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WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Requires private safety agencies to comply with certain personnel record requests from Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST). Authorizes DPSST Director to apply for court order compelling compliance. Clarifies internal use of public safety officer's photograph permitted without written consent. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

EFFECT OF COMMITTEE AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST) serves over 35,000 public safety constituents throughout Oregon. DPSST's mission is to promote excellence in public safety by: 1) providing training; 2) developing professional standards; and 3) upholding professional standards for police, fire, corrections, parole and probation, and telecommunications personnel. Additionally, DPSST licenses private security providers as well as private investigators in the state.

Under current Oregon law, public safety agencies must provide DPSST with personnel records of present or past employees for the purpose of investigating the individual's qualifications for employment, training or certification as a public safety officer (ORS 181.675). The statute does not currently include private safety agents.

Senate Bill 238 includes private safety agencies in the requirements of ORS 181.675. The bill also authorizes the Director of DPSST to apply for a court order to compel compliance with the personnel record request whether it is to a private or public safety agency. Senate Bill 238 also clarifies that the internal use of a public safety officer's photograph is permitted without the written consent of the public safety officer or his or her employer.
