

Senate Bill 374

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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Provides that certain judicial marshals who, before appointment as judicial marshals, were employed as "police officers," as defined for purposes of Public Employees Retirement System, qualify as police officers under system.

Provides that judicial marshal employed on effective date of Act with previous employment as police officer is entitled to service as police officer for all service performed as judicial marshal.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

2 Relating to judicial marshals; creating new provisions; amending ORS 1.177 and 238.005; and de-
3 claring an emergency.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 238.005, as amended by section 2, chapter 107, Oregon Laws 2014, is amended
6 to read:

7 238.005. For purposes of this chapter:

8 (1) "Active member" means a member who is presently employed by a participating public em-
9 ployer in a qualifying position and who has completed the six-month period of service required by
10 ORS 238.015.

11 (2) "Annuity" means payments for life derived from contributions made by a member as provided
12 in this chapter.

13 (3) "Board" means the Public Employees Retirement Board.

14 (4) "Calendar year" means 12 calendar months commencing on January 1 and ending on De-
15 cember 31 following.

16 (5) "Continuous service" means service not interrupted for more than five years, except that
17 such continuous service shall be computed without regard to interruptions in the case of:

18 (a) An employee who had returned to the service of the employer as of January 1, 1945, and
19 who remained in that employment until having established membership in the Public Employees
20 Retirement System.

21 (b) An employee who was in the armed services on January 1, 1945, and returned to the service
22 of the employer within one year of the date of being otherwise than dishonorably discharged and
23 remained in that employment until having established membership in the Public Employees Retire-
24 ment System.

25 (6) "Creditable service" means any period of time during which an active member is being paid
26 a salary by a participating public employer and for which benefits under this chapter are funded by
27 employer contributions and earnings on the fund. For purposes of computing years of "creditable
28 service," full months and major fractions of a month shall be considered to be one-twelfth of a year

1 and shall be added to all full years. "Creditable service" includes all retirement credit received by
2 a member.

3 (7) "Earliest service retirement age" means the age attained by a member when the member
4 could first make application for retirement under the provisions of ORS 238.280.

5 (8) "Employee" includes, in addition to employees, public officers, but does not include:

6 (a) Persons engaged as independent contractors.

7 (b) Seasonal, emergency or casual workers whose periods of employment with any public em-
8 ployer or public employers do not total 600 hours in any calendar year.

9 (c) Persons provided sheltered employment or made-work by a public employer in an employment
10 or industries program maintained for the benefit of such persons.

11 (d) Persons employed and paid from federal funds received under a federal program intended
12 primarily to alleviate unemployment. However, any such person shall be considered an "employee"
13 if not otherwise excluded by paragraphs (a) to (c) of this subsection and the public employer elects
14 to have the person so considered by an irrevocable written notice to the board.

15 (e) Persons who are employees of a railroad, as defined in ORS 824.020, and who, as such em-
16 ployees, are included in a retirement plan under federal railroad retirement statutes. This paragraph
17 shall be deemed to have been in effect since the inception of the system.

18 (9) "Final average salary" means whichever of the following is greater:

19 (a) The average salary per calendar year paid by one or more participating public employers to
20 an employee who is an active member of the system in three of the calendar years of membership
21 before the effective date of retirement of the employee, in which three years the employee was paid
22 the highest salary. The three calendar years in which the employee was paid the largest total salary
23 may include calendar years in which the employee was employed for less than a full calendar year.
24 If the number of calendar years of active membership before the effective date of retirement of the
25 employee is three or fewer, the final average salary for the employee is the average salary per cal-
26 endar year paid by one or more participating public employers to the employee in all of those years,
27 without regard to whether the employee was employed for the full calendar year.

28 (b) One-third of the total salary paid by a participating public employer to an employee who is
29 an active member of the system in the last 36 calendar months of active membership before the ef-
30 fective date of retirement of the employee.

31 (10) "Firefighter" does not include a volunteer firefighter, but does include:

32 (a) The State Fire Marshal, the chief deputy fire marshal and deputy state fire marshals; and

33 (b) An employee of the State Forestry Department who is certified by the State Forester as a
34 professional wildland firefighter and whose primary duties include the abatement of uncontrolled
35 fires as described in ORS 477.064.

36 (11) "Fiscal year" means 12 calendar months commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 fol-
37 lowing.

38 (12) "Fund" means the Public Employees Retirement Fund.

39 (13) "Inactive member" means a member who is not employed in a qualifying position, whose
40 membership has not been terminated in the manner described by ORS 238.095 and who is not retired
41 for service or disability.

42 (14) "Institution of higher education" means a public university listed in ORS 352.002, the
43 Oregon Health and Science University and a community college, as defined in ORS 341.005.

44 (15) "Member" means a person who has established membership in the system and whose mem-
45 bership has not been terminated as described in ORS 238.095. "Member" includes active, inactive

1 and retired members.

2 (16) "Member account" means the regular account and the variable account.

3 (17) "Normal retirement age" means:

4 (a) For a person who establishes membership in the system before January 1, 1996, as described
5 in ORS 238.430, 55 years of age if the employee retires at that age as a police officer or firefighter
6 or 58 years of age if the employee retires at that age as other than a police officer or firefighter.

7 (b) For a person who establishes membership in the system on or after January 1, 1996, as de-
8 scribed in ORS 238.430, 55 years of age if the employee retires at that age as a police officer or
9 firefighter or 60 years of age if the employee retires at that age as other than a police officer or
10 firefighter.

11 (18) "Pension" means annual payments for life derived from contributions by one or more public
12 employers.

13 (19) "Police officer" includes:

14 (a) Employees of institutions defined in ORS 421.005 as Department of Corrections institutions
15 whose duties, as assigned by the Director of the Department of Corrections, include the custody of
16 persons committed to the custody of or transferred to the Department of Corrections and employees
17 of the Department of Corrections who were classified as police officers on or before July 27, 1989,
18 whether or not such classification was authorized by law.

19 (b) Employees of the Department of State Police who are classified as police officers by the
20 Superintendent of State Police.

21 (c) Employees of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission who are classified as liquor enforce-
22 ment inspectors by the administrator of the commission.

23 (d) Sheriffs and those deputy sheriffs or other employees of a sheriff whose duties, as classified
24 by the sheriff, are the regular duties of police officers or corrections officers.

25 (e) Police chiefs and police personnel of a city who are classified as police officers by the
26 council or other governing body of the city.

27 (f) Police officers who are commissioned by a university under ORS 352.383 or 353.125 and who
28 are classified as police officers by the university.

29 (g) Parole and probation officers employed by the Department of Corrections, parole and pro-
30 bation officers who are transferred to county employment under ORS 423.549 and adult parole and
31 probation officers, as defined in ORS 181.610, who are classified as police officers for the purposes
32 of this chapter by the county governing body. If a county classifies adult parole and probation offi-
33 cers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter, and the employees so classified are repres-
34 ented by a labor organization, any proposal by the county to change that classification or to cease
35 to classify adult parole and probation officers as police officers for the purposes of this chapter is
36 a mandatory subject of bargaining.

37 (h) Police officers appointed under ORS 276.021 or 276.023.

38 (i) Employees of the Port of Portland who are classified as airport police by the Board of Com-
39 missioners of the Port of Portland.

40 (j) Employees of the State Department of Agriculture who are classified as livestock police of-
41 ficers by the Director of Agriculture.

42 (k) Employees of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training who are classified by
43 the department as other than secretarial or clerical personnel.

44 (L) Investigators of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice.

45 (m) Corrections officers as defined in ORS 181.610.

1 (n) Employees of the Oregon State Lottery Commission who are classified by the Director of the
2 Oregon State Lottery as enforcement agents pursuant to ORS 461.110.

3 (o) The Director of the Department of Corrections.

4 (p) An employee who for seven consecutive years has been classified as a police officer as de-
5 fined by this section, and who is employed or transferred by the Department of Corrections to fill
6 a position designated by the Director of the Department of Corrections as being eligible for police
7 officer status.

8 (q) An employee of the Department of Corrections classified as a police officer on or prior to
9 July 27, 1989, whether or not that classification was authorized by law, as long as the employee
10 remains in the position held on July 27, 1989. The initial classification of an employee under a sys-
11 tem implemented pursuant to ORS 240.190 does not affect police officer status.

12 (r) Employees of a school district who are appointed and duly sworn members of a law
13 enforcement agency of the district as provided in ORS 332.531 or otherwise employed full-time as
14 police officers commissioned by the district.

15 (s) Employees at youth correction facilities and juvenile detention facilities under ORS 419A.050,
16 419A.052 and 420.005 to 420.915 who are required to hold valid Oregon teaching licenses and who
17 have supervisory, control or teaching responsibilities over juveniles committed to the custody of the
18 Department of Corrections or the Oregon Youth Authority.

19 (t) Employees at youth correction facilities as defined in ORS 420.005 whose primary job de-
20 scription involves the custody, control, treatment, investigation or supervision of juveniles placed
21 in such facilities.

22 (u) Employees of the Oregon Youth Authority who are classified as juvenile parole and pro-
23 bation officers.

24 **(v) Employees appointed as judicial marshals under ORS 1.177 whose last qualifying po-
25 sition before being appointed as a judicial marshal was as a police officer.**

26 (20) "Prior service credit" means credit provided under ORS 238.442 or under ORS 238.225 (2)
27 to (6) (1999 Edition).

28 (21) "Public employer" means the state, one of its agencies, any city, county, or municipal or
29 public corporation, any political subdivision of the state or any instrumentality thereof, or an agency
30 created by one or more such governmental organizations to provide governmental services. For
31 purposes of this chapter, such agency created by one or more governmental organizations is a gov-
32 ernmental instrumentality and a legal entity with power to enter into contracts, hold property and
33 sue and be sued.

34 (22) "Qualifying position" means one or more jobs with one or more participating public em-
35 ployers in which an employee performs 600 or more hours of service in a calendar year, excluding
36 any service in a job for which a participating public employer does not provide benefits under this
37 chapter pursuant to an application made under ORS 238.035.

38 (23) "Regular account" means the account established for each active and inactive member un-
39 der ORS 238.250.

40 (24) "Retired member" means a member who is retired for service or disability.

41 (25) "Retirement credit" means a period of time that is treated as creditable service for the
42 purposes of this chapter.

43 (26)(a) "Salary" means the remuneration paid an employee in cash out of the funds of a public
44 employer in return for services to the employer, plus the monetary value, as determined by the
45 Public Employees Retirement Board, of whatever living quarters, board, lodging, fuel, laundry and

1 other advantages the employer furnishes the employee in return for services.

2 (b) "Salary" includes but is not limited to:

3 (A) Payments of employee and employer money into a deferred compensation plan, which are
4 deemed salary paid in each month of deferral;

5 (B) The amount of participation in a tax-sheltered or deferred annuity, which is deemed salary
6 paid in each month of participation;

7 (C) Retroactive payments described in ORS 238.008; and

8 (D) Wages of a deceased member paid to a surviving spouse or dependent children under ORS
9 652.190.

10 (c) "Salary" or "other advantages" does not include:

11 (A) Travel or any other expenses incidental to employer's business which is reimbursed by the
12 employer;

13 (B) Payments for insurance coverage by an employer on behalf of employee or employee and
14 dependents, for which the employee has no cash option;

15 (C) Payments made on account of an employee's death;

16 (D) Any lump sum payment for accumulated unused sick leave;

17 (E) Any accelerated payment of an employment contract for a future period or an advance
18 against future wages;

19 (F) Any retirement incentive, retirement severance pay, retirement bonus or retirement
20 gratuitous payment;

21 (G) Payments for periods of leave of absence after the date the employer and employee have
22 agreed that no future services qualifying pursuant to ORS 238.015 (3) will be performed, except for
23 sick leave and vacation;

24 (H) Payments for instructional services rendered to public universities listed in ORS 352.002 or
25 the Oregon Health and Science University when such services are in excess of full-time employment
26 subject to this chapter. A person employed under a contract for less than 12 months is subject to
27 this subparagraph only for the months to which the contract pertains; or

28 (I) Payments made by an employer for insurance coverage provided to a domestic partner of an
29 employee.

30 (27) "School year" means the period beginning July 1 and ending June 30 next following.

31 (28) "System" means the Public Employees Retirement System.

32 (29) "Variable account" means the account established for a member who participates in the
33 Variable Annuity Account under ORS 238.260.

34 (30) "Vested" means being an active member of the system in each of five calendar years.

35 (31) "Volunteer firefighter" means a firefighter whose position normally requires less than 600
36 hours of service per year.

37 **SECTION 2.** ORS 1.177 is amended to read:

38 1.177. (1) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court may adopt state standards, and a state plan,
39 for:

40 (a) State court security, emergency preparedness and business continuity for facilities used by
41 the judges or staff of a court operating under the Judicial Department or the staff of the office of
42 the State Court Administrator; and

43 (b) The physical security of the judges or staff of a court operating under the Judicial Depart-
44 ment or the staff of the office of the State Court Administrator.

45 (2)(a) The Chief Justice may appoint a Chief Judicial Marshal and other deputy judicial marshals

1 charged with:

2 (A) Implementing a state plan adopted under subsection (1) of this section;

3 (B) Ensuring the physical security and safety of judges of a court operating under the Judicial
4 Department;

5 (C) Ensuring the physical security and safety of the staff of a court operating under the Judicial
6 Department, the staff of the office of the State Court Administrator and the public in and around
7 court facilities as defined in ORS 166.360; and

8 (D) Ensuring the security of the real and personal property owned, controlled, occupied or used
9 by the Judicial Department.

10 (b) Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are subject to the personnel rules
11 and policies established by the Chief Justice under ORS 1.002.

12 (c) When appointed and duly sworn by the Chief Justice, judicial marshals appointed under this
13 section who are trained pursuant to ORS 181.647 have the authority given to peace officers of this
14 state for the purposes of carrying out the duties of their employment.

15 (d) The Chief Justice may define the duties of judicial marshals appointed under this section.

16 (e) Judicial marshals granted the authority of a peace officer under this section who detain any
17 person in accordance with the marshal's duties retain the authority until the law enforcement
18 agency having general jurisdiction over the area in which the person is detained assumes responsi-
19 bility for the person.

20 *[(f) Persons appointed as judicial marshals under this section are not police officers for purposes*
21 *of the Public Employees Retirement System.]*

22 (3) Except as provided in this subsection, a plan adopted under this section and all documents
23 related to development of the plan are confidential and need not be disclosed under the provisions
24 of ORS 192.410 to 192.505. The Chief Justice may authorize the disclosure of all or part of a plan
25 prepared under this section if the Chief Justice determines that the interest of the public would be
26 served by the disclosure and that the disclosure will not impair the integrity of the plan. Records
27 of expenditures for a plan adopted under this section and records of equipment purchased under the
28 plan are not confidential under the provisions of this subsection, and are subject to disclosure as
29 public records under the provisions of ORS 192.410 to 192.505.

30 **SECTION 3. (1) The amendments to ORS 238.005 by section 1 of this 2015 Act apply only**
31 **to a person who:**

32 (a) **Is employed as a judicial marshal under ORS 1.177 on the effective date of this 2015**
33 **Act and meets the requirements of ORS 238.005 (19)(v); or**

34 (b) **Becomes employed as a judicial marshal under ORS 1.177 after the effective date of**
35 **this 2015 Act and meets the requirements of ORS 238.005 (19)(v).**

36 (2) **Any person who is employed as a judicial marshal under ORS 1.177 on the effective**
37 **date of this 2015 Act and meets the requirements of ORS 238.005 (19)(v) is entitled to service**
38 **in the Public Employees Retirement System as a police officer for all service performed as**
39 **a judicial marshal under ORS 1.177, whether performed before, on or after the effective date**
40 **of this 2015 Act.**

41 **SECTION 4. This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
42 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect**
43 **on its passage.**
