## B-Engrossed House Bill 2313

Ordered by the Senate June 5 Including House Amendments dated April 23 and Senate Amendments dated June 5

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Prohibits person under 21 years of age from attempting to purchase, purchasing or acquiring marijuana items, and from entering portion of licensed premises where such persons are prohibited.] [Punishes violation by maximum fine of \$1,000. Punishes violation while operating motor vehicle

by maximum fine of \$2,000.]

[Authorizes court to order person who violates prohibition to undergo assessment and treatment.] [Provides immunity from prosecution if person under 21 years of age contacts emergency medical services or law enforcement agency to obtain medical assistance.]

Authorizes Oregon Youth Authority and county juvenile departments to disclose and provide copies of reports and other materials relating to child, ward, youth or youth offender's history and prognosis to Department of Corrections for purpose of exercising custody or supervising person committed to department's legal and physical custody.

Limits use of reports and other materials by department to certain circumstances. Sunsets authorization on June 30, 2017.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to juveniles; creating new provisions; amending ORS 419A.257; and declaring an emergency.

**3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:** 

4 **SECTION 1.** ORS 419A.257 is amended to read:

5 419A.257. (1) Reports and other materials relating to a child, ward, youth or youth offender's 6 history and prognosis that are created or maintained by or on behalf of the Oregon Youth Authority 7 or the juvenile department are privileged and, except with the consent of the child, ward, youth or

8 youth offender or with the authorization of the court, shall be withheld from public inspection.

9 (2) The Oregon Youth Authority and the juvenile department may disclose and provide copies 10 of reports and other materials relating to the child, ward, youth or youth offender's history and 11 prognosis, if the disclosure is reasonably necessary to perform official duties relating to the in-12 volvement of the child, ward, youth or youth offender with the juvenile court or the juvenile de-13 partment, to the following:

- 17 (d) School superintendents and their designees in cases under ORS 419C.005;
- 18 (e) Attorneys of record for the child, ward, youth or youth offender;

1 (h) The Department of Human Services;

2 (i) The court appointed special advocate; and

3 (j) The Psychiatric Security Review Board.

4 (3)(a) The Oregon Youth Authority and county juvenile departments established under 5 ORS 419A.010 to 419A.020 may disclose and provide copies of reports and other materials re-6 lating to the child, ward, youth or youth offender's history and prognosis to the Department 7 of Corrections for the purpose of enabling the Department of Corrections to perform its of-8 ficial duties relating to the exercise of custody or supervision of a person committed to the 9 legal and physical custody of the Department of Corrections.

(b) The Department of Corrections shall limit the use of reports and other materials
 disclosed and provided to the department under this section to reports and other materials
 that relate to the history and prognosis of a youth or youth offender as these pertain to:

(A) A person who was transferred to the physical custody of the authority under ORS
 137.124 and is subsequently transferred to the physical custody of the Department of Cor rections under ORS 137.124 or 420.011 or any other statute; or

(B) A person committed to the legal and physical custody of the Department of Cor rections while the person is under the jurisdiction of the juvenile court under ORS 419C.005,
 including but not limited to a person in the legal custody of the authority.

19 [(3)] (4) A person that obtains copies of reports or other materials under this section is responsible for preserving the confidentiality of the reports or other materials. A service provider, school superintendent or superintendent's designee who obtains copies of reports or other materials under this section shall destroy the copies upon the conclusion of involvement in the case.

[(4)(a)] (5)(a) Information appearing in reports or other materials relating to the child, ward, youth or youth offender's history or prognosis may not be disclosed directly or indirectly to any person not described in subsection (2) of this section unless the consent of the child, ward, youth or youth offender or the authorization of the court has been obtained, except for purposes of evaluating the child, ward, youth or youth offender's eligibility for special education as provided in ORS chapter 343.

(b) Information appearing in reports or other materials may not be used in evidence in any
proceeding to establish criminal or civil liability against the child, ward, youth or youth offender,
whether the proceeding occurs after the child, ward, youth or youth offender has reached 18 years
of age or otherwise, except for the following purposes:

(A) In connection with a presentence investigation after guilt has been admitted or established
 in a criminal court.

(B) In connection with a proceeding in another juvenile court concerning the child, ward, youth
or youth offender or an appeal from an order or judgment of the juvenile court.

[(5)(a)] (6)(a) Information contained in reports and other materials relating to a child, ward, youth or youth offender's history and prognosis that, in the professional judgment of the Oregon Youth Authority, juvenile department, juvenile counselor, caseworker, school superintendent or superintendent's designee, teacher or detention worker to whom the information contained in the reports and other materials has been provided, indicates a clear and immediate danger to another person or to society, shall be disclosed to the appropriate authority and the person or entity that is in danger from the child, ward, youth or youth offender.

(b) An agency or a person that discloses information under paragraph (a) of this subsection has immunity from any liability, civil or criminal, that might otherwise be incurred or imposed for 1 making the disclosure.

2 (c) Nothing in this subsection affects the provisions of ORS 146.750, 146.760, 419B.035, 419B.040
3 and 419B.045.

4 [(6)] (7) The disclosure of information under this section does not make the information admis-5 sible in any court or administrative proceeding if it is not otherwise admissible.
