## Senate Bill 99

Sponsored by Senator THATCHER (at the request of Gene McIntyre) (Presession filed.)

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Abolishes daylight saving time on January 1, 2021. Directs Legislative Counsel to report to Senate and House Committees on Judiciary if Washington or California passes similar legislation. Refers Act to people for their approval or rejection at next regular general election.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to standards of time; creating new provisions; amending ORS 187.110; and providing that this Act shall be referred to the people for their approval or rejection.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

**SECTION 1.** ORS 187.110 is amended to read:

187.110. (1) The standard of time for the State of Oregon shall be the United States standard of time as established by the Congress of the United States for any particular area of the state under 15 U.S.C. 261[, except that from 2 a.m. on the second Sunday in March until 2 a.m. on the first Sunday in November the standard of time for any area of this state shall be one hour in advance of the standard established for that particular area by the Congress of the United States under 15 U.S.C. 261].

(2) No department of the state government and no county, city or other political subdivision shall employ any other time or adopt any statute, ordinance or order providing for the use of any other standard of time.

SECTION 2. If, on or before the operative date specified in section 3 of this 2015 Act, the State of Washington or the State of California passes legislation similar to the amendments to ORS 187.110 by section 1 of this 2015 Act, the Legislative Counsel shall notify the Senate and House Committees on Judiciary.

SECTION 3. The amendments to ORS 187.110 by section 1 of this 2015 Act become operative on January 1, 2021.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> This 2015 Act shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next regular general election held throughout this state.

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
