SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Establishes funding mechanism for activities related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education and activities related to career and technical education that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs.

Directs Teacher Standards and Practices Commission and Department of Education to advance policy on career and technical education in specified manners.

Directs Oregon Education Investment Board to develop and maintain website for teachers of career and technical education.

Directs Department of Education to administer pilot program to increase students' exposure and access to career and technical education.

Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2015.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to education; creating new provisions; amending ORS 326.500 and 344.075 and section 10,
3 chapter 519, Oregon Laws 2011, and sections 66 and 72, chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2015 (En-
4 rolled Senate Bill 215); repealing sections 8d and 8e, chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled
5 Senate Bill 612); and declaring an emergency.

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

7 **SECTION 1. (1) Activities related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics**
8 **education and activities related to career and technical education that can lead to high wage**
9 **and high demand jobs shall be funded as provided by this section.**

10 **(2) The Department of Education shall distribute moneys appropriated to the department,**
11 **or otherwise made available to the department, for the purpose of funding activities related**
12 **to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education and activities related to ca-**
13 **reer and technical education. Distributions shall be made as follows:**

14 **(a) Thirty-five percent for activities related to science, technology, engineering and**
15 **mathematics education that are described in subsection (3) of this section.**

16 **(b) Sixty-five percent for activities related to career and technical education that can**
17 **lead to high wage and high demand jobs and that are described in subsection (4) of this sec-**
18 **tion.**

19 **(3) Moneys distributed as provided by subsection (2)(a) of this section to fund activities**
20 **related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education shall be used to:**

21 **(a) Expand and sustain regional networks that support science, technology, engineering**
22 **and mathematics.**

New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (b) Award grants that expand the implementation of effective programs related to sci-
2 ence, technology, engineering and mathematics, that propose innovative approaches or pro-
3 grams related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics or that provide
4 professional development related to teaching science, technology, engineering and math-
5 ematics.

6 (c) Provide funding to recruit, retain and support underserved students, as defined by the
7 State Board of Education by rule, for programs that are offered at community colleges and
8 public universities and that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs related to science,
9 technology, engineering and mathematics.

10 (d) Develop a systematic survey of facility use to determine how savings for science,
11 technology, engineering and mathematics education can be achieved.

12 (4) Moneys distributed as provided by subsection (2)(b) of this section to fund activities
13 related to career and technical education that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs
14 shall be used for:

15 (a) Programs that expose students to career and technical education programs that can
16 lead to high wage and high demand jobs.

17 (b) Career and Technical Education Revitalization grants awarded under ORS 344.075.

18 (c) Student leadership organizations related to career and technical education programs
19 that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs.

20 (d) Distribution to school districts to support career and technical education programs
21 in the school district that are approved by the Department of Education as being high quality
22 and that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs. Moneys must be distributed to each
23 school and public charter school in the school district based on the number of students en-
24 rolled at the school with the following characteristics:

25 (A) Students who are enrolled in and earned three or more credits for courses that are
26 part of a career and technical education program that can lead to high wage and high de-
27 mand jobs and that are approved by the Department of Education.

28 (B) Students who acquire an industry credential that can lead to a high wage and high
29 demand job and that is approved by the Department of Education.

30 (C) Students described in subparagraph (A) or (B) of this paragraph who are historically
31 underserved, as defined by the State Board of Education by rule.

32 (e) Administration of grants for the purpose of expanding teacher training programs and
33 opportunities related to career and technical education that can lead to high wage and high
34 demand jobs.

35 (f) Administration of a pilot program to increase students' exposure and access to career
36 and technical education that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs.

37 (5) Except as otherwise provided, moneys distributed under subsections (3) and (4) of this
38 section shall be distributed to school districts, education service districts, public schools,
39 public charter schools, community colleges or public universities or any thereof in partner-
40 ship with youth job development organizations, as defined in ORS 344.415, nonprofit organ-
41 izations or other entities identified by the State Board of Education by rule.

42 (6) From the moneys available under subsection (2) of this section, the Department of
43 Education, the STEM Investment Council and the committee established under ORS 344.075
44 combined may retain no more than a total of five percent of all moneys distributed for a
45 fiscal year for administrative expenses incurred under this section.

1 **(7) The Department of Education, in collaboration with the STEM Investment Council**
2 **and the committee established under ORS 344.075, shall submit a biennial report to the Leg-**
3 **islative Assembly related to distributions made under this section. The report must include**
4 **metrics that identify how distributions made under this section are contributing to the de-**
5 **velopment of a skilled workforce that is able to secure high wage and high demand jobs.**

6 **SECTION 2.** Section 1 of this 2015 Act is amended to read:

7 **Sec. 1.** (1) Activities related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education and
8 activities related to career and technical education that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs
9 shall be funded as provided by this section.

10 (2) The Department of Education shall distribute moneys [*appropriated to the department, or*
11 *otherwise made available to the department, for the purpose of funding activities related to science,*
12 *technology, engineering and mathematics education and activities related to career and technical edu-*
13 *cation. Distributions shall be made*] **in the Connecting Education to Careers Account established**

23 (3) Moneys distributed as provided by subsection (2)(a) of this section to fund activities related
24 to science, technology, engineering and mathematics education shall be used to:

25 (a) Expand and sustain regional networks that support science, technology, engineering and
26 mathematics.

27 (b) Award grants that expand the implementation of effective programs related to science,
28 technology, engineering and mathematics, that propose innovative approaches or programs related
29 to science, technology, engineering and mathematics or that provide professional development re-
30 lated to teaching science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

31 (c) Provide funding to recruit, retain and support underserved students, as defined by the State
32 Board of Education by rule, for programs that are offered at community colleges and public uni-
33 versities and that can lead to high wage and high demand jobs related to science, technology, en-
34 gineering and mathematics.

35 (d) Develop a systematic survey of facility use to determine how savings for science, technology,
36 engineering and mathematics education can be achieved.

37 **(e) Fund any other activities related to science, engineering and mathematics education**
38 **that are identified by the STEM Investment Council.**

41 for:

22 shall be distributed to school districts, education service districts, public schools, public charter
23 schools, community colleges or public universities or any thereof in partnership with youth job de-
24 velopment organizations, as defined in ORS 344.415, nonprofit organizations or other entities iden-
25 tified by the State Board of Education by rule.

26 (6) From the moneys available under subsection (2) of this section, the Department of Education,
27 the STEM Investment Council and the committee established under ORS 344.075 combined may re-
28 tain no more than a total of five percent of all moneys distributed for a fiscal year for administrative
29 expenses incurred under this section.

30 (7) The Department of Education, in collaboration with the STEM Investment Council and the
31 committee established under ORS 344.075, shall submit a biennial report to the Legislative Assembly
32 related to distributions made under this section. The report must include metrics that identify how
33 distributions made under this section are contributing to the development of a skilled workforce that
34 is able to secure high wage and high demand jobs.

35 **SECTION 3. The Connecting Education to Careers Account is established in the State**
36 **Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Connecting**
37 **Education to Careers Account shall be credited to the account. Moneys in the account are**
38 **continuously appropriated to the Department of Education for distribution as provided by**
39 **section 1 of this 2015 Act.**

40 **SECTION 4. Section 3 of this 2015 Act and the amendments to section 1 of this 2015 Act**
41 **by section 2 of this 2015 Act become operative on July 1, 2017.**

1 (2)(a) The council is established for the purpose of assisting the Chief Education Officer in de-
2 veloping and overseeing a long-term strategy that advances the following educational goals related
3 to science, technology, engineering and mathematics:

4 (A) Double the percentage of students in 4th and 8th grades who are proficient or advanced in
5 mathematics and science, as determined using a nationally representative assessment of students'
6 knowledge in mathematics and science; and

7 (B) Double the number of students who earn a post-secondary degree requiring proficiency in
8 science, technology, engineering or mathematics.

9 (b) Achievement of the goals described in paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be determined
10 based on a comparison between the 2014-2015 school year or academic year and the 2024-2025 school
11 year or academic year.

12 (3) To advance the educational goals described in subsection (2) of this section, the council shall
13 make recommendations to *[the Chief Education Officer regarding]*:

14 (a) The **Chief Education Officer regarding the** administration of the STEM Investment Grant

7 ciency in science, technology, engineering or mathematics.

9 based on percentages and numbers determined by the council.

10 (3) To advance the educational goals described in subsection (2) of this section, the council shall
11 make recommendations to:

12 (a) The Superintendent of Public Instruction regarding the administration of the STEM Invest-
13 ment Grant Program established in ORS 327.380; [and]

14 **(b) The Superintendent of Public Instruction regarding the distribution of moneys under**
15 **section 1 of this 2015 Act; and**

16 [(b)] (c) The Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Commissioner for Community College
17 Services and the Chancellor of the Oregon University System regarding other investments in sci-

42 **SECTION 8.** ORS 344.075 is amended to read:

43 344.075. (1) The Career and Technical Education Revitalization Grant Program is established
44 within the Department of Education.

45 (2) Subject to the availability of funds, the department shall award grants each biennium to

1 school districts, education service districts, public schools or public charter schools, or any combi-
2 nation thereof or in partnership with youth job development organizations as defined in ORS 344.415,
3 for the uses described in subsection (3) of this section.

4 (3) Grants received under this section must be used to enhance the collaboration between edu-
5 cation providers and employers by:

6 (a) Developing or enhancing career and technical education programs of study;

7 (b) Expanding the professional growth of and career opportunities for students through career
8 and technical education programs;

9 (c) Assessing the ability of each career and technical education program to meet workforce
10 needs and give students the skills required for jobs in this state that provide high wages and are in
11 high demand; and

12 (d) Supporting the achievement of the high school diploma requirements established under ORS
13 329.451.

14 (4) Any school district, education service district, public school or public charter school, or any
15 combination thereof or in partnership with a youth job development organization as defined in ORS
16 344.415, may apply for a grant under this section.

17 (5)(a) The department and the Bureau of Labor and Industries shall jointly establish a committee
18 to:

19 **(A) Assist with the grant program established under this section, including [set] setting**
20 goals for the program, [develop] **developing** grant criteria, [review] **reviewing** all grant applications
21 and [make] **making** recommendations related to the awarding of grants.

22 **(B) Make recommendations to the Superintendent of Public Instruction related to the**
23 **distribution of moneys under section 1 of this 2015 Act.**

24 **(b) The committee established by this subsection must equally** represent business, industry,
25 labor and education providers.

26 [(b)] **(c) The department in awarding grants, and the committee in fulfilling its duties related to**
27 grants, shall award grants based on the ability of the applicant to use the grant as required under
28 subsection (3) of this section. In addition, the department and the committee shall give priority to
29 applicants that:

30 (A) Represent a diverse number of students served and a diverse selection of geographic lo-
31 cations;

32 (B) Have received commitments from business, industry, labor or education providers to enhance
33 collaboration and to provide resources for any collaborative efforts; and

34 (C) Demonstrate that the collaboration between education providers and employers enhanced
35 by the grant will be sustainable beyond the life of the grant.

36 (6) The State Board of Education may adopt any rules necessary for the implementation of this
37 section.

38 (7) The department may pay the expenses incurred by the department in administering this
39 section out of moneys that are available to the department for purposes of awarding grants under
40 this section. For each biennium, the department may spend on administrative expenses an amount
41 that does not exceed five percent of the total amount of moneys available to the department during
42 the biennium for purposes of awarding grants under this section.

43 **SECTION 9. The amendments to ORS 326.500 and 344.075 by sections 5 to 8 of this 2015**
44 **Act become operative on July 1, 2015.**

45 **SECTION 10. The Teacher Standards and Practices Commission shall advance the policy**

1 on career and technical education described in ORS 344.055 by:

2 (1) Establishing and regularly updating the requirements for a teacher preparation pro-
3 gram for prospective career and technical education teachers with trade or industry experi-
4 ence. The requirements must:

5 (a) Identify a minimum number of required credit hours for a program; and

6 (b) Be established and regularly updated based on consultations with relevant trade or
7 industry stakeholders, the Department of Education and the Higher Education Coordinating
8 Commission.

9 (2) Collaborating with the Department of Education to:

10 (a) Enable experts in trade or industry to become teachers of career and technical edu-
11 cation, which may be accomplished through a limited license or alternative requirements for
12 licensure;

13 (b) Coordinate communications about career and technical education, as described in
14 section 11 (3)(b) of this 2015 Act; and

15 (c) Review statutes and rules for necessary changes and to review and recommend al-
16 ternative methods to increase available funding options.

17 **SECTION 11.** The Department of Education shall advance the policy on career and tech-
18 nical education described in ORS 344.055 by:

19 (1) Administering the distribution of grants or entering into contracts for the purpose
20 of expanding teacher training programs related to career and technical education that can
21 lead to high wage and high demand jobs. Grants awarded, or contracts entered into, under
22 this subsection may be funded with moneys available under section 1 of this 2015 Act and
23 must:

24 (a) Not exceed \$250,000 per grant or contract;

25 (b) Be awarded to, or be entered with, a teacher education program or a teacher educa-
26 tion institution, regardless of whether courses are offered in a traditional setting, by an al-
27 ternative delivery method or by an alternative time frame;

28 (c) Be awarded or entered into for a teacher education program that has a plan for re-
29 cruiting students to the program;

30 (d) Be used to develop and provide coursework that:

31 (A) Qualifies for credit or as professional development and that satisfies licensure or
32 endorsement requirements; and

33 (B) Is provided in a broad group of instructional areas that are grouped to give context
34 for academic, technical and career learning; and

35 (e) To the extent practicable, align with grant distribution requirements of the Career
36 and Technical Education Revitalization Grant Program described in ORS 344.075.

37 (2) Developing and supporting the infrastructure for an online system that is accessible
38 statewide and that delivers courses and professional development to teachers of career and
39 technical education. For the purpose of this subsection, the department may retain up to
40 eight percent of the moneys available to the department under this section.

41 (3) Collaborating with the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission to:

42 (a) Enable experts in trade or industry to become teachers of career and technical edu-
43 cation;

44 (b) Coordinate communications about career and technical education, including commu-
45 nications:
