Senate Bill 117

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.**

Establishes Task Force on Jurisdictional Transfers. Sunsets task force on December 31, 2016. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

- 3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
- 4 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) The Task Force on Jurisdictional Transfers is established, consisting of 12 members appointed as follows:
- 6 (a) The President of the Senate shall appoint two members from among members of the 7 Senate as follows:
 - (A) One member from the Democratic party.
- 9 (B) One member from the Republican party.
- 10 **(b)** The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint two members from among members of the House of Representatives as follows:
 - (A) One member from the Democratic party.
 - (B) One member from the Republican party.
- 14 (c) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall jointly appoint six 15 members as follows:
- 16 (A) Two members who are employees of the Department of Transportation.
- 17 (B) One member representing an urban county.
- 18 (C) One member representing a rural county.
- 19 (D) One member representing an urban city.
- 20 (E) One member representing a rural city.
- 21 (c) The Governor shall appoint two members as follows:
- 22 (A) One member of the general public.
 - (B) One member representing the Governor.
- 24 (2) The task force shall evaluate and make recommendations concerning the transfer of 25 state highways from the state's jurisdiction to the jurisdiction of a city or county. The task 26 force shall consider:
 - (a) The potential cost and liability associated with jurisdictional transfers;
 - (b) The potential benefit to cities and counties of jurisdictional transfers; and
- 29 (c) Alternatives to managing state highways that run through communities without transferring the state highways to cities or counties.
 - (3) A majority of the voting members of the task force constitutes a quorum for the

1 transaction of business.

- (4) Official action by the task force requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of the task force.
 - (5) The task force shall elect two of its members to serve as co-chairs.
- (6) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appointment to become immediately effective.
 - (7) The task force shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the co-chairs.
 - (8) The task force may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the task force.
 - (9) The task force shall:
- (a) Submit an initial report in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to transportation no later than December 1, 2015.
- (b) Submit a final report in the manner provided by ORS 192.245, and may include recommendations for legislation, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to transportation no later than September 15, 2016.
- (10) Members of the task force who are not members of the Legislative Assembly are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for expenses and serve as volunteers.
- (11) Members of the Legislative Assembly appointed to the task force are nonvoting members of the task force and may act in an advisory capacity only.
- (12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist the task force in the performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish such information and advice as the members of the task force consider necessary to perform their duties.

SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2015 Act is repealed on December 31, 2016.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect on its passage.
