

**FISCAL IMPACT OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION**

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**Measure Description:**

Directs Land Conservation and Development Commission to require local governments in which there are communities at substantial risk of experiencing severe impact from tsunami inundation to plan for tsunami resilience.

**Local Government Mandate:**

This bill does not affect local governments' service levels or shared revenues sufficient to trigger Section 15, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**Analysis:** This bill directs the Land Conservation and Development Commission (LCDC) to adopt provisions to require local governments at substantial risk from a tsunami to plan and zone land so as to minimize the impacts to implement best practices to achieve tsunami resilience. The bill also directs the Oregon Homeland Security Council to identify certain energy infrastructure vulnerabilities and make recommendations. In addition, the bill allows State agencies and local governments to establish public-private partnerships to evaluate, plan, and finance projects associated with liquid fuel storage and transfer.

This bill will require complex rulemaking and possible revisions to statewide land use planning goals and notification under the Landowner Notification Program and would require reimbursements to affected local jurisdiction that send the notice out to their affected citizens. LCDC anticipates the expenses of the program would be paid with General Fund and Federal Funds.

Cities and Counties anticipate that there may be a fiscal impact due to requiring them to plan and zone to minimize impacts of tsunami inundation and implement best practices. The fiscal impact of planning and instituting best practices is unknown at this time.

The Oregon Military Department anticipates a fiscal impact to provide the study and recommendations required by the bill, but the size of that impact is not known at this time.

The Legislative Fiscal Office believes this measure warrants a subsequent referral to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means Committee for consideration of this measure's budgetary impact on the State's General Fund.
