WHAT THE MEASURE DOES: Modifies requirements regarding coordinated care organization contracts and for establishing global budgets and required services. Establishes judicial review procedure for coordinated care organization to appeal order of Oregon Health Authority terminating contract or reducing global budget.

BACKGROUND: The coordinated care model was first implemented in coordinated care organizations (CCOs). A coordinated care organization is a network of all types of health care providers (physical health care, addictions and mental health care and sometimes dental care providers) who have agreed to work together in their local communities to serve people who receive health care coverage under the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid). CCOs are focused on prevention and helping people manage chronic conditions, like diabetes. This helps reduce unnecessary emergency room visits and gives people support to be healthy. Currently, there are 16 CCOs operating in communities around Oregon.
