

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 2302**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “192.579,” insert “414.025,
2 414.651.”

3 In line 3, after “743.847” insert “and sections 14 and 64, chapter 602,
4 Oregon Laws 2011” and after “414.727” insert “and section 60, chapter 602,
5 Oregon Laws 2011”.

6 Delete lines 7 through 31 and delete pages 2 through 13 and insert:

7 **“SECTION 1.** Section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by
8 section 2, chapter 8, Oregon Laws 2012, is amended to read:

9 **“Sec. 14. (1)(a)** [*Notwithstanding ORS 414.631 and 414.651, in any area*
10 *of the state where a coordinated care organization has not been certified,*] The
11 Oregon Health Authority shall continue to contract with one or more pre-
12 paid managed care health services organizations, as defined in ORS
13 [414.736] **414.025**, that [*serve the area and that*] are in compliance with con-
14 tractual obligations owed to the state or local government **on the effective**
15 **date of this 2015 Act and that serve:**

16 **“(A) A geographic area of the state that a coordinated care organ-**
17 **ization has not been certified to serve; or**

18 **“(B) Individuals described in ORS 414.631 (2), (3) and (4).**

19 **“(b) Contracts authorized by this subsection are not subject to ORS**
20 **chapters 279A and 279B, except ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290 and 279B.235.**

21 **“(2)** Prepaid managed care health services organizations contracting with
22 the authority under this section are subject to the applicable requirements

1 for, and are permitted to exercise the rights of, coordinated care organiza-
2 tions under ORS 414.153, 414.625, 414.635, 414.638, 414.651, 414.655, 414.679,
3 414.712, 414.728, 414.743, 414.746, 414.760, 416.510 to 416.610, 441.094, 442.464,
4 655.515, 659.830 and 743.847.

5 “[(3) *The authority may amend contracts that are in place on July 1, 2011,*
6 *to allow prepaid managed care health services organizations that meet the*
7 *criteria adopted by the authority under ORS 414.625 to become coordinated*
8 *care organizations.*]

9 “[(4) *The authority shall continue to renew the contracts of prepaid man-*
10 *aged care health services organizations that have a contract with the authority*
11 *on July 1, 2011, until the earlier of the date the prepaid managed care health*
12 *services organization becomes a coordinated care organization or July 1, 2014.*
13 *Contracts with prepaid managed care health services organizations must ter-*
14 *minate no later than July 1, 2017.*]

15 “[(5) *The authority shall continue to renew contracts or ensure that counties*
16 *renew contracts with providers of residential chemical dependency treatment*
17 *until the provider enters into a contract with a coordinated care organization*
18 *but no later than July 1, 2013.*]

19 “[(6)] **(3)** [Notwithstanding ORS 414.625 (2)(g) and 414.655 (2), the authority
20 shall allow for a period of transition] To **facilitate** the full adoption of health
21 information technology by coordinated care organizations and patient cen-
22 tered primary care homes[.], the authority shall explore options for assisting
23 providers and coordinated care organizations in funding their use of health
24 information technology.

25 “**SECTION 2.** Section 64, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by
26 section 70, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, and section 23, chapter 8, Oregon
27 Laws 2012, is amended to read:

28 “**Sec. 64.** (1) ORS 414.705 is repealed.

29 “(2) Sections 13 and 17, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, are repealed
30 January 2, 2014.

1 “(3) ORS 414.610, [414.630, 414.640,] **414.615, 414.618**, 414.736, 414.738,
2 414.739 and 414.740 are repealed July 1, 2017.

3 “[4] *Section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended by section 2*
4 *of this 2012 Act, is repealed July 1, 2017.*]

5 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 192.493 is amended to read:

6 “192.493. A record of an agency of the executive department as defined in
7 ORS 174.112 that contains the following information is a public record sub-
8 ject to inspection under ORS 192.420 and is not exempt from disclosure under
9 ORS 192.501 or 192.502 except to the extent that the record discloses infor-
10 mation about an individual’s health or is proprietary to a person:

11 “(1) The amounts determined by an independent actuary retained by the
12 agency to cover the costs of providing each of the following health services
13 under ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745 for the six months preced-
14 ing the report:

15 “(a) Inpatient hospital services;

16 “(b) Outpatient hospital services;

17 “(c) Laboratory and X-ray services;

18 “(d) Physician and other licensed practitioner services;

19 “(e) Prescription drugs;

20 “(f) Dental services;

21 “(g) Vision services;

22 “(h) Mental health services;

23 “(i) Chemical dependency services;

24 “(j) Durable medical equipment and supplies; and

25 “(k) Other health services provided under a coordinated care organization
26 contract under ORS 414.651 or a contract with a prepaid managed care
27 health services organization, **as defined in ORS 414.025;**

28 “(2) The amounts the agency and each contractor have paid under each
29 coordinated care organization contract under ORS 414.651 or prepaid man-
30 aged care health services organization contract for administrative costs and

1 the provision of each of the health services described in subsection (1) of this
2 section for the six months preceding the report;

3 “(3) Any adjustments made to the amounts reported under this section to
4 account for geographic or other differences in providing the health services;
5 and

6 “(4) The numbers of individuals served under each coordinated care or-
7 ganization contract or prepaid managed care health services organization
8 contract, listed by category of individual.

9 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 192.579 is amended to read:

10 “192.579. (1) As used in this section, ‘entity’ means a health care
11 provider, **a coordinated care organization, as defined in ORS 414.025** or
12 a prepaid managed care health services organization, as defined in ORS
13 [414.736] **414.025**, that provides health care to an individual, if the care is
14 paid for by a state health plan.

15 “(2) Notwithstanding ORS 179.505, an entity may disclose the identity of
16 an individual who receives health care from the entity without obtaining an
17 authorization from the individual, or a personal representative of the indi-
18 vidual, to another entity for the purpose of coordinating the health care and
19 treatment provided to the individual by either entity.

20 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 414.025 is amended to read:

21 “414.025. As used in this chapter and ORS chapters 411 and 413, unless
22 the context or a specially applicable statutory definition requires otherwise:

23 “(1)(a) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ means a payment other than a
24 fee-for-services payment, used by coordinated care organizations as compen-
25 sation for the provision of integrated and coordinated health care and ser-
26 vices.

27 “(b) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ includes, but is not limited to:

28 “(A) Shared savings arrangements;

29 “(B) Bundled payments; and

30 “(C) Payments based on episodes.

1 “(2) ‘Category of aid’ means assistance provided by the Oregon Supple-
2 mental Income Program, aid granted under ORS 412.001 to 412.069 and
3 418.647 or federal Supplemental Security Income payments.

4 “(3) ‘Community health worker’ means an individual who:

5 “(a) Has expertise or experience in public health;

6 “(b) Works in an urban or rural community, either for pay or as a vol-
7 unteer in association with a local health care system;

8 “(c) To the extent practicable, shares ethnicity, language, socioeconomic
9 status and life experiences with the residents of the community where the
10 worker serves;

11 “(d) Assists members of the community to improve their health and in-
12 creases the capacity of the community to meet the health care needs of its
13 residents and achieve wellness;

14 “(e) Provides health education and information that is culturally appro-
15 priate to the individuals being served;

16 “(f) Assists community residents in receiving the care they need;

17 “(g) May give peer counseling and guidance on health behaviors; and

18 “(h) May provide direct services such as first aid or blood pressure
19 screening.

20 “(4) ‘Coordinated care organization’ means an organization meeting cri-
21 teria adopted by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 414.625.

22 “(5) ‘Dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid’ means, with respect to
23 eligibility for enrollment in a coordinated care organization, that an indi-
24 vidual is eligible for health services funded by Title XIX of the Social Se-
25 curity Act and is:

26 “(a) Eligible for or enrolled in Part A of Title XVIII of the Social Security
27 Act; or

28 “(b) Enrolled in Part B of Title XVIII of the Social Security Act.

29 “(6) ‘Global budget’ means a total amount established prospectively by the
30 Oregon Health Authority to be paid to a coordinated care organization for

1 the delivery of, management of, access to and quality of the health care de-
2 livered to members of the coordinated care organization.

3 “(7) ‘Health services’ means at least so much of each of the following as
4 are funded by the Legislative Assembly based upon the prioritized list of
5 health services compiled by the Health Evidence Review Commission under
6 ORS 414.690:

7 “(a) Services required by federal law to be included in the state’s medical
8 assistance program in order for the program to qualify for federal funds;

9 “(b) Services provided by a physician as defined in ORS 677.010, a nurse
10 practitioner certified under ORS 678.375 or other licensed practitioner within
11 the scope of the practitioner’s practice as defined by state law, and ambu-
12 lance services;

13 “(c) Prescription drugs;

14 “(d) Laboratory and X-ray services;

15 “(e) Medical equipment and supplies;

16 “(f) Mental health services;

17 “(g) Chemical dependency services;

18 “(h) Emergency dental services;

19 “(i) Nonemergency dental services;

20 “(j) Provider services, other than services described in paragraphs (a) to
21 (i), (k), (L) and (m) of this subsection, defined by federal law that may be
22 included in the state’s medical assistance program;

23 “(k) Emergency hospital services;

24 “(L) Outpatient hospital services; and

25 “(m) Inpatient hospital services.

26 “(8) ‘Income’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 411.704.

27 “(9) ‘Investments and savings’ means cash, securities as defined in ORS
28 59.015, negotiable instruments as defined in ORS 73.0104 and such similar
29 investments or savings as the department or the authority may establish by
30 rule that are available to the applicant or recipient to contribute toward

1 meeting the needs of the applicant or recipient.

2 “(10) ‘Medical assistance’ means so much of the medical, mental health,
3 preventive, supportive, palliative and remedial care and services as may be
4 prescribed by the authority according to the standards established pursuant
5 to ORS 414.065, including premium assistance and payments made for ser-
6 vices provided under an insurance or other contractual arrangement and
7 money paid directly to the recipient for the purchase of health services and
8 for services described in ORS 414.710.

9 “(11) ‘Medical assistance’ includes any care or services for any individual
10 who is a patient in a medical institution or any care or services for any in-
11 dividual who has attained 65 years of age or is under 22 years of age, and
12 who is a patient in a private or public institution for mental diseases.
13 ‘Medical assistance’ does not include care or services for an inmate in a
14 nonmedical public institution.

15 “(12) ‘Patient centered primary care home’ means a health care team or
16 clinic that is organized in accordance with the standards established by the
17 Oregon Health Authority under ORS 414.655 and that incorporates the fol-
18 lowing core attributes:

19 “(a) Access to care;

20 “(b) Accountability to consumers and to the community;

21 “(c) Comprehensive whole person care;

22 “(d) Continuity of care;

23 “(e) Coordination and integration of care; and

24 “(f) Person and family centered care.

25 “(13) ‘Peer wellness specialist’ means an individual who is responsible for
26 assessing mental health service and support needs of the individual’s peers
27 through community outreach, assisting individuals with access to available
28 services and resources, addressing barriers to services and providing educa-
29 tion and information about available resources and mental health issues in
30 order to reduce stigmas and discrimination toward consumers of mental

1 health services and to provide direct services to assist individuals in creating
2 and maintaining recovery, health and wellness.

3 “(14) ‘Person centered care’ means care that:

4 “(a) Reflects the individual patient’s strengths and preferences;

5 “(b) Reflects the clinical needs of the patient as identified through an
6 individualized assessment; and

7 “(c) Is based upon the patient’s goals and will assist the patient in
8 achieving the goals.

9 “(15) ‘Personal health navigator’ means an individual who provides in-
10 formation, assistance, tools and support to enable a patient to make the best
11 health care decisions in the patient’s particular circumstances and in light
12 of the patient’s needs, lifestyle, combination of conditions and desired out-
13 comes.

14 “(16) **‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ means a**
15 **managed dental care, mental health or chemical dependency organ-**
16 **ization that contracts with the authority under section 14, chapter 602,**
17 **Oregon Laws 2011, or with a coordinated care organization on a pre-**
18 **paid capitated basis to provide health services to medical assistance**
19 **recipients.**

20 “[16)] (17) ‘Quality measure’ means the measures and benchmarks iden-
21 tified by the authority in accordance with ORS 414.638.

22 “[17)] (18) ‘Resources’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 411.704.
23 For eligibility purposes, ‘resources’ does not include charitable contributions
24 raised by a community to assist with medical expenses.

25 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 414.651 is amended to read:

26 “414.651. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall use, to the greatest
27 extent possible, coordinated care organizations to provide fully integrated
28 physical health services, chemical dependency and mental health services
29 and oral health services. This section, and any contract entered into pur-
30 suant to this section, does not affect and may not alter the delivery of

1 Medicaid-funded long term care services.

2 “(b) The authority shall execute contracts with coordinated care organ-
3 izations that meet the criteria adopted by the authority under ORS 414.625.
4 Contracts under this subsection are not subject to ORS chapters 279A and
5 279B, except ORS 279A.250 to 279A.290 and 279B.235.

6 “(c) The authority shall establish financial reporting requirements for
7 coordinated care organizations. The authority shall prescribe a reporting
8 procedure that elicits sufficiently detailed information for the authority to
9 assess the financial condition of each coordinated care organization and that:

10 “(A) Enables the authority to verify that the coordinated care
11 organization’s reserves and other financial resources are adequate to ensure
12 against the risk of insolvency; and

13 “(B) Includes information on the three highest executive salary and ben-
14 efit packages of each coordinated care organization.

15 “(d) The authority shall hold coordinated care organizations, contractors
16 and providers accountable for timely submission of outcome and quality data,
17 including but not limited to data described in ORS 442.466, prescribed by the
18 authority by rule.

19 “(e) The authority shall require compliance with the provisions of para-
20 graphs (c) and (d) of this subsection as a condition of entering into a con-
21 tract with a coordinated care organization. A coordinated care organization,
22 contractor or provider that fails to comply with paragraph (c) or (d) of this
23 subsection may be subject to sanctions, including but not limited to civil
24 penalties, barring any new enrollment in the coordinated care organization
25 and termination of the contract.

26 “(f)(A) The authority shall adopt rules and procedures to ensure that if
27 a rural health clinic provides a health service to a member of a coordinated
28 care organization, and the rural health clinic is not participating in the
29 member’s coordinated care organization, the rural health clinic receives total
30 aggregate payments from the member’s coordinated care organization, other

1 payers on the claim and the authority that are no less than the amount the
2 rural health clinic would receive in the authority's fee-for-service payment
3 system. The authority shall issue a payment to the rural health clinic in
4 accordance with this subsection within 45 days of receipt by the authority
5 of a completed billing form.

6 “(B) ‘Rural health clinic,’ as used in this paragraph, shall be defined by
7 the authority by rule and shall conform, as far as practicable or applicable
8 in this state, to the definition of that term in 42 U.S.C. 1395x(aa)(2).

9 “(2) The authority may contract with providers other than coordinated
10 care organizations to provide integrated and coordinated health care in areas
11 that are not served by a coordinated care organization or where the
12 organization's provider network is inadequate. Contracts authorized by this
13 subsection are not subject to ORS chapters 279A and 279B, except ORS
14 279A.250 to 279A.290 and 279B.235.

15 “(3) As provided in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, the aggregate
16 expenditures by the authority for health services provided pursuant to ORS
17 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745 may not exceed the total dollars ap-
18 propriated for health services under ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to
19 414.745.

20 “(4) Actions taken by providers, potential providers, contractors and bid-
21 ders in specific accordance with ORS 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745
22 **and section 14, chapter 602, Oregon Laws 2011**, in forming consortiums
23 or in otherwise entering into contracts to provide health care services shall
24 be performed pursuant to state supervision and shall be considered to be
25 conducted at the direction of this state, shall be considered to be lawful
26 trade practices and may not be considered to be the transaction of insurance
27 for purposes of the Insurance Code.

28 “(5) Health care providers contracting to provide services under ORS
29 414.631, 414.651 and 414.688 to 414.745 shall advise a patient of any service,
30 treatment or test that is medically necessary but not covered under the

1 contract if an ordinarily careful practitioner in the same or similar commu-
2 nity would do so under the same or similar circumstances.

3 “(6) A coordinated care organization shall provide information to a
4 member as prescribed by the authority by rule, including but not limited to
5 written information, within 30 days of enrollment with the coordinated care
6 organization about available providers.

7 “(7) Each coordinated care organization shall work to provide assistance
8 that is culturally and linguistically appropriate to the needs of the member
9 to access appropriate services and participate in processes affecting the
10 member’s care and services.

11 “(8) Each coordinated care organization shall provide upon the request
12 of a member or prospective member annual summaries of the organization’s
13 aggregate data regarding:

14 “(a) Grievances and appeals; and

15 “(b) Availability and accessibility of services provided to members.

16 “(9) A coordinated care organization may not limit enrollment in a ge-
17 ographic area based on the zip code of a member or prospective member.

18 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 414.736 is amended to read:

19 “414.736. As used in [*ORS 192.493,*] this chapter[, *ORS chapter 416 and*
20 *section 9, chapter 867, Oregon Laws 2009*]:

21 “(1) ‘Designated area’ means a geographic area of the state defined by the
22 Oregon Health Authority by rule that is served by a prepaid managed care
23 health services organization.

24 “(2) ‘Fully capitated health plan’ means an organization that contracts
25 with the authority on a prepaid capitated basis under ORS 414.618.

26 “(3) ‘Physician care organization’ means an organization that contracts
27 with the authority on a prepaid capitated basis under ORS 414.618 to provide
28 the health services described in ORS 414.025 (7)(b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and
29 (j). A physician care organization may also contract with the authority on
30 a prepaid capitated basis to provide the health services described in ORS

1 414.025 (7)(k) and (L).

2 “[*(4) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ means a managed*
3 *physical health, dental, mental health or chemical dependency organization*
4 *that contracts with the authority on a prepaid capitated basis under ORS*
5 *414.618. A prepaid managed care health services organization may be a dental*
6 *care organization, fully capitated health plan, physician care organization,*
7 *mental health organization or chemical dependency organization.*.]

8 **“SECTION 8.** ORS 416.510 is amended to read:

9 “416.510. As used in ORS 416.510 to 416.610, unless the context requires
10 otherwise:

11 “(1) ‘Action’ means an action, suit or proceeding.

12 “(2) ‘Alternative payment methodology’ has the meaning given that term
13 in ORS 414.025.

14 “(3) ‘Applicant’ means an applicant for assistance.

15 “(4) ‘Assistance’ means moneys paid by the Department of Human Ser-
16 vices to persons directly and moneys paid by the Oregon Health Authority
17 or by a prepaid managed care health services organization or a coordinated
18 care organization for services provided under contract pursuant to ORS
19 414.651 to others for the benefit of such persons.

20 “(5) ‘Authority’ means the Oregon Health Authority.

21 “(6) ‘Claim’ means a claim of a recipient of assistance for damages for
22 personal injuries against any person or public body, agency or commission
23 other than the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation or Workers’
24 Compensation Board.

25 “(7) ‘Compromise’ means a compromise between a recipient and any per-
26 son or public body, agency or commission against whom the recipient has a
27 claim.

28 “(8) ‘Coordinated care organization’ means an organization that meets the
29 criteria adopted by the authority under ORS 414.625.

30 “(9) ‘Judgment’ means a judgment in any action or proceeding brought

1 by a recipient to enforce the claim of the recipient.

2 “(10) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ [*means a man-*
3 *aged health, dental or mental health care organization that contracted with the*
4 *authority on a prepaid capitated basis. Prepaid managed care health services*
5 *organizations may be dental care organizations, fully capitated health plans,*
6 *mental health organizations or chemical dependency organizations.*] **has the**
7 **meaning given that term in ORS 414.025.**

8 “(11) ‘Recipient’ means a recipient of assistance.

9 “(12) ‘Settlement’ means a settlement between a recipient and any person
10 or public body, agency or commission against whom the recipient has a
11 claim.

12 **“SECTION 9.** ORS 741.300 is amended to read:

13 “741.300. As used in ORS 741.001 to 741.540:

14 **“(1) ‘Coordinated care organization’ has the meaning given that**
15 **term in ORS 414.025.**

16 “[~~(1)~~] **(2)** ‘Essential health benefits’ has the meaning given that term in
17 ORS 731.097.

18 “[~~(2)~~] **(3)** ‘Health care service contractor’ has the meaning given that term
19 in ORS 750.005.

20 “[~~(3)~~] **(4)** ‘Health insurance’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
21 731.162, excluding disability income insurance.

22 “[~~(4)~~] **(5)** ‘Health insurance exchange’ or ‘exchange’ means an American
23 Health Benefit Exchange as described in 42 U.S.C. 18031, 18032, 18033 and
24 18041 that is operated by the Oregon Health Insurance Exchange Corpo-
25 ration.

26 “[~~(5)~~] **(6)** ‘Health plan’ means health insurance or health care coverage
27 offered by an insurer.

28 “[~~(6)~~] **(7)** ‘Insurer’ means an insurer as defined in ORS 731.106 that offers
29 health insurance, a health care service contractor, [*or*] a prepaid managed
30 care health services organization **or a coordinated care organization.**

1 “[7] (8) ‘Insurance producer’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
2 731.104.

3 “[8] (9) ‘Prepaid managed care health services organization’ has the
4 meaning given that term in ORS [414.736] **414.025**.

5 “[9] (10) ‘State program’ means a program providing medical assistance,
6 as defined in ORS 414.025, and any health plan offered through the Public
7 Employees’ Benefit Board or the Oregon Educators Benefit Board.

8 **“SECTION 10.** ORS 741.310 is amended to read:

9 “741.310. (1) The following individuals and groups may purchase qualified
10 health plans through the health insurance exchange:

11 “(a) Beginning January 1, 2014:

12 “(A) Individuals and families; and

13 “(B) Employers with no more than 50 employees.

14 “(b) Beginning October 1, 2015, districts and eligible employees of dis-
15 tricts that are subject to ORS 243.886, unless their participation is precluded
16 by federal law.

17 “(c) Beginning January 1, 2016, employers with 51 to 100 employees.

18 “(2)(a) Only individuals who purchase health plans through the exchange
19 may be eligible to receive premium tax credits under section 36B of the
20 Internal Revenue Code and reduced cost-sharing under 42 U.S.C. 18071.

21 “(b) Only employers that purchase health plans through the exchange may
22 be eligible to receive small employer health insurance credits under section
23 45R of the Internal Revenue Code.

24 “(3) Only an insurer that has a certificate of authority to transact insur-
25 ance in this state and that meets applicable federal requirements for partic-
26 ipating in the exchange may offer a qualified health plan through the
27 exchange. Any qualified health plan must be certified under subsection (4)
28 of this section. Prepaid managed care health services organizations **and**
29 **coordinated care organizations** that do not have a certificate of authority
30 to transact insurance may serve only medical assistance recipients through

1 the exchange and may not offer qualified health plans.

2 “(4)(a) The Oregon Health Insurance Exchange Corporation shall adopt
3 by rule uniform requirements, standards and criteria for the certification of
4 qualified health plans, including requirements that a qualified health plan
5 provide, at a minimum, essential health benefits and have acceptable con-
6 sumer and provider satisfaction ratings.

7 “(b) The corporation may limit the number of qualified health plans that
8 may be offered through the exchange as long as the same limit applies to all
9 insurers.

10 “(5) Notwithstanding subsection (4) of this section, the corporation shall
11 certify as qualified a dental only health plan as permitted by federal law.

12 “(6) The corporation shall establish one streamlined and seamless appli-
13 cation and enrollment process for both the exchange and the state medical
14 assistance program.

15 “(7) The corporation, in collaboration with the appropriate state authori-
16 ties, may establish risk mediation programs within the exchange.

17 “(8) The corporation shall establish by rule a process for certifying in-
18 surance producers to facilitate the transaction of insurance through the ex-
19 change, in accordance with federal standards and policies.
