Senate Bill 216

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Allows education service districts to receive funding from Department of Education to accomplish purposes of Network of Quality Teaching and Learning. Modifies purposes for which department may distribute funding.

Allows department to enter into contract with nonprofit entity to administer School District Collaboration Grant Program and to award additional grant amounts in certain circumstances. Eliminates time requirement for beginning teacher and administrator mentorship program.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

 $\mathbf{5}$ SECTION 1. ORS 342.950 is amended to read:

6 342.950. (1) The Network of Quality Teaching and Learning is established. The network consists

7 of the Oregon Education Investment Board, the Department of Education and public and private 8 entities that receive funding as provided by this section to accomplish the purposes of the network

9 described in subsection (2) of this section.

10 (2) The purposes of the network are the following:

11 (a) To enhance a culture of leadership and collaborative responsibility for advancing the pro-12 fession of teaching among providers of early learning services, teachers and administrators in 13kindergarten through grade 12, education service districts and teacher education institutions.

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1 329.800. (1) Each school district that wishes to participate in the beginning teacher and admin-

2 istrator mentorship program shall submit a formal application to the Department of Education. The
 3 application shall include:

4 (a) The names of all eligible beginning teachers and administrators employed by the school dis-5 trict and a description of their assignments; and

6 (b) A description of the proposed mentorship program, which must provide frequent contact[, 7 *totaling a minimum of 90 hours*,] between the mentors and beginning teachers and administrators 8 throughout the school year.

9 (2) The school district shall certify in the application that no eligible beginning professional 10 educators are or may be under a conditional license, except as provided in rules of the Teacher 11 Standards and Practices Commission.

12 <u>SECTION 5.</u> This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 13 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect 14 on its passage.

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
