

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
SENATE BILL 418**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” delete the rest of the  
2 line and insert “337.150, 338.025, 338.115, 340.300, 340.305, 340.310, 340.320 and  
3 340.330 and section 10, chapter 519, Oregon Laws 2011; and declaring an  
4 emergency.”.

5 After line 2, insert:

6 “Whereas the benefits from increased access to college-level coursework  
7 by high school students include improved high school graduation rates, im-  
8 proved attainment of college-ready skills, reduced need for remedial courses  
9 in the first year at a post-secondary institution of education, improved ex-  
10 pectations by students of post-secondary institutions of education, improved  
11 transitions between high schools and post-secondary institutions of educa-  
12 tion, improved success rates of students at post-secondary institutions of ed-  
13 ucation, and reduced time spent and debt accrued for completion of studies  
14 at post-secondary institutions of education; and

15 “Whereas this state is committed to the goal that by 2025 at least 40  
16 percent of adult Oregonians will have earned a bachelor’s degree or higher  
17 degree, at least 40 percent of adult Oregonians will have earned an  
18 associate’s degree or post-secondary credential as their highest level of edu-  
19 cational attainment, and the remaining 20 percent or less of all adult  
20 Oregonians will have earned a high school diploma, an extended or modified  
21 high school diploma or the equivalent of a high school diploma as their  
22 highest level of educational attainment; and

1 “Whereas this state can more readily achieve the 40-40-20 goal by better  
2 aligning state funding, standards and assessments, better supporting shared  
3 resources for high schools and post-secondary institutions of education, bet-  
4 ter encouraging efficiencies and cost savings in high schools and post-  
5 secondary institutions of education, better reducing barriers to participation  
6 in post-secondary education and better improving equitable access to  
7 college-level coursework for high school students; and

8 “Whereas this state must support further development of a collaborative  
9 culture among all secondary schools and post-secondary institutions in order  
10 to improve course alignment, student success and shared professional devel-  
11 opment; and

12 “Whereas this state needs a consistent means by which to measure the  
13 impact that increased access to college-level coursework by high school stu-  
14 dents will have toward achieving the 40-40-20 goal; and

15 “Whereas improved access to college-level coursework by high school  
16 students will expose traditionally underrepresented students to higher edu-  
17 cation and increase the likelihood that the students will continue to pursue  
18 college-level coursework in higher education; and

19 “Whereas this state intends to enable students to access all forms of ac-  
20 celerated college credit programs and must ensure that Oregon-oriented pro-  
21 grams meet specified standards and provide consistency to students; now,  
22 therefore,”.

23 Delete lines 4 through 28 and delete page 2 and insert:

24 **“SECTION 1. As used in ORS 340.300 to 340.330:**

25 **“(1) ‘Accelerated college credit programs’ includes dual credit pro-**  
26 **grams, two-plus-two programs, advanced placement programs, Inter-**  
27 **national Baccalaureate programs and any other programs meeting**  
28 **criteria specified by the State Board of Education by rule as enabling**  
29 **high school students to earn college credit.**

30 **“(2) ‘Post-secondary institution of education’ means a community**

1 college in this state or a public university listed in ORS 352.002.

2 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 340.300 is amended to read:

3 *“340.300. [(1) As used in this section, ‘accelerated college credit programs’*  
4 *includes dual credit programs, two-plus-two programs, advanced placement*  
5 *programs and International Baccalaureate programs.]*

6 *“[(2) Each school district shall:]*

7 *“[(a) Provide students in grades 9 through 12 with accelerated college credit*  
8 *programs including, but not limited to, accelerated college credit programs re-*  
9 *lated to English, mathematics and science; or]*

10 *“[(b) Ensure that students in grades 9 through 12 have online access to*  
11 *accelerated college credit programs including, but not limited to, accelerated*  
12 *college credit programs related to English, mathematics and science.]*

13 **“(1) Each school district must provide an accelerated college credit**  
14 **program at each high school in the school district. The program must**  
15 **offer all students in grades 9 through 12 the opportunity to earn col-**  
16 **lege credit while in high school.**

17 **“(2)(a) An accelerated college credit program:**

18 **“(A) Must include, at a minimum, the greater of:**

19 **“(i) Three college-level courses; or**

20 **“(ii) Nine quarter hours of college-level courses;**

21 **“(B) Must include courses for which college credit is transferable**  
22 **to a post-secondary institution of education; and**

23 **“(C) May include courses in mathematics, writing, speech, the sci-**  
24 **ences, arts, humanities, social sciences and other courses that satisfy**  
25 **the requirement described in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph.**

26 **“(b) For the purpose of this subsection, a college credit is**  
27 **transferable if a post-secondary institution of education or an**  
28 **Oregon-based, generally accredited, not-for-profit private institution**  
29 **of higher education accepts the credit for application toward the re-**  
30 **quirements of a post-secondary degree or the prerequisites for career**

1 and technical education.

2 “(3)(a) Courses offered through an accelerated college credit pro-  
3 gram may be supported by online resources. If a course is exclusively  
4 provided online, the course must provide supports that are targeted  
5 to improving the success of students taking the course.

6 “(b) When a post-secondary institution of education provides a  
7 course supported by online resources as described in paragraph (a) of  
8 this subsection, the post-secondary institution of education must make  
9 reasonable and timely efforts to enter into agreements to enable a  
10 school district to offer to students in grades 9 through 12 the oppor-  
11 tunity to take the course if space is available in the course. Efforts  
12 must be made under this subsection to serve all students regardless  
13 of the community college district that serves the students.

14 “(4) A school district or a high school may enter into an agreement  
15 with a post-secondary institution of education to provide courses  
16 through an accelerated college credit program. If the school district  
17 or high school is unable to reach an agreement with the public uni-  
18 versity located closest to the high school or with the community col-  
19 lege that serves the high school within 60 days of beginning  
20 negotiations for an agreement, the school district or high school may  
21 pursue an agreement with another public university or community  
22 college in this state, regardless of any established service areas.

23 “(5) Except as provided by subsection (6) of this section, a student  
24 participating in an accelerated college credit program may not be re-  
25 quired to pay any expenses, including charges for tuition, fees and  
26 instructional materials, imposed by a post-secondary institution of  
27 education.

28 “(6) A student participating in an accelerated college credit program  
29 may be required to pay any of the following expenses that are:

30 “(a) Imposed by an entity that is neither a school district nor a

1 post-secondary institution of education, including examination costs.

2 “(b) Incurred for courses that are in excess of the three college-  
3 level courses or nine quarter hours of college-level courses that a  
4 school district is required to provide under subsection (2) of this sec-  
5 tion. A school district may charge a minimal fee per course for  
6 college-level courses that are in excess of the requirement under sub-  
7 section (2) of this section.

8 “(7) Each school district that provides an accelerated college credit  
9 program shall collaborate with a post-secondary institution of educa-  
10 tion to ensure that:

11 “(a) Courses offered through an accelerated college credit program  
12 meet the institution’s standards for transferable credits;

13 “(b) Students receive technical assistance in applying for admission  
14 and financial aid at a post-secondary institution of education; and

15 “(c) Students receive instructional support and other nonmonetary  
16 support that are targeted to improve the success of the students at a  
17 post-secondary institution of education.

18 “SECTION 3. Notwithstanding ORS 340.300, a school district that  
19 did not provide an accelerated college credit program at each high  
20 school in the school district during the 2014-2015 school year is not  
21 required to first comply with the requirements of ORS 340.300 until the  
22 2016-2017 school year.

23 “SECTION 4. ORS 340.305 is amended to read:

24 “340.305. [(1) As used in this section:]

25 “[a) ‘Accelerated learning entity’ means an entity that:]

26 “[A) Assists school districts and high schools in providing accelerated  
27 learning options that lead to college credit; or]

28 “[B) Provides standardized testing related to accelerated learning options  
29 that lead to college credit.]

30 “[b) ‘Accelerated learning options’ has the meaning given that term in

1 *rules adopted by the State Board of Education.]*

2 “(1) As used in this section, ‘**accelerated college credit program en-**  
3 **tity**’ means an entity that:

4 “(a) Assists school districts in providing accelerated college credit  
5 programs required under ORS 340.300; or

6 “(b) Provides standardized testing, including examinations, related  
7 to accelerated college credit programs.

8 “(2) For the purpose of assisting school districts [*and high schools in in-*  
9 *creasing the availability of accelerated learning options*] **offering accelerated**  
10 **college credit programs**, the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall  
11 make available the information described in subsections (3) and (4) of this  
12 section.

13 “(3) To the extent that [*accelerated learning entities*] **accelerated college**  
14 **credit program entities** provide information to the Superintendent of Pub-  
15 lic Instruction about resources and the various means for offering or pro-  
16 viding access to [*accelerated learning options*] **accelerated college credit**  
17 **programs**, the superintendent shall ensure that the information is published  
18 on the website of the Department of Education and is updated annually.

19 “(4) To the extent that [*accelerated learning entities*] **accelerated college**  
20 **credit program entities** provide information to the Superintendent of Pub-  
21 lic Instruction about [*accelerated learning options*] **accelerated college**  
22 **credit programs** made available by [*high schools*] **school districts**, the su-  
23 perintendent shall ensure that each [*high school*] **school district** that offers  
24 or provides access to [*accelerated learning options in three or fewer subjects*]  
25 **courses through accelerated college credit programs** is contacted annu-  
26 ally and is provided with information about resources and the various means  
27 for offering or providing access to [*accelerated learning options*] **accelerated**  
28 **college credit programs**.

29 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 340.310, as amended by section 1, chapter 23, Oregon  
30 Laws 2014, is amended to read:

1 “340.310. [(1) *The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall de-*  
2 *velop statewide standards for dual credit programs to be implemented by pub-*  
3 *lic high schools, community colleges and public universities listed in ORS*  
4 *352.002. The standards must establish the manner by which:]*

5 “(1) **The Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in consulta-**  
6 **tion with the State Board of Education, shall provide statewide stan-**  
7 **dards for accelerated college credit programs that do not have**  
8 **nationally-established standards or state-established accelerated credit**  
9 **standards. The statewide standards must be implemented by school**  
10 **districts and post-secondary institutions of education and must estab-**  
11 **lish the manner by which:**

12 “(a) A student in any grade from 9 through 12 may, upon completion of  
13 a course, earn course credit both for high school and for [*a community college*  
14 *or public university; and*] **general education or career and technical ed-**  
15 **ucation at a post-secondary institution of education.**

16 “(b) [*Teachers of courses that are part of a dual credit program will work*  
17 *together to determine*] **Faculty at post-secondary institutions of educa-**  
18 **tion will collaborate with teachers in school districts to ensure the**  
19 **quality of the accelerated college credit program and [*to ensure*] the**  
20 **alignment of the content, objectives and outcomes of individual courses.**

21 “(c) **High school teachers of courses that are part of an accelerated**  
22 **college credit program must be approved as an instructor by a post-**  
23 **secondary institution of education based on nationally-established**  
24 **standards, state-established standards or a process established by the**  
25 **commission. A process established by the commission must be estab-**  
26 **lished in consultation with the State Board of Education and post-**  
27 **secondary institutions of education and must identify instructor**  
28 **requirements specific to entry-level courses that are part of an accel-**  
29 **erated college credit program and that are offered as required by ORS**  
30 **340.300 (2)(a).**

1       “(d) **Payment for the first three courses, or the first nine quarter**  
2 **hours, that students take through accelerated college credit programs**  
3 **is distributed by school districts to post-secondary institutions of ed-**  
4 **ucation, including designating acceptable uses of moneys for acceler-**  
5 **ated college credit programs and establishing a minimum rate and a**  
6 **maximum rate for payment to a post-secondary institution of educa-**  
7 **tion for an accelerated college credit program.**

8       “(2) Each [*public high school, community college and public university*]  
9 **school district and post-secondary institution of education** that provides  
10 [*a dual credit program*] **an accelerated college credit program** must im-  
11 plement the statewide standards [*developed*] **adopted** under subsection (1) of  
12 this section **and must annually review the program to ensure compli-**  
13 **ance with the standards.**

14       “[(3) *Each school district, community college and public university that*  
15 *provides a dual credit program shall submit an annual report to the Higher*  
16 *Education Coordinating Commission on the academic performance of students*  
17 *enrolled in a dual credit program. The Higher Education Coordinating Com-*  
18 *mission shall establish the required contents of the report, which must provide*  
19 *sufficient information to allow the commission to determine the quality of the*  
20 *dual credit program.*]

21       “(3)(a) **Each school district and post-secondary institution of edu-**  
22 **cation that provides an accelerated college credit program shall submit**  
23 **to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission a biennial report**  
24 **on the academic performance of students participating in the program**  
25 **and the participation level of underrepresented students in the pro-**  
26 **gram. A school district must provide a separate report for each high**  
27 **school in the school district.**

28       “(b) **The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall establish**  
29 **the required contents of the report required by this subsection. The**  
30 **report must provide sufficient information to allow the commission to**



1 **determine the quality of the program and to document progress to-**  
2 **ward meeting the mission described in ORS 351.009.**

3 **“(c) For purposes of the report required by this subsection, the**  
4 **commission shall identify the characteristics of underrepresented stu-**  
5 **dents.**

6 **“(4) Based on the reports submitted under subsection (3) of this**  
7 **section, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall submit**  
8 **a biennial report to the Governor, the legislative committees on edu-**  
9 **cation and the State Board of Education.**

10 **“SECTION 5a. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this sec-**  
11 **tion, the requirements of ORS 340.310, as amended by section 5 of this**  
12 **2015 Act, first apply to the 2015-2016 school year.**

13 **“(2) The requirements of ORS 340.310 (1)(c), as amended by section**  
14 **5 of this 2015 Act, first apply to the 2016-2017 school year.”.**

15 **“SECTION 6. ORS 340.320 is amended to read:**

16 *“340.320. [(1) As used in this section, ‘accelerated college credit programs’*  
17 *includes dual credit programs, two-plus-two programs, advanced placement*  
18 *programs and International Baccalaureate programs.]*

19 **“[(2)] (1) The Department of Education shall administer a grant program**  
20 **that provides grants for the purposes of:**

21 **“(a) Providing education or training to teachers who will provide or are**  
22 **providing instruction in accelerated college credit programs;**

23 **“(b) Assisting students in paying for [books,] instructional materials and**  
24 **other costs[, other than test fees,] related to accelerated college credit pro-**  
25 **grams that are incurred by a student for courses that are in excess of**  
26 **three college-level courses or nine quarter hours of college-level**  
27 **courses; and**

28 **“(c) Providing classroom supplies for accelerated college credit programs.**

29 **“[(3)] (2) Any school district, [community college district or state institu-**  
30 **tion of higher education in this state] education service district or post-**

1 **secondary institution of education** may individually or jointly apply for  
2 a grant under this section.

3 “[4] (3) If a grant is awarded for the purpose of providing education or  
4 training to teachers who will provide or are providing instruction in an ac-  
5 celerated college credit program:

6 “(a) The amount of the grant may not exceed one-third of the total cost  
7 of the education or training; and

8 “(b) The department may award the grant on the condition that the  
9 teacher, school district, [*community college district and state institution of*  
10 *higher education*] **education service district and post-secondary institu-**  
11 **tion of education** pay the balance of the cost of the education or training  
12 in a proportion agreed to by the teacher, [*districts*] **the district** and **the** in-  
13 stitution.

14 “[5] (4) For the purposes described in subsection [(2)] (1) of this section,  
15 the department may:

16 “(a) Accept contributions of funds and assistance from the United States  
17 Government and its agencies or from any other source, public or private, and  
18 agree to conditions placed on the funds not inconsistent with the purposes  
19 of subsection [(2)] (1) of this section; and

20 “(b) Enter into agreements with school districts, [*community college dis-*  
21 *tricts and state institutions of higher education*] **education service districts**  
22 **and post-secondary institutions of education** related to the funding to  
23 provide education or training to teachers who will provide or are providing  
24 instruction in an accelerated college credit program.

25 “[6] (5) All funds received by the department under this section shall  
26 be paid into the **Supplemental** Accelerated College Credit Account estab-  
27 lished under ORS 340.330 to be used for the purposes described in subsection  
28 [(2)] (1) of this section.

29 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 340.330 is amended to read:

30 “340.330. The **Supplemental** Accelerated College Credit Account is es-

1 tablished in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund.  
2 Interest earned by the **Supplemental** Accelerated College Credit Account  
3 shall be credited to the account. Moneys in the **Supplemental** Accelerated  
4 College Credit Account are continuously appropriated to the Department of  
5 Education for the purposes described in ORS 340.320 [(2)] (1).

6 **“SECTION 8. Section 9 of this 2015 Act is added to and made a part**  
7 **of ORS 340.300 to 340.330.**

8 **“SECTION 9. (1) The Oregon Education Investment Board shall**  
9 **identify model programs and best practices for a school district to**  
10 **implement to encourage the students of the school district to partic-**  
11 **ipate in an accelerated college credit program and enroll in a post-**  
12 **secondary institution of education. The board may identify programs**  
13 **and practices tailored for students with specific backgrounds or char-**  
14 **acteristics.**

15 **“(2) Each school district shall annually inform the parents of its**  
16 **students in grades 9 through 12 of the availability and transferability**  
17 **of accelerated college credit program credits, including the student**  
18 **eligibility requirements and the financial and academic benefits of**  
19 **earning college credit while in high school.**

20 **“SECTION 10. Section 9 of this 2015 Act is amended to read:**

21 **“Sec. 9. (1) The [*Oregon Education Investment Board*] State Board of**  
22 **Education shall identify model programs and best practices for a school**  
23 **district to implement to encourage the students of the school district to**  
24 **participate in an accelerated college credit program and enroll in a post-**  
25 **secondary institution of education. The board may identify programs and**  
26 **practices tailored for students with specific backgrounds or characteristics.**

27 **“(2) Each school district shall annually inform the parents of its students**  
28 **in grades 9 through 12 of the availability and transferability of accelerated**  
29 **college credit program credits, including the student eligibility requirements**  
30 **and the financial and academic benefits of earning college credit while in**

1 high school.

2 **“SECTION 11.** Section 10, chapter 519, Oregon Laws 2011, as amended

6 chapter 739, Oregon Laws 2013, section 194, chapter 747, Oregon Laws 2013,  
7 and section 6, chapter 778, Oregon Laws 2013, is amended to read:

9        “(b) ORS 30.260 to 30.300 (tort claims);

10       “(c) ORS 192.410 to 192.505 (public records law);

11       “(d) ORS 192.610 to 192.690 (public meetings law);

12       “(e) ORS chapters 279A, 279B and 279C (Public Contracting Code);

13       “(f) ORS 297.405 to 297.555 and 297.990 (Municipal Audit Law);

14       “(g) ORS 326.565, 326.575 and 326.580 (student records);

6 “(v) Statutes and rules that apply to a special government body, as de-  
7 fined in ORS 174.117, or a public body, as defined in ORS 174.109;  
8 “(w) Health and safety statutes and rules;  
9 “(x) Any statute or rule that is listed in the charter;  
10 “(y) ORS 336.840 (use of personal electronic devices); [*and*]  
11 “(z) **ORS 340.300 to 340.330 (accelerated college credit programs); and**  
12 “[*(z)*] **(aa)** This chapter.  
13 “(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, a charter may specify  
14 that statutes and rules that apply only to school district boards, school dis-  
15 tricts and other public schools may apply to a public charter school.  
16 “(3) If a statute or rule applies to a public charter school, then the terms  
17 ‘school district’ and ‘public school’ include public charter school as those  
18 terms are used in that statute or rule.  
19 “(4) A public charter school may not violate the Establishment Clause of  
20 the First Amendment to the United States Constitution or section 5, Article  
21 I of the Oregon Constitution, or be religion based.  
22 “(5)(a) A public charter school shall maintain an active enrollment of at  
23 least 25 students.  
24 “(b) For a public charter school that provides educational services under  
25 a cooperative agreement described in ORS 338.080, the public charter school  
26 is in compliance with the requirements of this subsection if the public  
27 charter school provides educational services under the cooperative agreement  
28 to at least 25 students, without regard to the school districts in which the  
29 students are residents.  
30 “(6) A public charter school may sue or be sued as a separate legal entity.

1 “(7) The sponsor, members of the governing board of the sponsor acting  
2 in their official capacities and employees of a sponsor acting in their official  
3 capacities are immune from civil liability with respect to all activities re-  
4 lated to a public charter school within the scope of their duties or employ-
