

# House Bill 2020

Sponsored by Representative KOTEK, Senators FERRIOLI, COURTNEY, Representative HOYLE, Senator ROSENBAUM

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Alters definition of "public official."

Prohibits Governor, First Partner, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General and Commissioner of Bureau of Labor and Industries from receiving money or other consideration for speaking engagement or presentation.

Requires Deputy Secretary of State, First Partner and all policy advisors and attorneys employed by Governor's office to file statement of economic interest.

Increases civil penalty for willful abuse of official position by public official.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to government ethics; creating new provisions; amending ORS 244.020, 244.042, 244.050,  
3 244.055, 244.060, 244.100, 244.255, 244.350, 293.708 and 441.540; and declaring an emergency.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 244.020 is amended to read:

6 244.020. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:

7 (1) "Actual conflict of interest" means any action or any decision or recommendation by a per-  
8 son acting in a capacity as a public official, the effect of which would be to the private pecuniary  
9 benefit or detriment of the person or the person's relative or any business with which the person  
10 or a relative of the person is associated unless the pecuniary benefit or detriment arises out of cir-  
11 cumstances described in subsection [(12)] (13) of this section.

12 (2) "Business" means any corporation, partnership, proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise,  
13 association, organization, self-employed individual and any other legal entity operated for economic  
14 gain but excluding any income-producing not-for-profit corporation that is tax exempt under section  
15 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code with which a public official or a relative of the public official  
16 is associated only as a member or board director or in a nonremunerative capacity.

17 (3) "Business with which the person is associated" means:

18 (a) Any private business or closely held corporation of which the person or the person's relative  
19 is a director, officer, owner or employee, or agent or any private business or closely held corpo-  
20 ration in which the person or the person's relative owns or has owned stock, another form of equity  
21 interest, stock options or debt instruments worth \$1,000 or more at any point in the preceding cal-  
22 endar year;

23 (b) Any publicly held corporation in which the person or the person's relative owns or has  
24 owned \$100,000 or more in stock or another form of equity interest, stock options or debt instru-  
25 ments at any point in the preceding calendar year;

26 (c) Any publicly held corporation of which the person or the person's relative is a director or  
27 officer; or

**NOTE:** Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (d) For public officials required to file a statement of economic interest under ORS 244.050, any  
 2 business listed as a source of income as required under ORS 244.060 (3).

3 (4) "Candidate" means an individual for whom a declaration of candidacy, nominating petition  
 4 or certificate of nomination to public office has been filed or whose name is printed on a ballot or  
 5 is expected to be or has been presented, with the individual's consent, for nomination or election to  
 6 public office.

7 (5) "Development commission" means any entity that has the authority to purchase, develop,  
 8 improve or lease land or the authority to operate or direct the use of land. This authority must be  
 9 more than ministerial.

10 (6) **"First Partner" means the spouse or domestic partner of the Governor, or an indi-**  
 11 **vidual who primarily has a personal relationship with the Governor as determined by the**  
 12 **Oregon Government Ethics Commission by rule. "First Partner" encompasses any alterna-**  
 13 **tive title that the Governor may publicly substitute for "First Partner," including, but not**  
 14 **limited to, "First Lady," "First Husband" or "First Spouse."**

15 [(6)(a)] (7)(a) "Gift" means something of economic value given to a public official, a candidate  
 16 or a relative or member of the household of the public official or candidate:

17 (A) Without valuable consideration of equivalent value, including the full or partial forgiveness  
 18 of indebtedness, which is not extended to others who are not public officials or candidates or the  
 19 relatives or members of the household of public officials or candidates on the same terms and con-  
 20 ditions; or

21 (B) For valuable consideration less than that required from others who are not public officials  
 22 or candidates.

23 (b) "Gift" does not mean:

24 (A) Contributions as defined in ORS 260.005.

25 (B) Gifts from relatives or members of the household of the public official or candidate.

26 (C) An unsolicited token or award of appreciation in the form of a plaque, trophy, desk item,  
 27 wall memento or similar item, with a resale value reasonably expected to be less than \$25.

28 (D) Informational or program material, publications or subscriptions related to the recipient's  
 29 performance of official duties.

30 (E) Admission provided to or the cost of food or beverage consumed by a public official, or a  
 31 member of the household or staff of the public official when accompanying the public official, at a  
 32 reception, meal or meeting held by an organization when the public official represents state gov-  
 33 ernment as defined in ORS 174.111, a local government as defined in ORS 174.116 or a special gov-  
 34 ernment body as defined in ORS 174.117.

35 (F) Reasonable expenses paid by any unit of the federal government, a state or local government,  
 36 a Native American tribe that is recognized by federal law or formally acknowledged by a state, a  
 37 membership organization to which a public body as defined in ORS 174.109 pays membership dues  
 38 or a not-for-profit corporation that is tax exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue  
 39 Code, for attendance at a convention, fact-finding mission or trip, conference or other meeting if the  
 40 public official is scheduled to deliver a speech, make a presentation, participate on a panel or rep-  
 41 resent state government as defined in ORS 174.111, a local government as defined in ORS 174.116  
 42 or a special government body as defined in ORS 174.117.

43 (G) Contributions made to a legal expense trust fund established under ORS 244.209 for the  
 44 benefit of the public official.

45 (H) Reasonable food, travel or lodging expenses provided to a public official, a relative of the

1 public official accompanying the public official, a member of the household of the public official ac-  
 2 companying the public official or a staff member of the public official accompanying the public offi-  
 3 cial, when the public official is representing state government as defined in ORS 174.111, a local  
 4 government as defined in ORS 174.116 or a special government body as defined in ORS 174.117:

5 (i) On an officially sanctioned trade-promotion or fact-finding mission; or

6 (ii) In officially designated negotiations, or economic development activities, where receipt of the  
 7 expenses is approved in advance.

8 (I) Food or beverage consumed by a public official acting in an official capacity:

9 (i) In association with the review, approval, execution of documents or closing of a borrowing,  
 10 investment or other financial transaction, including any business agreement between state govern-  
 11 ment as defined in ORS 174.111, a local government as defined in ORS 174.116 or a special govern-  
 12 ment body as defined in ORS 174.117 and a private entity or public body as defined in ORS 174.109;

13 (ii) While engaged in due diligence research or presentations by the office of the State Treasurer  
 14 related to an existing or proposed investment or borrowing; or

15 (iii) While engaged in a meeting of an advisory, governance or policy-making body of a corpo-  
 16 ration, partnership or other entity in which the office of the State Treasurer has invested moneys.

17 (J) Waiver or discount of registration expenses or materials provided to a public official or  
 18 candidate at a continuing education event that the public official or candidate may attend to satisfy  
 19 a professional licensing requirement.

20 (K) Expenses provided by one public official to another public official for travel inside this state  
 21 to or from an event that bears a relationship to the receiving public official's office and at which  
 22 the official participates in an official capacity.

23 (L) Food or beverage consumed by a public official or candidate at a reception where the food  
 24 or beverage is provided as an incidental part of the reception and no cost is placed on the food or  
 25 beverage.

26 (M) Entertainment provided to a public official or candidate or a relative or member of the  
 27 household of the public official or candidate that is incidental to the main purpose of another event.

28 (N) Entertainment provided to a public official or a relative or member of the household of the  
 29 public official where the public official is acting in an official capacity while representing state  
 30 government as defined in ORS 174.111, a local government as defined in ORS 174.116 or a special  
 31 government body as defined in ORS 174.117 for a ceremonial purpose.

32 (O) Anything of economic value offered to or solicited or received by a public official or candi-  
 33 date, or a relative or member of the household of the public official or candidate:

34 (i) As part of the usual and customary practice of the person's private business, or the person's  
 35 employment or position as a volunteer with a private business, corporation, partnership,  
 36 proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise, association, organization, not-for-profit corporation or  
 37 other legal entity operated for economic value; and

38 (ii) That bears no relationship to the public official's or candidate's holding of, or candidacy for,  
 39 the official position or public office.

40 (P) Reasonable expenses paid to a public school employee for accompanying students on an ed-  
 41 ucational trip.

42 [(7)] (8) "Honorarium" means a payment or something of economic value given to a public offi-  
 43 cial in exchange for services upon which custom or propriety prevents the setting of a price. Ser-  
 44 vices include, but are not limited to, speeches or other services rendered in connection with an  
 45 event.

1        [(8)] (9) “Income” means income of any nature derived from any source, including, but not lim-  
 2 ited to, any salary, wage, advance, payment, dividend, interest, rent, honorarium, return of capital,  
 3 forgiveness of indebtedness, or anything of economic value.

4        [(9)] (10) “Legislative or administrative interest” means an economic interest, distinct from that  
 5 of the general public, in:

6            (a) Any matter subject to the decision or vote of the public official acting in the public official’s  
 7 capacity as a public official; or

8            (b) Any matter that would be subject to the decision or vote of the candidate who, if elected,  
 9 would be acting in the capacity of a public official.

10        [(10)] (11) “Member of the household” means any person who resides with the public official or  
 11 candidate.

12        [(11)] (12) “Planning commission” means a county planning commission created under ORS  
 13 chapter 215 or a city planning commission created under ORS chapter 227.

14        [(12)] (13) “Potential conflict of interest” means any action or any decision or recommendation  
 15 by a person acting in a capacity as a public official, the effect of which could be to the private  
 16 pecuniary benefit or detriment of the person or the person’s relative, or a business with which the  
 17 person or the person’s relative is associated, unless the pecuniary benefit or detriment arises out  
 18 of the following:

19            (a) An interest or membership in a particular business, industry, occupation or other class re-  
 20 quired by law as a prerequisite to the holding by the person of the office or position.

21            (b) Any action in the person’s official capacity which would affect to the same degree a class  
 22 consisting of all inhabitants of the state, or a smaller class consisting of an industry, occupation or  
 23 other group including one of which or in which the person, or the person’s relative or business with  
 24 which the person or the person’s relative is associated, is a member or is engaged.

25            (c) Membership in or membership on the board of directors of a nonprofit corporation that is  
 26 tax-exempt under section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue Code.

27        [(13)] (14) “Public office” has the meaning given that term in ORS 260.005.

28        [(14)] (15) “Public official” means **the First Partner and** any person who, when an alleged vi-  
 29 olation of this chapter occurs, is serving the State of Oregon or any of its political subdivisions or  
 30 any other public body as defined in ORS 174.109 as an elected official, appointed official, employee  
 31 or agent, irrespective of whether the person is compensated for the services.

32        [(15)] (16) “Relative” means:

33            (a) The spouse, parent, stepparent, child, sibling, stepsibling, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the  
 34 public official or candidate;

35            (b) The parent, stepparent, child, sibling, stepsibling, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the spouse  
 36 of the public official or candidate;

37            (c) Any individual for whom the public official or candidate has a legal support obligation;

38            (d) Any individual for whom the public official provides benefits arising from the public official’s  
 39 public employment or from whom the public official receives benefits arising from that individual’s  
 40 employment; or

41            (e) Any individual from whom the candidate receives benefits arising from that individual’s em-  
 42 ployment.

43        [(16)] (17) “Statement of economic interest” means a statement as described by ORS 244.060 or  
 44 244.070.

45        [(17)] (18) “Zoning commission” means an entity to which is delegated at least some of the dis-

cretionary authority of a planning commission or governing body relating to zoning and land use matters.

**SECTION 2.** ORS 244.042 is amended to read:

244.042. (1) Except as provided in [subsection (3)] **subsections (3) and (4)** of this section, a public official may not solicit or receive, whether directly or indirectly, honoraria for the public official or any member of the household of the public official if the honoraria are solicited or received in connection with the official duties of the public official.

(2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, a candidate may not solicit or receive, whether directly or indirectly, honoraria for the candidate or any member of the household of the candidate if the honoraria are solicited or received in connection with the official duties of the public office for which the person is a candidate.

(3) **Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section,** this section does not prohibit:

(a) The solicitation or receipt of an honorarium or a certificate, plaque, commemorative token or other item with a value of \$50 or less; or

(b) The solicitation or receipt of an honorarium for services performed in relation to the private profession, occupation, avocation or expertise of the public official or candidate.

**(4)(a) The Governor, First Partner, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General and Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries may not solicit or receive an honorarium, money or any other consideration, as defined in ORS 171.725, for any speaking engagement or presentation.**

**(b) This subsection does not prevent a public official listed in paragraph (a) of this subsection from receiving any food, beverage, travel or lodging expenses otherwise authorized by this chapter for a speaking engagement or presentation.**

**SECTION 3.** ORS 244.050 is amended to read:

244.050. (1) On or before April 15 of each year the following persons shall file with the Oregon Government Ethics Commission a verified statement of economic interest as required under this chapter:

(a) The Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries, district attorneys and members of the Legislative Assembly.

(b) Any judicial officer, including justices of the peace and municipal judges, except any pro tem judicial officer who does not otherwise serve as a judicial officer.

(c) Any candidate for a public office designated in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection.

(d) The Deputy Attorney General.

**(e) The Deputy Secretary of State.**

[(e)] **(f)** The Legislative Administrator, the Legislative Counsel, the Legislative Fiscal Officer, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives.

[(f)] **(g)** The Chancellor and Vice Chancellors of the Oregon University System and the president and vice presidents, or their administrative equivalents, in each public university listed in ORS 352.002.

[(g)] **(h)** The following state officers:

(A) Adjutant General.

(B) Director of Agriculture.

(C) Manager of State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation.

(D) Water Resources Director.

(E) Director of Department of Environmental Quality.

10 (2) By April 15 next after the date an appointment takes effect, every appointed public official  
11 on a board or commission listed in subsection (1) of this section shall file with the Oregon Govern-  
12 ment Ethics Commission a statement of economic interest as required under ORS 244.060, 244.070  
13 and 244.090.

14 (3) By April 15 next after the filing deadline for the primary election, each candidate described  
15 in subsection (1) of this section shall file with the commission a statement of economic interest as  
16 required under ORS 244.060, 244.070 and 244.090.

17 (4) Within 30 days after the filing deadline for the general election, each candidate described in  
18 subsection (1) of this section who was not a candidate in the preceding primary election, or who  
19 was nominated for public office described in subsection (1) of this section at the preceding primary  
20 election by write-in votes, shall file with the commission a statement of economic interest as re-  
21 quired under ORS 244.060, 244.070 and 244.090.

22 (5) Subsections (1) to (4) of this section apply only to persons who are incumbent, elected or  
23 appointed public officials as of April 15 and to persons who are candidates on April 15. Subsections  
24 (1) to (4) of this section also apply to persons who do not become candidates until 30 days after the  
25 filing deadline for the statewide general election.

26 (6) If a statement required to be filed under this section has not been received by the commis-  
27 sion within five days after the date the statement is due, the commission shall notify the public of-  
28 ficial or candidate and give the public official or candidate not less than 15 days to comply with the  
29 requirements of this section. If the public official or candidate fails to comply by the date set by the  
30 commission, the commission may impose a civil penalty as provided in ORS 244.350.

31 **SECTION 4.** ORS 244.350 is amended to read:

32 244.350. (1) The Oregon Government Ethics Commission may impose civil penalties not to ex-  
33 ceed:

34 (a) Except as provided in [paragraph (b)] **paragraphs (b) and (c)** of this subsection, \$5,000 for  
35 violation of any provision of this chapter or any resolution adopted under ORS 244.160.

36 (b) \$25,000 for violation of ORS 244.045.

37 **(c) \$10,000 for willfully violating ORS 244.040.**

38 (2)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the commission may impose civil  
39 penalties not to exceed \$1,000 for violation of any provision of ORS 192.660.

40 (b) A civil penalty may not be imposed under this subsection if the violation occurred as a result  
41 of the governing body of the public body acting upon the advice of the public body's counsel.

42 (3) The commission may impose civil penalties not to exceed \$250 for violation of ORS 293.708.  
43 A civil penalty imposed under this subsection is in addition to and not in lieu of a civil penalty that  
44 may be imposed under subsection (1) of this section.

45 (4)(a) The commission may impose civil penalties on a person who fails to file the statement



1 required under ORS 244.050 or 244.217. In enforcing this subsection, the commission is not required  
 2 to follow the procedures in ORS 244.260 before finding that a violation of ORS 244.050 or 244.217  
 3 has occurred.

4 (b) Failure to file the required statement in timely fashion is prima facie evidence of a violation  
 5 of ORS 244.050 or 244.217.

6 (c) The commission may impose a civil penalty of \$10 for each of the first 14 days the statement  
 7 is late beyond the date set by law, or by the commission under ORS 244.050, and \$50 for each day  
 8 thereafter. The maximum penalty that may be imposed under this subsection is \$5,000.

9 (5) In lieu of or in conjunction with finding a violation of law or any resolution or imposing a  
 10 civil penalty under this section, the commission may issue a written letter of reprimand, explanation  
 11 or education.

12 **SECTION 5.** ORS 244.060 is amended to read:

13 244.060. The statement of economic interest filed under ORS 244.050 shall be on a form pre-  
 14 scribed by the Oregon Government Ethics Commission. The public official or candidate filing the  
 15 statement shall supply the information required by this section and ORS 244.090, as follows:

16 (1) The names of all positions as officer of a business and business directorships held by the  
 17 public official or candidate or a member of the household of the public official or candidate during  
 18 the preceding calendar year, and the principal address and a brief description of each business.

19 (2) All names under which the public official or candidate and members of the household of the  
 20 public official or candidate do business and the principal address and a brief description of each  
 21 business.

22 (3) The names, principal addresses and brief descriptions of the sources of income received  
 23 during the preceding calendar year by the public official or candidate or a member of the household  
 24 of the public official or candidate that produce 10 percent or more of the total annual household  
 25 income.

26 (4)(a) A list of all real property in which the public official or candidate or a member of the  
 27 household of the public official or candidate has or has had any personal, beneficial ownership in-  
 28 terest during the preceding calendar year, any options to purchase or sell real property, including  
 29 a land sales contract, and any other rights of any kind in real property located within the ge-  
 30 ographic boundaries of the governmental agency of which the public official holds, or the candidate  
 31 if elected would hold, an official position or over which the public official exercises, or the candidate  
 32 if elected would exercise, any authority.

33 (b) This subsection does not require the listing of the principal residence of the public official  
 34 or candidate.

35 (5) All expenses with an aggregate value exceeding \$50 received by the public official during the  
 36 preceding calendar year when participating in a convention, mission, trip or other meeting described  
 37 in ORS 244.020 [(6)(b)(F)] **(7)(b)(F)**, including the name and address of the organization, unit of  
 38 government, tribe or corporation paying the expenses, the nature of the event and the date and  
 39 amount of the expense.

40 (6) All expenses with an aggregate value exceeding \$50 received by the public official during the  
 41 preceding calendar year when participating in a mission, negotiations or economic development ac-  
 42 tivities described in ORS 244.020 [(6)(b)(H)] **(7)(b)(H)**, including the name and address of the person  
 43 paying the expenses, the nature of the event and the date and amount of the expenditure.

44 (7) All honoraria and other items allowed under ORS 244.042 with a value exceeding \$15 that  
 45 are received by the public official, candidate or member of the household of the public official or

1 candidate during the preceding calendar year, the provider of each honorarium or item and the date  
2 and time of the event for which the honorarium or item was received.

3 (8) The name, principal address and brief description of each source of income exceeding an  
4 aggregate amount of \$1,000, whether or not taxable, received by the public official or candidate, or

20 (2) When a person who is a member of the Oregon Investment Council becomes aware that  
 21 action on a matter pending before the council might lead to private pecuniary benefit or detriment  
 22 to the person, to a relative of the person or to a business with which the person or a relative of the

 9 by the State Treasurer a trading statement listing all stocks, bonds and other types of securities  
 10 purchased or sold during the preceding quarter:
