon, cosmetologists (individuals that work on hair cut/color, waxing, facial and other body surface-level services) are regulated by the Oregon Board of Cosmetology, located in the Health Licensing Office (HLO). Cosmetologists are required to complete specific education, training and professional development to obtain licensure. Surface-level or chemical services (e.g. laser hair removal and chemical peels) are not subject to licensure. Licensed cosmetologists receive training to offer and perform nonablative laser services.

Concerns have been raised about the need for regulation and proper training for laser estheticians to ensure consumer safety and professionalism for the profession. Currently, Arizona and Washington have licensing/certification programs.

House Bill 2642-A establishes a nine-member Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the HLO, Oregon Health Authority. The measure authorizes HLO to certify the practice of advanced nonablative esthetics.

#### **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes Board of Certified [*Laser*] **Advanced** Estheticians within Health Licensing Office. Defines "advanced nonablative esthetics procedure." Requires esthetician to be certified with board to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures.

Becomes operative [January] July 1, 2016.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

- 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
  - SECTION 1. As used in sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act:
  - (1) "Advanced nonablative esthetics procedure" means a procedure that uses a laser or other device registered with the United States Food and Drug Administration for nonablative procedures performed on the skin or hair, including, but not limited to, procedures performed in conjunction with one of the following modalities:
  - (a) Skin rejuvenation;
- 11 **(b) Photo rejuvenation;**
- 12 (c) Body contouring:

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- 13 (d) Dyschromia reduction;
- 14 (e) Cellulite reduction;
- 15 (f) Hair removal or reduction; and
- 16 (g) Nonablative tattoo removal.
  - (2) "Certified advanced esthetician" means a person certified to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures under sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act.
  - (3) "Esthetician" means a person certified to practice esthetics under ORS 690.005 to 690.225.
  - (4) "Nonablative" means involving an action performed on the skin or hair of a person that does not result in the wounding of skin or underlying tissue.
  - SECTION 2. (1) A person may not practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures or use a title, word or abbreviation, including the designation certified advanced esthetician, that indicates that the person is authorized to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures unless the person is certified by the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians under

1 section 3 of this 2015 Act.

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- (2) Notwithstanding ORS 677.080, a certified advanced esthetician may practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures.
  - (3) This section does not apply to:
- (a) A person who is a licensed health care professional if the person's scope of practice includes the practice of advanced nonablative esthetics procedures; or
- (b) A student enrolled in an advanced nonablative esthetics education program or training program or in an advanced nonablative esthetics program that combines education and training.
- SECTION 3. (1) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, the Health Licensing Office shall issue a certificate to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures to an applicant who:
  - (a) Is at least 18 years of age;
  - (b) Is an esthetician in good standing with the Board of Cosmetology;
  - (c) Successfully completes:
  - (A) Subject to subsection (2) of this section, an advanced nonablative esthetics education program or training program, or an advanced nonablative esthetics program that combines education and training, that is approved by the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians; or
  - (B) A nationally recognized program that is approved by the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians and through which individuals are certified to use lasers or other devices for purposes related to practicing advanced nonablative esthetics procedures;
- (d) Passes an examination adopted by the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians by rule; and
  - (e) Pays the applicable fees established under ORS 676.592.
  - (2) An education program described in subsection (1)(c)(A) of this section must be:
- (a) If the program is located in this state, licensed through the Higher Education Coordinating Commission; or
- (b) If the program is not located in this state, substantially equivalent to a program licensed through the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.
- (3) The office shall issue a certificate to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures to an applicant who:
  - (a) Is an esthetician in good standing with the Board of Cosmetology;
- (b) Is authorized and in good standing to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures in a state where the requirements to practice nonablative esthetics procedures are substantially similar to the requirements to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures in this state; and
  - (c) Pays the applicable fee established under ORS 676.592.
- (4) The office shall issue a temporary certificate to perform advanced nonablative esthetics procedures to an applicant who:
  - (a) Is an esthetician in good standing with the Board of Cosmetology;
  - (b) Meets any qualifications prescribed by the office by rule; and
  - (c) Pays the applicable fee established under ORS 676.592.
- 43 <u>SECTION 4.</u> (1) A certificate issued under section 3 (1) or (3) of this 2015 Act must be 44 renewed annually. To renew a certificate under this section, a certified advanced esthetician 45 must submit to the Health Licensing Office:

(a) A renewal application;

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- (b) Proof that the certified advanced esthetician has completed any continuing education requirements established by the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians by rule; and
  - (c) The applicable renewal fee established under ORS 676.592.
- (2) A temporary certificate issued under section 3 (4) of this 2015 Act expires as prescribed by the office by rule.
- SECTION 5. (1) There is established the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians within the Health Licensing Office, consisting of:
  - (a) Nine members appointed by the Governor; and
- (b) The section manager of the Radiation Protection Services Section of the Oregon
   Health Authority, or the section manager's designee.
  - (2) Of the nine members appointed by the Governor:
  - (a) Five must be certified advanced estheticians;
  - (b) Two must be physicians or physician assistants licensed under ORS chapter 677 or nurse practitioners licensed under ORS 678.375 to 678.390; and
    - (c) Two must be public members who are residents of this state.
  - (3) The board member described in subsection (1)(b) of this section is a nonvoting ex officio member of the board.
  - (4) The term of office of each appointed member is four years, but a member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.
  - (5) The voting members of the board shall select one of the voting members as chairperson and another voting member as vice chairperson. The board shall establish the terms of service for the chairperson and the vice chairperson and the duties and powers of the chairperson and the vice chairperson.
  - (6) A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.
  - (7) Official action by the board requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of the board.
  - (8) The board shall meet at a place, day and hour determined by the board. The board also may meet at other times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the voting members of the board.
  - <u>SECTION 6.</u> (1) In addition to the powers granted to the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians by sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act, the board shall have the power to:
  - (a) Adopt rules and take actions necessary to carry out the duties of the board under sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act.
  - (b) Adopt rules establishing sanitation and safety requirements for advanced nonablative esthetics procedures.
- 41 (c) Adopt rules establishing a professional code of conduct for certified advanced 42 estheticians.
  - (d) Adopt any other rule necessary to regulate certified advanced estheticians.
  - (e) Provide advice to the Health Licensing Office on issues related to advanced nonablative esthetics procedures.

- (f) Compile information related to advanced nonablative esthetics procedures and direct the office to disseminate the information to certified advanced estheticians.
  - (2) In adopting rules under subsection (1)(b) of this section, the board shall adopt rules:
- (a) Requiring a certified advanced esthetician to conduct all advanced nonablative esthetics procedures in a facility for which a license has been issued under ORS 690.055;
- (b) Requiring a certified advanced esthetician to maintain client disclosure forms that include, at a minimum, disclosure of the existence of professional liability insurance; and
- (c) Requiring a certified advanced esthetician to enter into an agreement with a health care professional who has the authority to prescribe drugs listed in Schedule III, IV or V to whom the certified advanced esthetician may refer a client of the certified advanced esthetician.
- SECTION 7. In the manner provided by ORS chapter 183 for contested cases, and after consultation with the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians, the Health Licensing Office may impose a form of discipline described in ORS 676.612 against any person certified under section 3 of this 2015 Act for a violation of the provisions of sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act or of a rule adopted under sections 1 to 7 of this 2015 Act, or for commission of a prohibited act listed in ORS 676.612.
- SECTION 8. Notwithstanding the requirements listed in section 3 (1)(c) of this 2015 Act, the Health Licensing Office shall, until January 1, 2018, issue a certificate to practice advanced nonablative esthetics procedures to an applicant who, in lieu of those requirements:
- (1) Provides proof to the office of having been employed for not less than 500 hours as a laser operator under the supervision of a health care professional whose scope of practice includes the practice of advanced nonablative esthetics procedures; or
- (2) Provides proof to the office of having completed 40 hours of education related to laser theory and fundamentals and of having completed 24 hours of practical experience performing each modality listed in section 1 (1) of this 2015 Act.
- SECTION 9. (1) Notwithstanding the term of office specified by section 5 of this 2015 Act, of the members first appointed to the Board of Certified Advanced Estheticians:
  - (a) Two shall serve for terms ending December 31, 2016.
  - (b) Two shall serve for terms ending December 31, 2017.
  - (c) Two shall serve for terms ending December 31, 2018.
  - (d) Three shall serve for terms ending December 31, 2019.
- (2) Notwithstanding the requirements for board membership specified by section 5 (2)(a) of this 2015 Act, the members first appointed to the board under section 5 (2)(a) of this 2015 Act may be estheticians who have at least three years' experience practicing advanced nonablative esthetics procedures.
  - SECTION 10. ORS 676.583 is amended to read:

  - (6) The moneys received by the office from civil penalties under this section shall be deposited in the Health Licensing Office Account and are continuously appropriated to the office for the administration and enforcement of the laws the office is charged with administering and enforcing that

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SECTION 12. (1) Sections 1 to 9 of this 2015 Act and the amendments to ORS 676.583 and 676.992 by sections 10 and 11 of this 2015 Act become operative on July 1, 2016.

(2) The Health Licensing Office may take any action before the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the office to exercise, on or after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, all the duties, functions and powers conferred on the office by sections 1 to 9 of this 2015 Act and the amendments to ORS 676.583 and 676.992 by sections 10 and 11 of this 2015 Act.

SECTION 13. This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect on its passage.
