78th OREGON LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY--2015 Regular Session

Senate Bill 112

Sponsored by Senator DEMBROW, Representative REARDON (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Establishes Career and Technical Education Investment Council.

Directs council to evaluate applications and make recommendations on applications submitted under Career and Technical Education Revitalization Grant Program.

Directs STEM Investment Council to coordinate efforts with council.
