#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Changes name of Oregon Education Investment Board to Chief Education Office. Abolishes terms of board members and modifies duties of office. Extends sunset for office and Chief Education Officer.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.
