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Testimony in Support of HB 4123 February 3, 2016, Hearing Room 343, 3 pm House Committee on Judiciary

Chair Barker, Vice Chairs Lininger and Olson and Representatives Barton, Greenlick, Krieger, Post, Sprenger, and Vega Pederson:

The Oregon Commission for Black Affairs is testifying in support of the proposed language in the court fees bill.

Oregonians who have served their time in Oregon state prisons need relief from court fees. House Bill 4123 will reduce the financial burden of formerly incarcerated people and people on parole. Formerly incarcerated Oregonians, particularly African-Americans and people of color, struggle to reintegrate into society. This bill addresses viable alternatives that will satisfy court fees while providing a new path way for formerly incarcerated Oregonians to reintegration into society through community service options.

We must be innovative in the way we as a society interact with formerly incarcerated Oregonians and remember that they are still citizens. They are a growing number of individuals who we need to become successful

contributors to society. The Oregon Commission on Black Affairs (OCBA) understands there are many challenges for formerly incarcerated Oregonians to reintegrate back into society and we believe that extreme poverty made worse by fees incurred while incarcerated is a set up for failure, when success is so desperately needed. HB 4123 will give reintegrating Oregon citizens an opportunity to repay their fees with community service. To do that, the bill makes a significant change to the way social services and community based organizations interact with this population. It establishes agency collaboration with the community court system to give formerly incarcerated Oregonians the opportunity to relieve their existing court fee debt using an already proven model of community service.

OCBA believes that second chances are for everyone and this includes formerly incarcerated Oregonians. HB 4123 will give formerly them a chance to eliminate their court fee debt through community service as they reintegrate back into society and begin a new and productive life.

The Oregon Commission on Black affairs urges your positive consideration of HB 4123.
