Senate Bill 343

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Repeals sunset provision related to authorized tribal police officers. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

- <u>SECTION 1.</u> Section 58, chapter 644, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 77, chapter
 644, Oregon Laws 2011, is repealed.

- 11 40.275. (1) As used in this section, "unit of government" means:
- 12 (a) The federal government or any state or political subdivision thereof; [or]
- 13 (b) A university that has commissioned police officers under ORS 352.383 or 353.125[.]; or

(c) A tribal government as defined in section 1, chapter 644, Oregon Laws 2011, if the
 information referred to in this section relates to or assists in an investigation conducted by

(2) A unit of government has a privilege to refuse to disclose the identity of a person who has furnished information relating to or assisting in an investigation of a possible violation of law to a law enforcement officer or member of a legislative committee or its staff conducting an investigation.

(3) The privilege created by this section may be claimed by an appropriate representative of theunit of government if the information was furnished to an officer thereof.

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(4) No privilege exists under this section:

(a) If the identity of the informer or the informer's interest in the subject matter of the communication has been disclosed to those who would have cause to resent the communication by a
holder of the privilege or by the informer's own action, or if the informer appears as a witness for
the unit of government.

(b) If it appears from the evidence in the case or from other showing by a party that an informer may be able to give testimony necessary to a fair determination of the issue of guilt or innocence in a criminal case or of a material issue on the merits in a civil case to which the unit of govern-

ment is a party, and the unit of government invokes the privilege, and the judge gives the unit of 1 2 government an opportunity to show in camera facts relevant to determining whether the informer can, in fact, supply that testimony. The showing will ordinarily be in the form of affidavits, but the 3 judge may direct that testimony be taken if the judge finds that the matter cannot be resolved sat-4 isfactorily upon affidavit. If the judge finds that there is a reasonable probability that the informer 5 can give the testimony, and the unit of government elects not to disclose identity of the informer, 6 the judge on motion of the defendant in a criminal case shall dismiss the charges to which the tes-7 timony would relate, and the judge may do so on the judge's own motion. In civil cases, the judge 8 9 may make any order that justice requires. Evidence submitted to the judge shall be sealed and preserved to be made available to the appellate court in the event of an appeal, and the contents shall 10 not otherwise be revealed without consent of the unit of government. All counsel and parties shall 11 12 be permitted to be present at every stage of proceedings under this paragraph except a showing in camera, at which no counsel or party shall be permitted to be present. 13

(c) If information from an informer is relied upon to establish the legality of the means by which 14 15 evidence was obtained and the judge is not satisfied that the information was received from an in-16 former reasonably believed to be reliable or credible. The judge may require the identity of the informer to be disclosed. The judge shall, on request of the unit of government, direct that the dis-17 18 closure be made in camera. All counsel and parties concerned with the issue of legality shall be 19 permitted to be present at every stage of proceedings under this paragraph except a disclosure in 20 camera, at which no counsel or party shall be permitted to be present. If disclosure of the identity 21of the informer is made in camera, the record thereof shall be sealed and preserved to be made 22available to the appellate court in the event of an appeal, and the contents shall not otherwise be 23revealed without consent of the unit of government.

drugs:

(10) In any court action regarding the removal of a tenant under this section, a group recovery home may present evidence that the tenant used or possessed alcohol or illegal drugs within seven days preceding the removal, whether or not the evidence was described in the notice required by subsection (3) of this section.

(11) This section does not prevent a group recovery home from terminating a tenancy as provided by any other provision of this chapter and evicting a tenant as provided in ORS 105.105 to

(2) For purposes of this section and ORS 133.736, a person is a party to an oral communication
if the oral communication is made in the person's immediate presence and is audible to the person

(3) An ex parte order for intercepting an oral communication in any county of this state under this section may be issued by any judge as defined in ORS 133.525 upon written application made upon oath or affirmation of the district attorney or a deputy district attorney authorized by the district attorney for the county in which the order is sought or upon the oath or affirmation of any peace officer as defined in ORS 133.005. The application shall include:

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1 (a) The name of the applicant and the applicant's authority to make the application;

2 (b) A statement demonstrating that there is probable cause to believe that a person whose oral 3 communication is to be intercepted is engaged in committing, has committed or is about to commit 4 a particular felony, or a misdemeanor under ORS 167.007 or 167.008, and that intercepting the oral 5 communication will yield evidence thereof; and

10 (5) Upon examination of the application and evidence, the judge may enter an ex parte order, 11 as requested or as modified, authorizing or approving the interception of an oral communication 12 within the state if the judge determines on the basis of the facts submitted by the applicant that:

(a) There is probable cause to believe that a person is engaged in committing, has committed
 or is about to commit a particular felony, or a misdemeanor under ORS 167.007 or 167.008; and

(b) There is probable cause to believe that the oral communication to be obtained will containevidence concerning that crime.

(6) An order authorizing or approving the interception of an oral communication under thissection must specify:

(a) The identity of the person, if known, whose oral communication is to be intercepted;

20 (b) A statement identifying the particular crime to which the oral communication is expected 21 to relate;

(c) The agency authorized under the order to intercept the oral communication;

23 (d) The name and office of the applicant and the signature and title of the issuing judge;

24 (e) A period of time after which the order shall expire; and

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(f) A statement that the order authorizes only the interception of an oral communication to which a law enforcement officer or a person under the direct supervision of a law enforcement officer is a party.

(7) An order under ORS 133.724 or this section is not required when a law enforcement officer intercepts an oral communication to which the officer or a person under the direct supervision of the officer is a party if the oral communication is made by a person whom the officer has probable cause to believe has committed, is engaged in committing or is about to commit:

(a) A crime punishable as a felony under ORS 475.752, 475.806 to 475.894 or 475.906 or as a
 misdemeanor under ORS 167.007 or 167.008; or

(b) Any other crime punishable as a felony if the circumstances at the time the oral communication is intercepted are of such exigency that it would be unreasonable to obtain a court order
under ORS 133.724 or this section.

(8) A law enforcement officer who intercepts an oral communication pursuant to this section may not intentionally fail to record and preserve the oral communication in its entirety. A law enforcement officer, or a person under the direct supervision of the officer, who is authorized under this section to intercept an oral communication is not required to exclude from the interception an oral communication made by a person for whom probable cause does not exist if the officer or the person under the officer's direct supervision is a party to the oral communication.

43 (9) A law enforcement officer may not divulge the contents of an oral communication intercepted
44 under this section before a preliminary hearing or trial in which an oral communication is going to
45 be introduced as evidence against a person except:
