SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Requires private person to complete transfer of firearm by appearing with transferee before gun dealer to request criminal background check **or shipping or delivering firearm to gun dealer in certain circumstances**. Specifies exceptions for family members, law enforcement, inherited firearms and certain temporary transfers. Punishes violation by maximum of one year's imprisonment, \$6,250 fine, or both, or maximum of 10 years' imprisonment, \$250,000 fine, or both, for second or subsequent offense.

[Requires] **Authorizes** Department of State Police to notify *[local]* **appropriate** law enforcement agency when, during criminal background check performed prior to transfer of firearm, department determines that recipient is prohibited from possessing firearm.

Authorizes court to prohibit person ordered to participate in assisted outpatient treatment from purchasing or possessing firearm during period of treatment if certain criteria are met.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

5 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

6 **SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2015 Act and the amendments to ORS 166.250, 166.291,**
7 **166.412, 166.422, 166.432, 166.433, 166.434, 166.436, 166.438, 166.460, 166.470, 181.150, 181.740 and**
8 **426.133 by sections 3 to 19 of this 2015 Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Oregon**
9 **Firearms Safety Act."**

10 **SECTION 2. (1) As used in this section:**

11 (a) **"Transfer" means the delivery of a firearm from a transferor to a transferee, in-**
12 **cluding, but not limited to, the sale, gift, loan or lease of the firearm. "Transfer" does not**
13 **include the temporary provision of a firearm to a transferee if the transferor has no reason**
14 **to believe the transferee is prohibited from possessing a firearm or intends to use the**
15 **firearm in the commission of a crime, and the provision occurs:**

16 (A) **At a shooting range, shooting gallery or other area designed for the purpose of target**
17 **shooting, for use during target practice, a firearms safety or training course or class or a**
18 **similar lawful activity;**

19 (B) **For the purpose of hunting, trapping or target shooting, during the time in which the**
20 **transferee is engaged in activities related to hunting, trapping or target shooting;**

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter *[italic and bracketed]* is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (C) Under circumstances in which the transferee and the firearm are in the presence of
2 the transferor;

3 (D) To a transferee who is in the business of repairing firearms, for the time during
4 which the firearm is being repaired;

5 (E) To a transferee who is in the business of making or repairing custom accessories for
6 firearms, for the time during which the accessories are being made or repaired; or

7 (F) For the purpose of preventing imminent death or serious physical injury, and the
8 provision lasts only as long as is necessary to prevent the death or serious physical injury.

9 (b) "Transferee" means a person who is not a gun dealer or licensed as a manufacturer
10 or importer under 18 U.S.C. 923 and who intends to receive a firearm from a transferor.

11 (c) "Transferor" means a person who is not a gun dealer or licensed as a manufacturer
12 or importer under 18 U.S.C. 923 and who intends to deliver a firearm to a transferee.

13 (2) Except as provided in ORS 166.436 and 166.438 and subsection (4) of this section, a
14 transferor may not transfer a firearm to a transferee unless the transfer is completed
15 through a gun dealer as described in subsection (3) of this section.

16 (3)(a) A transferor may transfer a firearm to a transferee only as provided in this sec-
17 tion. Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, prior to the transfer both the
18 transferor and the transferee must appear in person before a gun dealer, with the firearm,
19 and request that the gun dealer perform a criminal background check on the transferee.

20 (b) If the transferor and the transferee reside over 40 miles from each other, the
21 transferor may ship or deliver the firearm to a gun dealer located near the transferee or a
22 gun dealer designated by the transferee, and the transferor need not appear before the gun
23 dealer in person.

24 (c) A gun dealer who agrees to complete a transfer of a firearm under this section shall
25 request a criminal history record check on the transferee as described in ORS 166.412 and
26 shall comply with all requirements of federal law.

27 (d) If, upon completion of a criminal background check, the gun dealer:

28 (A) Receives a unique approval number from the Department of State Police indicating
29 that the transferee is qualified to complete the transfer, the gun dealer shall notify the
30 transferor, enter the firearm into the gun dealer's inventory and transfer the firearm to the
31 transferee.

32 (B) Receives notification that the transferee is prohibited by state or federal law from
33 possessing or receiving the firearm, the gun dealer shall notify the transferor and neither
34 the transferor nor the gun dealer shall transfer the firearm to the transferee. If the
35 transferor shipped or delivered the firearm to the gun dealer pursuant to paragraph (b) of
36 this subsection, the gun dealer shall comply with federal law when returning the firearm to
37 the transferor.

38 (e) A gun dealer may charge a reasonable fee for facilitating a firearm transfer pursuant
39 to this section.

40 (4) The requirements of subsections (2) and (3) of this section do not apply to:

41 (a) The transfer of a firearm by or to a law enforcement agency, or by or to a law
42 enforcement officer, private security professional or member of the Armed Forces of the
43 United States, while that person is acting within the scope of official duties.

44 (b) The transfer of a firearm as part of a firearm turn-in or buyback event, in which a
45 law enforcement agency receives or purchases firearms from members of the public.

- 1 (c) **The transfer of a firearm to:**
- 2 (A) **A transferor's spouse or domestic partner;**
- 3 (B) **A transferor's parent or stepparent;**
- 4 (C) **A transferor's child or stepchild;**
- 5 (D) **A transferor's sibling;**
- 6 (E) **A transferor's grandparent;**
- 7 (F) **A transferor's grandchild;**
- 8 (G) **A transferor's aunt or uncle;**
- 9 (H) **A transferor's first cousin;**
- 10 (I) **A transferor's niece or nephew; or**
- 11 (J) **The spouse or domestic partner of a person specified in subparagraphs (B) to (I) of**
- 12 **this paragraph.**

13 (d) **The transfer of a firearm that occurs because of the death of the firearm owner,**
14 **provided that:**

15 (A) **The transfer is conducted or facilitated by a personal representative, as defined in**
16 **ORS 111.005, or a trustee of a trust created in a will; and**

17 (B) **The transferee is related to the deceased firearm owner in a manner specified in**
18 **paragraph (c) of this subsection.**

19 (5)(a) **A transferor who fails to comply with the requirements of this section commits a**
20 **Class A misdemeanor.**

21 (b) **Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, a transferor who fails to comply**
22 **with the requirements of this section commits a Class B felony if the transferor has a pre-**
23 **vious conviction under this section at the time of the offense.**

24 **SECTION 3.** ORS 166.436 is amended to read:

25 166.436. (1) The Department of State Police shall make the telephone number established under
26 ORS 166.412 (5) available for requests **for criminal background checks under this section** from
27 persons [*other than*] **who are not gun dealers and who are transferring firearms at gun shows**
28 [*for criminal background checks under this section*].

29 (2) Prior to transferring a firearm **at a gun show**, a transferor [*other than*] **who is not** a gun
30 dealer may request by telephone that the department conduct a criminal background check on the
31 recipient and shall provide the following information to the department:

- 32 (a) The name, address and telephone number of the transferor;
- 33 (b) The make, model, caliber and manufacturer's number of the firearm being transferred;
- 34 (c) The name, date of birth, race, sex and address of the recipient;
- 35 (d) The Social Security number of the recipient if the recipient voluntarily provides that number;
- 36 (e) The address of the place where the transfer is occurring; and
- 37 (f) The type, issuer and identification number of a current piece of identification bearing a re-
- 38 cent photograph of the recipient presented by the recipient. The identification presented by the re-
- 39 cipient must meet the requirements of ORS 166.412 (4)(a).

40 (3)(a) Upon receipt of a request for a criminal background check under this section, the de-

41 partment shall immediately, during the telephone call or by return call:

42 (A) Determine from criminal records and other information available to it whether the recipient
43 is disqualified under ORS 166.470 from completing the transfer or is otherwise prohibited by state
44 or federal law from possessing a firearm; and

45 (B) Notify the transferor when a recipient is disqualified from completing the transfer or provide

1 the transferor with a unique approval number indicating that the recipient is qualified to complete
2 the transfer. The unique approval number is a permit valid for 24 hours for the requested transfer.
3 If the firearm is not transferred from the transferor to the recipient within 24 hours after receipt
4 of the unique approval number, a new request must be made by the transferor.

5 (b) If the department is unable to determine whether the recipient is qualified for or disqualified
6 from completing the transfer within 30 minutes of receiving the request, the department shall notify
7 the transferor and provide the transferor with an estimate of the time when the department will
8 provide the requested information.

9 (4) A public employee or public agency incurs no criminal or civil liability for performing the
10 criminal background checks required by this section, provided the employee or agency acts in good
11 faith and without malice.

12 (5)(a) The department may retain a record of the information obtained during a request for a
13 criminal background check under this section for the period of time provided in ORS 166.412 (7).

14 (b) The record of the information obtained during a request for a criminal background check
15 under this section is exempt from disclosure under public records law.

16 (c) **If the department determines that a recipient is prohibited from possessing a firearm
17 under ORS 166.250 (1)(c), as soon as practicable, the department may report the attempted
18 transfer and the recipient's name to the appropriate law enforcement agency.**

19 (6) The recipient of the firearm must be present when the transferor requests a criminal back-
20 ground check under this section.

21 (7)(a) Except as otherwise provided in [paragraphs (b) and (c)] **paragraph (b)** of this subsection,
22 a transferor who receives notification under this section that the recipient is qualified to complete
23 the transfer of a firearm, **has the recipient fill out the form required by ORS 166.438 (1)(a) and
24 retains the form as required by ORS 166.438 (2)** is immune from civil liability for any use of the
25 firearm from the time of the transfer unless the transferor knows, or reasonably should know, that
26 the recipient is likely to commit an unlawful act involving the firearm.

27 *[(b) If the transferor is required to request a criminal background check under ORS 166.438, the
28 immunity provided by paragraph (a) of this subsection applies only if, in addition to receiving the no-
29 tification required by this section, the transferor has the recipient fill out the form required by ORS
30 166.438 (1)(a) and retains the form as required by ORS 166.438 (2).]*

31 [(c)] **(b)** The immunity provided by paragraph (a) of this subsection does not apply:

32 (A) If the transferor knows, or reasonably should know, that the recipient of the firearm intends
33 to deliver the firearm to a third person who the transferor knows, or reasonably should know, may
34 not lawfully possess the firearm; or

35 (B) In any product liability civil action under ORS 30.900 to 30.920.

36 **SECTION 4.** ORS 166.412 is amended to read:

37 166.412. (1) As used in this section:

38 (a) "Antique firearm" has the meaning given that term in 18 U.S.C. 921;

39 (b) "Department" means the Department of State Police;

40 (c) "Firearm" has the meaning given that term in ORS 166.210, except that it does not include
41 an antique firearm;

42 (d) "Firearms transaction record" means the firearms transaction record required by 18 U.S.C.
43 921 to 929;

44 (e) "Firearms transaction thumbprint form" means a form provided by the department under
45 subsection (11) of this section;

1 (f) "Gun dealer" means a person engaged in the business, as defined in 18 U.S.C. 921, of selling,
2 leasing or otherwise transferring a firearm, whether the person is a retail dealer, pawnbroker or
3 otherwise;

4 (g) "Handgun" has the meaning given that term in ORS 166.210; and

5 (h) "Purchaser" means a person who buys, leases or otherwise receives a firearm from a gun
6 dealer.

7 (2) Except as provided in subsections (3)(c) and (12) of this section, a gun dealer shall comply
8 with the following before a handgun is delivered to a purchaser:

9 (a) The purchaser shall present to the dealer current identification meeting the requirements
10 of subsection (4) of this section.

11 (b) The gun dealer shall complete the firearms transaction record and obtain the signature of
12 the purchaser on the record.

13 (c) The gun dealer shall obtain the thumbprints of the purchaser on the firearms transaction
14 thumbprint form and attach the form to the gun dealer's copy of the firearms transaction record to
15 be filed with that copy.

16 (d) The gun dealer shall request by telephone that the department conduct a criminal history
17 record check on the purchaser and shall provide the following information to the department:

18 (A) The federal firearms license number of the gun dealer;

19 (B) The business name of the gun dealer;

20 (C) The place of transfer;

21 (D) The name of the person making the transfer;

22 (E) The make, model, caliber and manufacturer's number of the handgun being transferred;

23 (F) The name and date of birth of the purchaser;

24 (G) The Social Security number of the purchaser if the purchaser voluntarily provides this
25 number to the gun dealer; and

26 (H) The type, issuer and identification number of the identification presented by the purchaser.

27 (e) The gun dealer shall receive a unique approval number for the transfer from the department
28 and record the approval number on the firearms transaction record and on the firearms transaction
29 thumbprint form.

30 (f) The gun dealer may destroy the firearms transaction thumbprint form five years after the
31 completion of the firearms transaction thumbprint form.

32 (3)(a) Upon receipt of a request of the gun dealer for a criminal history record check, the de-
33 partment shall immediately, during the gun dealer's telephone call or by return call:

34 (A) Determine, from criminal records and other information available to it, whether the pur-
35 chaser is disqualified under ORS 166.470 from completing the purchase; and

36 (B) Notify the dealer when a purchaser is disqualified from completing the transfer or provide
37 the dealer with a unique approval number indicating that the purchaser is qualified to complete the
38 transfer.

39 (b) If the department is unable to determine if the purchaser is qualified or disqualified from
40 completing the transfer within 30 minutes, the department shall notify the dealer and provide the
41 dealer with an estimate of the time when the department will provide the requested information.

42 (c) If the department fails to provide a unique approval number to a gun dealer or to notify the
43 gun dealer that the purchaser is disqualified under paragraph (a) of this subsection before the close
44 of the gun dealer's next business day following the request by the dealer for a criminal history re-
45 cord check, the dealer may deliver the handgun to the purchaser.

1 (4)(a) Identification required of the purchaser under subsection (2) of this section shall include
2 one piece of current identification bearing a photograph and the date of birth of the purchaser that:

3 (A) Is issued under the authority of the United States Government, a state, a political subdivi-
4 sion of a state, a foreign government, a political subdivision of a foreign government, an interna-
5 tional governmental organization or an international quasi-governmental organization; and

6 (B) Is intended to be used for identification of an individual or is commonly accepted for the
7 purpose of identification of an individual.

8 (b) If the identification presented by the purchaser under paragraph (a) of this subsection does
9 not include the current address of the purchaser, the purchaser shall present a second piece of
10 current identification that contains the current address of the purchaser. The Superintendent of
11 State Police may specify by rule the type of identification that may be presented under this para-
12 graph.

13 (c) The department may require that the dealer verify the identification of the purchaser if that
14 identity is in question by sending the thumbprints of the purchaser to the department.

15 (5) The department shall establish a telephone number that shall be operational seven days a
16 week between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. for the purpose of responding to inquiries from
17 dealers for a criminal history record check under this section.

18 (6) No public employee, official or agency shall be held criminally or civilly liable for performing
19 the investigations required by this section provided the employee, official or agency acts in good
20 faith and without malice.

21 (7)(a) The department may retain a record of the information obtained during a request for a
22 criminal [*records*] **history record** check for no more than five years.

23 (b) The record of the information obtained during a request for a criminal [*records*] **history**
24 **record** check by a gun dealer is exempt from disclosure under public records law.

25 (c) **If the department determines that a purchaser is prohibited from possessing a**
26 **firearm under ORS 166.250 (1)(c), as soon as practicable, the department may report the at-**
27 **tempted transfer and the purchaser's name to the appropriate law enforcement agency.**

28 (8) A law enforcement agency may inspect the records of a gun dealer relating to transfers of
29 handguns with the consent of a gun dealer in the course of a reasonable inquiry during a criminal
30 investigation or under the authority of a properly authorized subpoena or search warrant.

31 (9) When a handgun is delivered, it shall be unloaded.

32 (10) In accordance with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the Superintendent of State
33 Police may adopt rules necessary for:

34 (a) The design of the firearms transaction thumbprint form;

35 (b) The maintenance of a procedure to correct errors in the criminal records of the department;

36 (c) The provision of a security system to identify dealers who request a criminal history record
37 check under subsection (2) of this section; and

38 (d) The creation and maintenance of a database of the business hours of gun dealers.

39 (11) The department shall publish the firearms transaction thumbprint form and shall furnish the
40 form to gun dealers on application at cost.

41 (12) This section does not apply to transactions between persons licensed as dealers under 18
42 U.S.C. 923.

43 (13)(a) **If requested by a transferor who is not a gun dealer, a gun dealer may request a**
44 **criminal background check pursuant to ORS 166.438 or section 2 of this 2015 Act and may**
45 **charge a reasonable fee for providing the service.**

1 **(b) A gun dealer that requests a criminal background check under this subsection is**
2 **immune from civil liability for any use of the firearm by the recipient or transferee, provided**
3 **that the gun dealer requests the criminal background check as described in this section.**

4 **SECTION 5.** ORS 166.422 is amended to read:

5 166.422. Where appropriate, a person may enforce the legal duties imposed by ORS 166.412
6 (7)(a) or (b), by the provisions of ORS 30.260 to 30.300 and ORS chapter 183.

7 **SECTION 6.** ORS 166.432 is amended to read:

8 166.432. (1) As used in ORS 166.412, 166.433, 166.434, 166.436 and 166.438 **and section 2 of this**
9 **2015 Act**, “criminal background check” or “criminal history record check” means determining the
10 eligibility of a person to purchase or possess a firearm by reviewing state and federal databases
11 including, but not limited to, the:

- 12 (a) Oregon computerized criminal history system;
- 13 (b) Oregon mental health data system;
- 14 (c) Law Enforcement Data System;
- 15 (d) National Instant Criminal Background Check System; and
- 16 (e) Stolen guns system.

17 (2) As used in ORS 166.433, 166.434, 166.436, 166.438 and 166.441 **and section 2 of this 2015**
18 **Act:**

19 (a) “Gun dealer” has the meaning given that term in ORS 166.412.

20 (b) “Gun show” means an event at which more than 25 firearms are on site and available for
21 transfer.

22 **SECTION 7.** ORS 166.433 is amended to read:

23 166.433. The people of this state find that:

24 (1) The laws of Oregon regulating the sale of firearms contain a loophole that allows people
25 other than gun dealers to sell firearms at gun shows without first conducting criminal background
26 checks; **and**

27 (2) It is necessary for the safety of the people of Oregon that any person who transfers a firearm
28 at a gun show be required to request a criminal background check before completing the transfer
29 of the firearm.[: and]

30 [(3) *It is in the best interests of the people of Oregon that any person who transfers a firearm at*
31 *any location other than a gun show be allowed to voluntarily request a criminal background check*
32 *before completing the transfer of the firearm.*]

33 **SECTION 8.** ORS 166.434 is amended to read:

34 166.434. (1) Notwithstanding the fact that ORS 166.412 requires a gun dealer to request a crim-
35 inal history record check only when transferring a handgun, a gun dealer shall comply with the
36 requirements of ORS 166.412 before transferring any firearm to a purchaser. The provisions of ORS
37 166.412 apply to the transfer of firearms other than handguns to the same extent that they apply to
38 the transfer of handguns.

39 (2) In addition to the determination required by ORS 166.412 (3)(a)(A), in conducting a criminal
40 background check or criminal history record check, the Department of State Police shall also de-
41 termine whether the recipient is otherwise prohibited by state or federal law from possessing a
42 firearm.

43 (3) Notwithstanding ORS 166.412 (5), the department is not required to operate the telephone
44 number established under ORS 166.412 (5) on Thanksgiving Day or Christmas Day.

45 (4)(a) The department may charge a fee, not to exceed the amount authorized under ORS 166.414,

1 for criminal background checks required under this section or ORS 166.436 **or section 2 of this**
2 **2015 Act.**

3 (b) The department shall establish a reduced fee for subsequent criminal background checks on
4 the same recipient that are performed during the same day between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 p.m.

5 **SECTION 9.** ORS 166.438 is amended to read:

6 166.438. (1) A transferor [*other than*] **who is not** a gun dealer may not transfer a firearm at a
7 gun show unless the transferor:

8 (a)(A) Requests a criminal background check under ORS 166.436 prior to completing the trans-
9 fer;

10 (B) Receives [*notification*] **a unique approval number from the Department of State Police**
11 **indicating** that the recipient is qualified to complete the transfer; and

12 (C) Has the recipient complete the form described in ORS 166.441; or

13 (b) Completes the transfer through a gun dealer.

14 (2) The transferor shall retain the completed form referred to in subsection (1) of this section
15 for at least five years and shall make the completed form available to law enforcement agencies for
16 the purpose of criminal investigations.

17 (3) A person who organizes a gun show shall post in a prominent place at the gun show a notice
18 explaining the requirements of subsections (1) and (2) of this section. The person shall provide the
19 form required by subsection (1) of this section to any person transferring a firearm at the gun show.

20 (4) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply if the transferee is licensed as a dealer under
21 18 U.S.C. 923.

22 (5)(a) Failure to comply with the requirements of subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section is a
23 Class A misdemeanor.

25 of subsection (1), (2) or (3) of this section is a Class C felony if the person has two or more previous
26 convictions under this section.

27 (6) It is an affirmative defense to a charge of violating subsection (1) or (3) of this section that
28 the person did not know, or reasonably could not know, that more than 25 firearms were at the site
29 and available for transfer.

30 **SECTION 10.** ORS 181.150 is amended to read:

31 181.150. (1) The State of Oregon shall provide the members of the state police with emergency
32 outfits, weapons and motor vehicles and all other emergency and first-aid supplies and equipment
33 necessary to carry out the public safety functions of the Department of State Police.

34 (2)(a) The property described in subsection (1) of this section remains the property of this state
35 with the exception of a retiring or deceased officer's department-issued service weapon, which may
36 be sold by the department to the officer or, in the case of a deceased officer, to a member of the
37 officer's family, upon the officer's retirement or death, and the officer's badge, which may be given
38 to the officer or, in the case of a deceased officer, to a member of the deceased officer's family, upon
39 the officer's retirement or death.

40 (b) A service weapon sold pursuant to this subsection must be sold for its fair market value.

41 (c) A badge given to an officer or an officer's family member pursuant to this subsection must
42 be marked to indicate the officer's retirement status and may not be used for official police iden-
43 tification other than as a memento of service to the department.

44 (3) Surplus, obsolete or unused property, supplies or equipment must be disposed of by the
45 Oregon Department of Administrative Services as provided in ORS 279A.280.

1 (4)(a) For purposes of ORS chapters 279A and 279B, the sale of a service weapon to a retiring
2 officer by the department is not a public contract and is not subject to the competitive bidding re-
3 quirements of ORS chapters 279A and 279B.

4 (b) The provisions of ORS 166.412 **and section 2 of this 2015 Act** do not apply to transfers of
5 firearms pursuant to this section.

6 **SECTION 11.** ORS 426.133 is amended to read:

7 426.133. (1) As used in ORS 426.005 to 426.390, “assisted outpatient treatment” may not be con-
8 strued to be a commitment under ORS 426.130 and does not include taking a person into custody
9 or the forced medication of a person.

10 (2) A court may issue an order requiring a person to participate in assisted outpatient treatment
11 if the court finds that the person:

12 (a)(A) Is 18 years of age or older;

13 (B) Has a mental disorder;

14 (C) Will not obtain treatment in the community voluntarily; and

15 (D) Is unable to make an informed decision to seek or to comply with voluntary treatment; and

15 **(p) Is not presently subject to an order under ORS 426.133 prohibiting the person from**

17 (2) A person who has been granted relief under ORS 166.274 or 166.293 or 18 U.S.C. 925(c) or
18 has had the person's record expunged under the laws of this state or equivalent laws of other ju-
19 risdictions is not subject to the disabilities in subsection (1)(g) to (L) of this section.

20 (3) Before the sheriff may issue a license:

21 (a) The application must state the applicant's legal name, current address and telephone number,
22 date and place of birth, hair and eye color and height and weight. The application must also list the
23 applicant's residence address or addresses for the previous three years. The application must contain
24 a statement by the applicant that the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1) of this
25 section. The application may include the Social Security number of the applicant if the applicant
26 voluntarily provides this number. The application must be signed by the applicant.

27 (b) The applicant must submit to fingerprinting and photographing by the sheriff. The sheriff
28 shall fingerprint and photograph the applicant and shall conduct any investigation necessary to
29 corroborate the requirements listed under subsection (1) of this section. If a nationwide criminal
30 records check is necessary, the sheriff shall request the Department of State Police to conduct the
31 check, including fingerprint identification, through the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The Federal
32 Bureau of Investigation shall return the fingerprint cards used to conduct the criminal records
33 check and may not keep any record of the fingerprints. The Department of State Police shall report
34 the results of the fingerprint-based criminal records check to the sheriff. The Department of State
35 Police shall also furnish the sheriff with any information about the applicant that the Department
36 of State Police may have in its possession including, but not limited to, manual or computerized
37 criminal offender information.

38 (4) Application forms for concealed handgun licenses shall be supplied by the sheriff upon re-
39 quest. The forms shall be uniform throughout this state in substantially the following form:
