

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 3499**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” insert “327.008,”.

2 In line 3, after “329.157,” insert “329.488,”.

3 Delete lines 5 through 28 and delete pages 2 through 9 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1. (1) The Department of Education shall convene an**
5 **advisory group to develop uniform budget coding requirements and**
6 **uniform reporting requirements to provide budget transparency for**
7 **the spending of moneys received by school districts as provided by ORS**
8 **327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) for students in average daily membership eligible**
9 **for and enrolled in an English language learner program under ORS**
10 **336.079.**

11 **“(2) Taking into consideration the work of the advisory group under**
12 **this section, the State Board of Education shall adopt rules related to**
13 **uniform budget coding requirements no later than January 1, 2016.**

14 **“SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2015 Act is repealed on January 2,**
15 **2016.**

16 **“SECTION 3. (1) The Department of Education shall convene a work**
17 **group related to English language learner programs.**

18 **“(2) The work group must consist of educators, parents, community**
19 **stakeholders, experts on English language learner policy and experts**
20 **in collecting and analyzing data. The department shall solicit recom-**
21 **mendations for membership from organizations that represent educa-**
22 **tors, administrators, school district boards and parents when**

1 **determining membership of the work group.**

2 **“(3) The work group shall identify the following:**

3 **“(a) Criteria for determining if a school district is:**

4 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for**
5 **and enrolled in an English language learner program, taking into ac-**
6 **count the specific learning challenges and demographics of the stu-**
7 **dents; or**

8 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

9 **“(b) Information necessary for school districts to include in an an-**
10 **nual report on student progress indicators for students eligible for and**
11 **enrolled in an English language learner program for the purpose of**
12 **determining if a school district is:**

13 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for**
14 **and enrolled in an English language learner program, taking into ac-**
15 **count the specific learning challenges and demographics of the stu-**
16 **dents; or**

17 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

18 **“(c) Technical assistance that the department will provide to a**
19 **school district that is:**

20 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for**
21 **and enrolled in an English language learner program, taking into ac-**
22 **count the specific learning challenges and demographics of the stu-**
23 **dents; or**

24 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

25 **“(d) Guidelines for how the department shall direct a school district**
26 **on how to expend moneys received under ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) if the**
27 **school district is:**

28 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for**
29 **and enrolled in an English language learner program, taking into ac-**
30 **count the specific learning challenges and demographics of the stu-**

1 **dents; or**

2 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

3 **“(4) In addition to the duties of the work group prescribed by sub-**
4 **section (3) of this section, the work group shall develop recommen-**
5 **dations on the following:**

6 **“(a) Methods to provide ongoing support to students of a school**
7 **district who no longer are eligible for or enrolled in an English lan-**
8 **guage learner program under ORS 336.079.**

9 **“(b) Methods by which a school district will engage parents and**
10 **deliver essential notifications related to English language learner**
11 **programs.**

12 **“(c) Methods by which a school district will identify students who**
13 **are eligible to be enrolled in an English language learner program,**
14 **including any identification methods that occur before a student en-**
15 **rolls in kindergarten.**

16 **“(d) Appropriate accommodations for assessments for English lan-**
17 **guage learners.**

18 **“(e) A list of assessments for English language learners to be ap-**
19 **proved by the department.**

20 **“(f) Opportunities for school districts to acquire student library**
21 **books in languages other than English.**

22 **“(g) Methods by which a school district will:**

23 **“(A) Define and identify students who are long-term English lan-**
24 **guage learners or who are at risk of becoming long-term English lan-**
25 **guage learners; and**

26 **“(B) Provide support to students who have been identified as long-**
27 **term English language learners.**

28 **“(5) Taking into consideration the work of the work group under**
29 **this section, the State Board of Education shall adopt rules:**

30 **“(a) Related to the work of the work group as described in sub-**

1 section (3) of this section no later than January 1, 2016.

2 “(b) Related to the work of the work group as described in sub-
3 section (4) of this section no later than January 1, 2017.

4 “SECTION 4. Section 5 of this 2015 Act is repealed on January 2,
5 2017.

6 “SECTION 5. Section 6 of this 2015 Act is added to and made a part
7 of ORS 327.006 to 327.133.

8 “SECTION 6. (1) Each school district shall prepare an annual report
9 that:

10 “(a) Identifies the total amounts that are:

11 “(A) Allocated to the school district from the State School Fund for
12 students eligible for and enrolled in an English language learner pro-
13 gram as provided by ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii);

14 “(B) Expended from the amounts identified in subparagraph (A) of
15 this paragraph for students in average daily membership who are eli-
16 gible for and enrolled in an English language learner program; and

17 “(C) Expended as described in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph
18 by category of expenditure, as identified and defined by the State
19 Board of Education by rule.

20 “(b) Summarizes the progress for a school district on meeting ob-
21 jectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an Eng-
22 lish language learner program.

23 “(c) Provides information on student demographics, including:

24 “(A) The average number of years students have been enrolled in
25 an English language learner program;

26 “(B) The average number of years the students have attended their
27 current schools;

28 “(C) The percentage of students who also receive special education
29 and related services; and

30 “(D) Any other information required by the Department of Educa-

1 **tion.**

2 **“(2) The report required under subsection (1) of this section must:**

3 **“(a) Be filed with the Department of Education by September 1 of**
4 **each year;**

5 **“(b) Cover the school year ending on the preceding June 30; and**

6 **“(c) Comply with the form and content requirements for the report**
7 **that are prescribed by the Department of Education.**

8 **“(3) Notwithstanding subsection (2)(a) of this section and pursuant**
9 **to rules adopted by the State Board of Education, the Superintendent**
10 **of Public Instruction may waive a reporting date or specify an alter-**
11 **native date for filing the report if a human-created disaster or a na-**
12 **tural disaster affects the ability of the school district to file a report**
13 **by the specified date.**

14 **“(4) Prior to January 1 of each odd-numbered year, the Department**
15 **of Education shall submit to the interim legislative committees on**
16 **education a report on the data collected under subsection (2) of this**
17 **section. The report must include the data collected for the preceding**
18 **two school years.**

19 **“SECTION 7. A school district shall first file the report required**
20 **under section 6 of this 2015 Act by July 1, 2016.**

21 **“SECTION 8. ORS 336.079 is amended to read:**

22 **“336.079. (1) As used in this section, ‘English language learner’**
23 **means a student who:**

24 **“(a) Has limited English language proficiency because English is**
25 **not the native language of the student or the student comes from an**
26 **environment where a language other than English has had a signif-**
27 **icant impact on the student’s level of English language proficiency;**
28 **and**

29 **“(b) Meets any other criteria established by the State Board of Ed-**
30 **ucation by rule.**

1 “(2) Specific courses to teach speaking, reading and writing of the Eng-
2 lish language shall be provided at kindergarten and each grade level to [*those*
3 *children*] **students** who are unable to [*profit*] **benefit** from classes taught in
4 English. [*Such*] **The** courses shall be taught [*to such a level in school as may*
5 *be required until children are able to profit*] **at school until the students**
6 **are able to benefit** from classes conducted in English.

7 “(3) **The Department of Education shall develop and implement a**
8 **statewide plan to support students eligible for and enrolled in an**
9 **English language learner program under this section.**

10 “(4) **Each school district shall file a report related to students eli-**
11 **gible for and enrolled in an English language learner program as pro-**
12 **vided by section 6 of this 2015 Act.**

13 “(5)(a) **Based on the report received under subsection (4) of this**
14 **section, the department shall identify school districts that are:**

15 “(A) **Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for**
16 **and enrolled in an English language learner program, taking into ac-**
17 **count the specific learning challenges and demographics of the stu-**
18 **dents; or**

19 “(B) **In need of targeted assistance.**

20 “(b) **The department shall establish the expected growth in student**
21 **progress indicators, and the expected benchmarks for student progress**
22 **indicators, for English language learners for each school district that**
23 **is identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection. The interventions**
24 **shall be provided for four years after the school district has been**
25 **identified.**

26 “(c) **The department shall design and implement an accountability**
27 **system of progressive interventions for school districts that have been**
28 **identified under paragraph (a)(A) of this subsection. The interventions**
29 **shall be provided for four years after the school district has been**
30 **identified.**

1 “(d) The department shall provide technical assistance to school
2 districts that have been identified under paragraph (a)(B) of this sub-
3 section. Technical assistance shall be provided for four years after the
4 school district has been identified.

5 “(e) If a school district has been identified under paragraph (a) of
6 this subsection for four years and has not met the expected growth in
7 student progress indicators, and the expected benchmarks for student
8 progress indicators, established under paragraph (b) of this subsection,
9 the department shall direct the school district on how to expend
10 moneys received under ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) for up to three years.

11 “SECTION 9. (1) The Statewide English Language Learner Program
12 Account is established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct
13 from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Statewide English
14 Language Learner Program Account shall be credited to the General
15 Fund.

16 “(2) Moneys in the Statewide English Language Learner Program
17 Account are continuously appropriated to the Department of Educa-
18 tion for statewide activities related to English language learner pro-
19 grams.

20 “(3) The Department of Education, on behalf of the State of Oregon,
21 may solicit and accept gifts, grants or donations from public and pri-
22 vate sources for English language learner programs. Moneys received
23 under this subsection shall be deposited into the Statewide English
24 Language Learner Program Account.

25 “SECTION 10. ORS 327.008, as amended by section 6, chapter 81, Oregon
26 Laws 2014, is amended to read:

27 “327.008. (1) There is established a State School Fund in the General
28 Fund. The fund shall consist of moneys appropriated by the Legislative As-
29 sembly and moneys transferred from the Education Stability Fund. The State
30 School Fund is continuously appropriated to the Department of Education

1 for the purposes of ORS 327.006 to 327.077, 327.095, 327.099, 327.101, 327.125,
2 327.137, 327.348, 336.575, 336.580, 336.635, 342.173, 343.243, 343.533 and 343.961
3 and sections 1 to 3, chapter 735, Oregon Laws 2013, and section 2, chapter
4 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

5 “(2) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each school
6 district a State School Fund grant, consisting of the positive amount equal
7 to a general purpose grant and a facility grant and a transportation grant
8 and a high cost disabilities grant minus local revenue, computed as provided
9 in ORS 327.011 and 327.013.

10 “(3) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each edu-
11 cation service district a State School Fund grant as calculated under ORS
12 327.019.

13 “(4) All figures used in the determination of the distribution of the State
14 School Fund shall be estimates for the same year as the distribution occurs,
15 unless otherwise specified.

16 “(5) Numbers of students in average daily membership used in the dis-
17 tribution formula shall be the numbers as of June of the year of distribution.

18 “(6) A school district may not use the portion of the State School Fund
19 grant that is attributable to the facility grant for capital construction costs.

20 “(7) The total amount of the State School Fund that is distributed as fa-
21 cility grants may not exceed \$20 million in any biennium. If the total amount
22 to be distributed as facility grants exceeds this limitation, the Department
23 of Education shall prorate the amount of funds available for facility grants
24 among those school districts that qualified for a facility grant.

25 “(8) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer to the
26 Pediatric Nursing Facility Account established in section 5, chapter 81,
27 Oregon Laws 2014, the amount necessary to pay the costs of educational
28 services provided to students admitted to pediatric nursing facilities as pro-
29 vided in section 2, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

30 “(9) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the

1 amount of \$18 million from the State School Fund to the High Cost Disa-
2 bilities Account established in ORS 327.348.

3 “(10)(a) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$33
4 million from the State School Fund to the Network of Quality Teaching and
5 Learning Fund established under ORS 342.953.

6 “(b) For the purpose of making the transfer under this subsection:

7 “(A) The total amount available for all distributions from the State
8 School Fund shall be reduced by \$5 million;

9 “(B) The amount distributed to school districts from the State School
10 Fund under this section and ORS 327.013 shall be reduced by \$14 million; and

11 “(C) The amount distributed to education service districts from the State
12 School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by \$14
13 million.

14 “(c) For each biennium, the amounts identified in paragraph (b)(B) and
15 (C) of this subsection shall be adjusted by the same percentage by which the
16 amount appropriated to the State School Fund for that biennium is increased
17 or decreased compared [*to*] **with** the preceding biennium, as determined by
18 the Department of Education after consultation with the Legislative Fiscal
19 Officer.

20 “(11) **Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer**
21 **\$12.5 million from the State School Fund to the Statewide English**
22 **Language Learner Program Account established under section 9 of this**
23 **2015 Act.**

24 “[*11*] (12) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education may expend up
25 to \$550,000 from the State School Fund for the contract described in ORS
26 329.488. The amount distributed to education service districts from the State
27 School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by the
28 amount expended by the department under this subsection.

29 “[*12*] (13) Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up
30 to \$350,000 from the State School Fund to provide administration of and

1 support for the development of talented and gifted education under ORS
2 343.404.

3 “[~~(13)~~] (14) Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up
4 to \$150,000 from the State School Fund for the administration of a program
5 to increase the number of speech-language pathologists and speech-language
6 pathology assistants under ORS 348.394 to 348.406.

7 “[~~(14)~~] (15) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer
8 the amount of \$2.5 million from the State School Fund to the Small School
9 District Supplement Fund established in section 3, chapter 735, Oregon Laws
10 2013.

11 **“SECTION 11.** ORS 327.008, as amended by section 7, chapter 735, Oregon
12 Laws 2013, and section 7, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014, is amended to read:

13 “327.008. (1) There is established a State School Fund in the General
14 Fund. The fund shall consist of moneys appropriated by the Legislative As-
15 sembly and moneys transferred from the Education Stability Fund. The State
16 School Fund is continuously appropriated to the Department of Education
17 for the purposes of ORS 327.006 to 327.077, 327.095, 327.099, 327.101, 327.125,
18 327.137, 327.348, 336.575, 336.580, 336.635, 342.173, 343.243, 343.533 and 343.961
19 and section 2, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

20 “(2) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each school
21 district a State School Fund grant, consisting of the positive amount equal
22 to a general purpose grant and a facility grant and a transportation grant
23 and a high cost disabilities grant minus local revenue, computed as provided
24 in ORS 327.011 and 327.013.

25 “(3) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each edu-

1 “(5) Numbers of students in average daily membership used in the dis-

7 to be distributed as facility grants exceeds this limitation, the Department

10 “(8) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer to the
11 Pediatric Nursing Facility Account established in section 5, chapter 81,
12 Oregon Laws 2014, the amount necessary to pay the costs of educational
13 services provided to students admitted to pediatric nursing facilities as pro-
14 vided in section 2, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

15 “(9) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the
16 amount of \$18 million from the State School Fund to the High Cost Disa-
17 bilities Account established in ORS 327.348.

18 “(10)(a) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$33
19 million from the State School Fund to the Network of Quality Teaching and
20 Learning Fund established under ORS 342.953.

21 “(b) For the purpose of making the transfer under this subsection:

22 “(A) The total amount available for all distributions from the State
23 School Fund shall be reduced by \$5 million;

24 “(B) The amount distributed to school districts from the State School
25 Fund under this section and ORS 327.013 shall be reduced by \$14 million; and

26 “(C) The amount distributed to education service districts from the State
27 School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by \$14
28 million.

29 “(c) For each biennium, the amounts identified in paragraph (b)(B) and
30 (C) of this subsection shall be adjusted by the same percentage by which the

1 amount appropriated to the State School Fund for that biennium is increased
2 or decreased compared [to] **with** the preceding biennium, as determined by
3 the Department of Education after consultation with the Legislative Fiscal
4 Officer.

5 **“(11) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer**
6 **\$12.5 million from the State School Fund to the Statewide English**
7 **Language Learner Program Account established under section 9 of this**
8 **2015 Act.**

9 “[~~(11)~~] **(12)** Each fiscal year, the Department of Education may expend up
10 to \$550,000 from the State School Fund for the contract described in ORS
11 329.488. The amount distributed to education service districts from the State
12 School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by the
13 amount expended by the department under this subsection.

14 “[~~(12)~~] **(13)** Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up
15 to \$350,000 from the State School Fund to provide administration of and
16 support for the development of talented and gifted education under ORS
17 343.404.

18 “[~~(13)~~] **(14)** Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up
19 to \$150,000 from the State School Fund for the administration of a program
20 to increase the number of speech-language pathologists and speech-language
21 pathology assistants under ORS 348.394 to 348.406.

22 **“SECTION 12. The amendments to ORS 327.008 by sections 10 and**
23 **11 of this 2015 Act apply to State School Fund distributions com-**
24 **mencing with the 2015-2016 distributions.**

25 **“SECTION 13.** ORS 327.013 is amended to read:

26 “327.013. The State School Fund distributions for school districts include
27 the following grants:

28 “(1) General Purpose Grant = Funding Percentage × Target Grant ×
29 District extended ADMw. For the purpose of the calculation made under this
30 subsection:

1 “(a) The funding percentage shall be calculated by the Superintendent of
2 Public Instruction to distribute as nearly as practicable the total sum of
3 money available for distribution.

4 “(b) Target Grant = Statewide Target per ADMw Grant + Teacher Ex-
5 perience Factor. For the purpose of the calculation made under this para-
6 graph:

7 “(A) Statewide Target per ADMw Grant = \$4,500.

8 “(B) Teacher Experience Factor = $\$25 \times \{\text{District average teacher expe-}$
9 $\text{rience} - \text{statewide average teacher experience}\}$. As used in this subpara-
10 graph, ‘average teacher experience’ means the average, in years, of teaching
11 experience of licensed teachers as reported to the Department of Education.

12 “(c) District extended ADMw = ADMw or ADMw of the prior year,
13 whichever is greater. The calculation of the district extended ADMw must
14 be made as provided by ORS 338.155 (1)(b) if a public charter school is lo-
15 cated in the school district. For the purpose of this paragraph:

16 “(A) Weighted average daily membership or ADMw = average daily
17 membership + an additional amount computed as follows:

18 “(i) 1.0 for each student in average daily membership eligible for special
19 education as a child with a disability under ORS 343.035, which may not
20 exceed 11 percent of the district’s ADM without review and approval by the
21 Department of Education. Children with disabilities eligible for special ed-
22 ucation in adult local correctional facilities, as defined in ORS 169.005, or
23 adult regional correctional facilities, as defined in ORS 169.620, may not be
24 included in the calculation made under this sub-subparagraph.

25 “(ii) 0.5 for each student in average daily membership eligible for and
26 enrolled in an English [*as a second*] language **learner** program under ORS
27 336.079.

28 “(iii) 0.2 for each student in average daily membership enrolled in a union
29 high school district or in an area of a unified school district where the dis-
30 trict is only responsible for educating students in grades 9 through 12 in that

1 area.

2 “(iv) -0.1 for each student in average daily membership enrolled in an
3 elementary district operating kindergarten through grade six or kindergarten
4 through grade eight or in an area of a unified school district where the dis-
5 trict is only responsible for educating students in kindergarten through
6 grade eight.

7 “(v) 0.25 times the sum of the following:

8 “(I) The number of students who are in average daily membership and
9 who are also in poverty families, as determined by the Department of Edu-
10 cation based on rules adopted by the State Board of Education that incor-
11 porate poverty data published by the United States Census Bureau, student
12 data provided by school districts and other data identified by the board;

13 “(II) The number of children in foster homes in the district as determined
14 by the report of the Department of Human Services to the United States
15 Department of Education, ‘Annual Statistical Report on Children in Foster
16 Homes and Children in Families Receiving AFDC Payments in Excess of the
17 Poverty Income Level,’ or its successor, for October 31 of the year prior to
18 the year of distribution; and

19 “(III) The number of children in the district in state-recognized facilities
20 for neglected and delinquent children, based on information from the De-
21 partment of Human Services for October 31 of the year prior to the year of
22 distribution.

23 “(vi) The amount determined under ORS 327.077 for each remote small
24 elementary school and for each small high school in the district.

25 “(B) All numbers of children used for the computation in this paragraph
26 must reflect any district consolidations that have occurred since the numbers
27 were compiled.

28 “(C) The total additional weight that shall be assigned to any student in
29 average daily membership in a district, exclusive of students described in
30 subparagraph (A)(v) and (vi) of this paragraph, may not exceed 2.0.

1 “(2) High cost disabilities grant = the total amount received by a school
2 district under ORS 327.348 for providing special education and related ser-
3 vices to resident pupils with disabilities.

4 “(3)(a) Transportation grant equals:

5 “(A) 70 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts
6 ranked below the 80th percentile under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

7 “(B) 80 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts
8 ranked in or above the 80th percentile but below the 90th percentile under
9 paragraph (b) of this subsection.

10 “(C) 90 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts
11 ranked in or above the 90th percentile under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

12 “(b) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall rank school
13 districts based on the approved transportation costs per ADM of each school
14 district, ranking the school district with the highest approved transportation
15 costs per ADM at the top of the order.

16 “(4)(a) Facility Grant = 8 percent of total construction costs of new
17 school buildings.

18 “(b) A school district shall receive a Facility Grant in the distribution
19 year that a new school building is first used.

20 “(c) As used in this subsection:

21 “(A) ‘New school building’ includes new school buildings, structures
22 added onto existing school buildings and premanufactured structures added
23 to a school district if those buildings or structures are to be used for in-
24 structing students.

25 “(B) ‘Construction costs’ does not include costs for land acquisition.

26 “**SECTION 14.** ORS 327.345 is amended to read:

27 “327.345. (1) As used in this section, [*ESL student*] ‘**ELL student**’ means
28 a student who is eligible for and enrolled in an English [*as a second*] lan-
29 guage **learner** program under ORS 336.079.

30 “(2) In addition to distributing moneys through the State School Fund,

1 the Department of Education may award grants to school districts for the
2 costs of training English [*as a second*] language **learner** teachers.

3 “(3) The grants shall be available to any school district:

4 “(a) In which three percent or more of the students enrolled are [*ESL*]
5 **ELL** students;

6 “(b) That serves [*ESL*] **ELL** students or bilingual students within a large
7 geographic area in the district;

8 “(c) That has a high growth, as defined by rule of the State Board of
9 Education, of [*ESL*] **ELL** students or bilingual students in any school year;

10 or

11 “(d) That can demonstrate extraordinary need, as defined by rule of the
12 board, for English [*as a second*] language **learner** teachers or training for
