SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Removes requirement that person elected to county office provide county clerk with certificate of election.

Requires certain election documents to be filed electronically.

Changes certain ballot markings from "Presidential only" to "Federal only."

Alters certain filing deadlines.

Removes requirement that signature sheets for initiative or referral petition or prospective petition be attached to full and correct copy of measure.

Requires Secretary of State to establish process for modifying petition and prospective petition templates.

Requires that one copy of prospective initiative and referral petitions be sent to required officials, rather than two.

Permits district attorney to make clerical corrections to ballot title for district measure.

Requires all estimates, portraits, statements and arguments for voters' pamphlet to be filed electronically.

[Makes candidate's statement for voters' pamphlet subject to prohibition on and penalties for false publication.]

Establishes that person who fails to file required statement or certificate has 20 days from date notice is sent by Secretary of State to request hearing.

Establishes that Secretary of State, rather than county clerk, is responsible for signature verification for state candidate petitions.

Clarifies how candidates, principal campaign committees, political committees and petition committees may use amounts received as contributions.

Corrects statutory reference from section 9, chapter 8, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 2177), to ensure proper calculation of total number of registered voters as of July 1, 2015.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

9 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

10 **SECTION 1.** ORS 204.020 is amended to read:

11 204.020. (1) The term of office of each officer elected pursuant to ORS 204.005 commences on the
12 first Monday of January next following election to office.

13 (2) Before entering upon any elective office listed in ORS 204.005, the person *[elected]* **who has**

1 **received a certificate of election** must qualify by filing with the county clerk of the county in
2 which the person is elected the person's [*certificate of election, with an*] oath of office, [*indorsed*
3 *thereon, and*] subscribed by the [*elected*] person, to the effect that the person will support the Con-
4 stitution of the United States and of this state, and faithfully carry out the office being assumed.
5 The person shall also give and file the undertaking provided for under subsection (3) of this section.

6 (3) A county governing body may require, by ordinance, for the filing by each officer under ORS
7 204.005, prior to that officer assuming office, of an official undertaking with such surety as the
8 governing body determines necessary or of an irrevocable letter of credit issued by an insured in-
9 stitution, as defined in ORS 706.008, in either case in a reasonable amount with the county govern-
10 ing body.

11 **SECTION 2.** ORS 246.021 is amended to read:

12 246.021. (1) Except as provided in ORS 247.012 and subsection (2) of this section, an election
13 document and an accompanying payment of fees required to be filed with the Secretary of State,
14 county clerk or other filing officer must be delivered to and actually received at the office of the
15 designated officer not later than 5 p.m. of the day the document or fee is due or, if the day due is
16 a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, on the next business day.

17 (2) If, at 5 p.m. of the day an election document is due, an individual is physically present in the
18 office of the secretary, county clerk or other filing officer and in line waiting to deliver the docu-
19 ment, the individual is considered to have begun the act of delivering the document and is permitted
20 to file it.

21 (3) Except as provided in ORS 253.690, any election document required to be filed with the filing
22 officer other than ballots, voter registration cards or petitions requiring signatures of electors may
23 also be filed by means of an electronic facsimile transmission machine **or electronic mail**. If an
24 election document is required to be filed by a specified time, the entire document must be received
25 [*in*] **at** the office of the filing officer not later than 5 p.m. of the day the document is due or, if the
26 day due is a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, on the next business day.

27 (4) Notwithstanding any provision of subsections (1) to (3) of this section, if a statement is re-
28 quired to be filed electronically under ORS 260.057:

29 (a) The statement must be received electronically at the office of the Secretary of State not later
30 than 11:59 p.m. of the day the statement is due or, if the day due is a Saturday, Sunday or holiday,
31 on the next business day; and

32 (b) The Secretary of State may not accept the filing of the statement in any form other than an
33 electronic format.

34 (5) As used in this section, "election document" includes, but is not limited to, a declaration of
35 candidacy for nomination for public or political party office, completed nominating petitions, state-
36 ments and portraits for voters' pamphlets, statements of election campaign contributions and
37 expenditures, and initiative, referendum or recall petitions.

38 **SECTION 3.** ORS 247.420 is amended to read:

39 247.420. (1) A county clerk shall give a ballot marked "[*Presidential*] **Federal** only" to any per-
40 son eligible under ORS 247.410 who personally appears in the office of the county clerk, completes
41 a registration card and verifies eligibility to vote under ORS 247.410.

42 (2) No person shall supply any information under subsection (1) of this section, knowing it to
43 be false.

44 **SECTION 4.** ORS 254.515 is amended to read:

45 254.515. Ballots marked "[*Presidential*] **Federal** only" may be counted only for the offices for

1 which the elector is entitled to vote. Votes on the ballot for other offices may not be counted.

2 **SECTION 5.** ORS 248.007 is amended to read:

3 248.007. (1) Subject to ORS 248.005, a major political party may organize and select delegates
4 to national party conventions in any manner.

5 (2) The provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 do not apply to a major political party if the party
6 has notified the Secretary of State as provided in subsection (5) of this section that the party does
7 not intend to be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315. References to precinct com-
8 mitteepersons in any provisions of ORS chapters 246 to 260 do not apply to a party described in this
9 subsection.

10 (3) ORS 248.012 to 248.315 apply only to a major political party that has notified the Secretary
11 of State as provided in subsection (5) of this section that the political party intends to be subject
12 to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315. References to precinct committeepersons in any pro-
13 visions of ORS chapters 246 to 260 shall apply to a party described in this subsection. If a major
14 political party fails to notify the Secretary of State under this subsection, the party shall be con-
15 sidered subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315.

16 (4) A major political party shall notify the Secretary of State as provided in subsection (5) of this
17 section if the party does not intend to be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 except
18 that the party intends to elect precinct committeepersons. If a party notifies the Secretary of State
19 under this subsection, the party shall elect precinct committeepersons only as provided in ORS
20 248.015 and shall elect precinct committeepersons in the same manner in all precincts in this state.

21 (5) Not later than the [274th] **271st** day before the date of the primary election, a major political
22 party shall notify the Secretary of State in writing whether or not the party intends to be subject
23 to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or whether the party intends to elect precinct com-
24 mitteepersons under subsection (4) of this section. If the major political party does not intend to be
25 subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or intends to elect precinct committeepersons
26 under subsection (4) of this section, the party shall file with the Secretary of State, at the same time
27 notice is given under this subsection, a copy of its organizational documents setting forth the man-
28 ner in which its officers and managing committees are selected or any other manner in which it
29 conducts its affairs.

30 (6) In each even-numbered year, a major political party shall file with the Secretary of State a
31 statement indicating that the party is operating subject to ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or a copy of
32 current organizational documents setting forth the manner in which its officers and managing com-
33 mittees are selected or any other manner in which it conducts its affairs. Material described in this
34 subsection shall be filed [on the 274th] **between the 271st and the 277th** day before the third
35 Tuesday in May of each odd-numbered year.

36 (7) A major political party subject to the provisions of this section shall nominate candidates
37 of the major political party, for other than political party office, at the primary election.

38 **SECTION 6.** ORS 248.006 is amended to read:

39 248.006. (1) An affiliation of electors becomes a major political party in this state and is qualified
40 to make nominations at a primary election when a number of electors equal to at least five percent
41 of the number of electors registered in this state are registered as members of the party not later
42 than the 275th day before the date of a primary election. An affiliation of electors satisfying the
43 requirements of this subsection shall be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.007 on the date the
44 Secretary of State determines the registration requirements are satisfied.

45 (2) The number of electors described in subsection (1) of this section shall be calculated based

1 on the number of electors registered in this state and eligible to vote, as reported on the official
2 abstracts of the election, at the general election immediately preceding the deadline specified in
3 subsection (1) of this section.

4 (3) After an affiliation of electors becomes a major political party under subsection (1) of this
5 section, in order to maintain status as a major political party subject to ORS 248.007, the party must
6 satisfy the registration requirement of subsection (1) of this section not later than the 275th day
7 before each primary election.

8 (4) An affiliation of electors ceases to be a major political party if the registration requirements
9 of subsection (1) of this section are not satisfied by the 275th day before each primary election. The
10 affiliation of electors ceases to be a major political party on the date the Secretary of State deter-
11 mines that the registration requirement is not satisfied.

12 (5) When an affiliation of electors has not satisfied the registration requirement of subsection
13 (1) of this section for the first time, at the request of a representative of the affiliation of electors,
14 the Secretary of State shall determine not less than once each month whether at least five percent
15 of the number of eligible electors registered in this state are registered as members of the party.
16 After an affiliation of electors has qualified as a major political party, the Secretary of State shall
17 determine on the [274th] **271st** day before each primary election whether the major political party
18 has satisfied the registration requirements described in subsection (3) of this section.

19 **SECTION 7.** ORS 249.031 is amended to read:

20 249.031. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, a nominating petition or decla-
21 ration of candidacy shall contain:

22 (a) The name by which the candidate is commonly known. A candidate may use a nickname in
23 parentheses in connection with the candidate's full name.

24 (b) Address information as required by the Secretary of State by rule.

25 (c) The office and department or position number, if any, for which the candidate seeks nomi-
26 nation.

27 (d) If the candidate is seeking the nomination of a major political party, the name of the major
28 political party of which the candidate will have been a member, subject to the exceptions stated in
29 ORS 249.046, during at least 180 days before the deadline for filing a nominating petition or decla-
30 ration of candidacy.

31 (e) A statement that the candidate is willing to accept the nomination or election or, regarding
32 a candidate for precinct committeeperson, that the candidate accepts the office if elected.

33 (f) A statement that the candidate will qualify if elected.

34 (g) If the candidate is seeking the nomination of a major political party, a statement that the
35 candidate, if not nominated, will not accept the nomination or endorsement of any political party
36 other than the one of which the candidate is a member on the date the petition or declaration is
37 filed.

38 (h) The signature of the candidate.

39 (i) A statement of the candidate's occupation, educational and occupational background and
40 prior governmental experience.

41 (2) Subsection (1)(i) of this section does not apply to a candidate for election as a precinct
42 committeeperson.

43 (3) A declaration of candidacy shall include a statement that the required fee is included with
44 the declaration.

45 **(4) A nominating petition or declaration of candidacy must be filed using the electronic**

1 **filing system adopted by the Secretary of State under ORS 251.014 if the petition or declara-**
2 **tion is filed:**

3 **(a) For a primary election; and**

4 **(b) For an office for which the Secretary of State is designated as the filing officer under**
5 **ORS 249.035.**

6 [(4)] (5) If required by the national rules of the major political party, the declaration of a candi-
7 dicate for election as a precinct committeeperson shall include the name of the individual the candi-
8 dicate supports for President of the United States or “uncommitted” or “no preference.”

9 **SECTION 8.** ORS 249.037 is amended to read:

10 249.037. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, a nominating petition or declaration
11 of candidacy shall be filed not sooner than the 250th day and not later than the 70th day before the
12 date of the primary election.

13 (2) If a vacancy occurs in a partisan elective office after the 80th day and before the 70th day
14 before the primary election, a nominating petition or declaration of candidacy for that office may
15 be filed not later than the [65th] **64th** day before the primary election.

16 (3) A declaration of candidacy for the office of precinct committeeperson may not be filed before
17 February 1 immediately preceding the primary election.

18 **SECTION 9.** ORS 249.170 is amended to read:

19 249.170. (1) A candidate who has filed a declaration of candidacy or a nominating petition may
20 withdraw not later than the [67th] **63rd** day before the date of the primary election by filing a
21 statement of withdrawal with the filing officer with whom the declaration or petition was filed. The
22 statement shall be made under oath and state the reasons for withdrawal.

23 (2) The official with whom a declaration of candidacy is filed, upon request received not later
24 than the [67th] **63rd** day before the date of the primary election, shall refund the filing fee of a
25 candidate who dies, withdraws or becomes ineligible for the nomination.

26 **SECTION 10.** ORS 249.180 is amended to read:

27 249.180. Any person who has been nominated at a primary election, or any person who has been
28 nominated to fill a vacancy as provided in ORS 188.120 or 249.190 and 249.200, may withdraw from
29 nomination by filing a written statement declining the nomination and stating the reason for with-
30 drawal. The statement shall be signed by the candidate and filed not later than the [67th] **63rd** day
31 before the general election with the officer with whom the candidate’s declaration of candidacy or
32 nominating petition was filed.

33 **SECTION 11.** ORS 249.830 is amended to read:

34 249.830. (1) A person who has been nominated and has accepted the nomination under ORS
35 249.712 may withdraw from the nomination by filing with the officer with whom the certificate of
36 nomination was filed a written statement declining the nomination and stating the reason for with-
37 drawal.

38 (2) The statement must be:

39 (a) Signed by the person withdrawing from the nomination; and

40 (b) Filed not later than the [67th] **63rd** day before the general election.

41 (3) The statement may be sent to the Secretary of State through a county clerk, as provided by
42 ORS 249.850.

43 **SECTION 12.** ORS 250.045 is amended to read:

44 250.045. (1) Before circulating a petition to initiate or refer a state measure under section 1,
45 Article IV, Oregon Constitution, the petitioner shall file with the Secretary of State a prospective

1 petition. The prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated shall contain the signatures of
2 at least 1,000 electors. *[The signature sheets must be attached to a full and correct copy of the measure*
3 *to be initiated.]*

4 (2) Before obtaining signatures on a prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated, the
5 chief petitioners shall file with the secretary a statement declaring whether one or more persons
6 will be paid money or other valuable consideration for obtaining signatures of electors on the pro-
7 spective petition. After a statement has been filed under this subsection, the chief petitioners shall
8 notify the secretary not later than the 10th day after any of the chief petitioners first has knowledge
9 or should have had knowledge that:

10 (a) Any person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement filed under this sub-
11 section declared that no such person would be paid.

12 (b) No person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement filed under this sub-
13 section declared that one or more such persons would be paid.

14 (3) The secretary by rule shall establish procedures for verifying whether a prospective petition
15 for a state measure to be initiated contains the required number of signatures of electors.

16 (4) The secretary shall date and time stamp the prospective petition and specify the form on
17 which the initiative or referendum petition shall be printed for circulation as provided in ORS
18 250.052. The secretary shall retain the prospective petition.

19 (5) The chief petitioner may amend the state measure to be initiated that has been filed with the
20 secretary without filing another prospective petition, if:

21 (a) The Attorney General certifies to the secretary that the proposed amendment will not sub-
22 stantially change the substance of the measure; and

23 (b) The deadline for submitting written comments on the draft title has not passed.

24 (6) The cover of an initiative or referendum petition shall designate the name and residence
25 address of not more than three persons as chief petitioners and shall contain instructions for per-
26 sons obtaining signatures of electors on the petition. The instructions shall be adopted by the sec-
27 retary by rule. The cover of a referendum petition shall contain the final measure summary
28 described in ORS 250.065 (1). If a petition seeking a different ballot title is not filed with the Su-
29 preme Court by the deadline for filing a petition under ORS 250.085, the cover of an initiative peti-
30 tion shall contain the latest ballot title certified by the Attorney General under ORS 250.067 (2).
31 However, if the Supreme Court has reviewed the ballot title, the cover of the initiative petition shall
32 contain the title certified by the court.

33 (7) The chief petitioners shall include with the prospective petition a statement declaring
34 whether one or more persons will be paid money or other valuable consideration for obtaining sig-
35 natures of electors on the initiative or referendum petition. After the prospective petition is filed,
36 the chief petitioners shall notify the filing officer not later than the 10th day after any of the chief
37 petitioners first has knowledge or should have had knowledge that:

38 (a) Any person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement included with the
39 prospective petition declared that no such person would be paid.

40 (b) No person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement included with the pro-
41 spective petition declared that one or more such persons would be paid.

42 (8)(a) Each sheet of signatures on an initiative petition shall contain the caption of the ballot
43 title. Each sheet of signatures on a referendum petition shall contain the subject expressed in the
44 title of the Act to be referred.

45 (b) Each sheet of signatures on an initiative or referendum petition shall:

1 (A) Contain a notice describing the meaning of the color of the signature sheet in accordance
2 with ORS 250.052; and

3 (B) If one or more persons will be paid for obtaining signatures of electors on the petition,
4 contain a notice stating: "Some Circulators For This Petition Are Being Paid." The notice shall be
5 in boldfaced type and shall be prominently displayed on the sheet.

6 (c) The secretary by rule shall adopt a method of designation to distinguish signature sheets of
7 referendum petitions containing the same subject reference and being circulated during the same
8 period.

9 (9) The reverse side of the cover of an initiative or referendum petition shall be used for ob-
10 taining signatures on the initiative or referendum petition.

11 (10) Not more than 20 signatures on the signature sheet of the initiative or referendum petition
12 may be counted. The circulator shall certify on each signature sheet of the initiative or referendum
13 petition that the circulator:

14 (a) Witnessed the signing of the signature sheet by each individual whose signature appears on
15 the signature sheet; and

16 (b) Believes each individual is an elector.

17 (11) The person obtaining signatures on the petition **or prospective petition** shall carry at least
18 one full and correct copy of the measure to be initiated or referred and shall allow any person to
19 review a copy upon request of the person.

20 **SECTION 13.** ORS 221.031 is amended to read:

21 221.031. (1) Before circulating a petition to incorporate unincorporated territory as a city, the
22 petitioners shall file a petition for incorporation in a form prescribed by rule of the Secretary of
23 State with:

24 (a) The county clerk of the county in which the proposed city lies; or

25 (b) If the proposed city lies in more than one county, the county clerk of the county in which
26 the largest part of its territory lies.

27 (2) The county clerk shall immediately date and time stamp the prospective petition and shall
28 authorize the circulation of the petition when the economic feasibility statement required by ORS
29 221.035 is filed with the county clerk. The county clerk shall retain the prospective petition and
30 economic feasibility statement and shall immediately send two copies of the prospective petition to
31 the appropriate county court.

32 (3)(a) A petition for incorporation filed with the county clerk under subsection (1) of this section
33 shall designate the name and residence address of not more than three persons as chief petitioners,
34 who shall be electors registered within the boundaries of the proposed city.

35 (b) The petition shall contain the name of the proposed city.

36 (c) The petition shall include a proposed permanent rate limit for operating taxes that would
37 generate operating tax revenues sufficient to support an adequate level of municipal services. The
38 tax rate limit shall be expressed in dollars per thousand dollars of assessed value. The tax rate limit
39 shall be calculated for the latest tax year for which the assessed value of the proposed city is
40 available.

41 (d) There shall be attached to the cover sheet of the petition a map indicating the exterior
42 boundaries of the proposed city. The map shall not exceed 14 inches by 17 inches in size and shall
43 be used in lieu of a metes and bounds or legal description of the proposed city.

44 (e) If the territory proposed to be incorporated is within the jurisdiction of a local government
45 boundary commission, the petition shall be accompanied by the economic feasibility analysis re-

1 quired under ORS 199.476 (1). Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, unless the economic
2 feasibility analysis is approved by the local government boundary commission as provided in ORS
3 199.522, the county clerk shall not authorize the circulation of the petition.

4 (f) If the petitioners propose not to extinguish a special district pursuant to ORS 222.510 (2) or
5 a county service district pursuant to ORS 451.585 (1), the petition shall include a statement of this
6 proposal.

7 (4) *[Each sheet of signatures shall be attached to a full and correct copy of the petition for incor-*
8 *poration.]* **The circulator shall carry at least one full and correct copy of the petition for in-**
9 **corporation and shall allow any person to review a copy upon request of the person.** Not more
10 than 20 signatures on each sheet of the petition for incorporation shall be counted. The circulator
11 shall certify on each signature sheet that the circulator witnessed the signing of the signature sheet
12 by each individual whose signature appears on the signature sheet and that the circulator believes
13 each individual is an elector registered in the county. If the territory proposed to be incorporated
14 is within the jurisdiction of a local government boundary commission, each signature sheet shall
15 contain a statement that the economic feasibility analysis for the proposed city was approved by the
16 boundary commission, that the analysis is available for inspection at the offices of the boundary
17 commission and that subsequent to the gathering of the petitions the boundary commission must
18 review and finally approve the proposal prior to submission at an election.

19 **SECTION 14.** ORS 250.052 is amended to read:

20 250.052. (1)(a) For each state initiative, referendum or recall petition, the Secretary of State
21 shall prepare official templates of the cover and signature sheets for the petition. Except as pro-
22 vided in this section, templates of cover and signature sheets for state initiative and referendum
23 petitions are subject to the requirements of ORS 250.045. The templates of signature sheets to be
24 used by persons who are being paid to obtain signatures on the petition shall be a different color
25 from the sheets to be used by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures on the petition.

26 (b) For each prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated the secretary shall prepare
27 official templates of the cover and signature sheets. The templates of signature sheets to be used
28 by persons who are being paid to obtain signatures on the prospective petition shall be a different
29 color from the sheets to be used by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures on the
30 prospective petition. Each signature sheet for the prospective petition shall:

31 (A) Contain a notice describing the meaning of the color of the signature sheet; and

32 (B) If one or more persons will be paid for obtaining signatures of electors on the prospective
33 petition, contain a notice stating: "Some Circulators For This Prospective Petition Are Being
34 Paid." The notice shall be in boldfaced type and shall be prominently displayed on the sheet.

35 (2) A person obtaining signatures on a state initiative, referendum or recall petition or a pro-
36 spective petition for a state measure to be initiated may use only the cover and signature sheets
37 contained in the official templates prepared for the petition or prospective petition. A person who
38 is being paid to obtain signatures on the petition or prospective petition shall use the signature
39 sheet template designated for use by persons being paid to obtain signatures. A person who is not
40 being paid to obtain signatures on the petition or prospective petition shall use the signature sheet
41 template designated for use by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures.

42 (3) The secretary shall issue templates for a petition or prospective petition only to a chief
43 petitioner of the petition or prospective petition or to an agent designated by a chief petitioner.

44 (4) The secretary shall issue official templates to a chief petitioner or designated agent not later
45 than:

1 (a) Three business days after the deadline for filing a petition under ORS 250.085 relating to a
2 ballot title certified by the Attorney General for the state initiative petition or, if a petition is filed
3 with the Supreme Court under ORS 250.085, three business days after the Supreme Court certifies
4 to the secretary [of State] a ballot title for the state initiative petition;

5 (b) Three business days after a prospective petition is filed under ORS 249.865 or 250.045 for a
6 state recall petition or state referendum petition; or

7 (c) Three business days after the chief petitioner files a statement with the secretary under ORS
8 250.045 (2) for a prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated.

23 (3) Before circulating the nominating petition, the chief sponsor shall file with the Secretary of
24 State a signed copy of the prospective petition. The chief sponsor shall include with the prospective
25 petition a statement declaring whether one or more persons will be paid money or other valuable
26 consideration for obtaining signatures of electors on the petition. After the prospective petition is
27 filed, the chief sponsor shall notify the Secretary of State not later than the 10th day after the chief
28 sponsor first has knowledge or should have had knowledge that:

29 (a) Any person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement included with the
30 prospective petition declared that no such person would be paid.

31 (b) No person is being paid for obtaining signatures, when the statement included with the pro-
32 spective petition declared that one or more such persons would be paid.

33 **SECTION 45.** ORS 249.735 is amended to read:

34 249.735. (1) An assembly of electors is an organized body:

35 (a) Of not fewer than 1,000 electors of the state for a statewide nomination.

36 (b) Of not fewer than 500 electors of the congressional district for which the nomination for
37 Representative in Congress is made.

38 (c) Of not fewer than 250 electors of the county or any other district for which the nomination
39 is made.

40 (2) An assembly of electors may nominate candidates at a nominating convention. The conven-
41 tion shall be held in one day and last not longer than 12 hours. The signature, printed name and
42 residence or mailing address of each member of the assembly shall be recorded at the convention
43 and entered of record in the minutes by the secretary of the assembly. Not less than the minimum
44 number of electors required to constitute an assembly of electors must have recorded their signa-
45 tures in the minutes of the assembly and must be present when the assembly nominates a candidate.

1 The candidate receiving the highest number of votes of the assembly for the office shall be the

3 (3) Not later than the 10th day before the meeting of an assembly of electors, notice shall be
4 published at least once in not less than three newspapers of general circulation within the electoral
5 district for which the nomination will be made. The notice shall contain the time and place the as-

7 dresses of not fewer than 25 electors qualified to vote in the assembly who desire that it be held.

8 (4) Proof of publication of notice in subsection (3) of this section shall be made by affidavit of
9 the owner, editor, publisher, manager, advertising manager, principal clerk of any of them, or the
10 printer or printer's foreman of the newspaper in which the notice is published. The affidavit shall
11 show publication and shall be filed with the filing officer with the certificate of nomination.

26 249.740. (1) A certificate of nomination made by individual electors shall contain a number of
27 signatures of electors in the electoral district equal to not less than one percent of the total votes
28 cast in the electoral district for which the nomination is intended to be made, for all candidates for
29 presidential electors at the last general election.

30 (2) Each elector signing a certificate of nomination made by individual electors shall include the
31 residence or mailing address of the elector. Except for a certificate of nomination of candidates for

1 (a) Witnessed the signing of the signature sheet by each individual whose signature appears on
2 the signature sheet; and

3 (b) Believes each individual is an elector registered in the electoral district.

4 (5) The signatures contained in each certificate of nomination made by individual electors shall
5 be certified for genuineness by the county clerk **or the Secretary of State** under ORS 249.008.

6 (6) As used in this section, “prospective certificate” means the information, except signatures
7 and other identification of certificate signers, required to be contained in a completed certificate
8 of nomination.

39 (a) "Contribution" and "expenditure" include a contribution or expenditure to or on behalf of
40 an initiative, referendum or recall petition.

41 (b) "Funds donated" means all funds, including but not limited to gifts, loans, advances, credits
42 or deposits of money that are donated for the purpose of supporting the activities of a holder of
43 public office. "Funds donated" does not mean funds appropriated by the Legislative Assembly or
44 another similar public appropriating body or personal funds of the office holder donated to an ac-
45 count containing only those personal funds.

1 (c) "Public office" does not include national or political party office.

2 **SECTION 48.** Section 9, chapter 8, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 2177), is amended

4 **Sec. 9.** For the purpose of maintaining status as a minor political party under ORS 248.008
5 [(4)(b)] **(4)(a)** for the general election to be held on November 8, 2016, the total number of registered
6 electors in this state is deemed to be the total number of registered electors identified in the elector
7 registration records of the Secretary of State on July 1, 2015.

8 **SECTION 49.** **ORS 247.435 is repealed.**

9 **SECTION 50.** **The amendments to statutes and session laws by sections 1 to 48 of this**
10 **2015 Act and the repeal of ORS 247.435 by section 49 of this 2015 Act become operative on**
11 **January 1, 2016.**

12 **SECTION 51.** **This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
13 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect**
14 **on its passage.**
