House Bill 4031

Sponsored by Representative DOHERTY, Senator MONROE; Representatives GALLEGOS, GOMBERG, GORSEK, KOMP, RAYFIELD, SMITH WARNER, WILLIAMSON (at the request of Oregon Alliance of Children's Programs) (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Directs Chief Education Office to design and implement pilot program to decrease rates of school absenteeism. Sunsets pilot program January 2, 2020.

Appropriates moneys from General Fund to office for purpose of pilot program.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

- 2 Relating to school absenteeism; and declaring an emergency.
 - Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 - SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section, "trauma-informed approach" means an approach that recognizes the signs and symptoms of trauma in students, families and staff and responds by fully integrating knowledge about trauma into policies, procedures and practices for the purposes of resisting the reoccurrence of trauma and promoting resiliency.
 - (2) The Chief Education Office, in coordination with the Oregon Health Authority and the Department of Education, shall design and implement a pilot program to decrease rates of school absenteeism by using trauma-informed approaches to education, health services and intervention strategies that are based in schools and take advantage of community resources.
 - (3)(a) A school district may apply to participate in the pilot program if the school district has at least one school in the school district with:
 - (A) A school-based health center; or
 - (B) A school-based system for providing behavioral health services and care coordination.
 - (b) A school district may submit an application jointly with one or more community partners that will participate in the pilot program with the school district.
 - (4) The office shall prescribe the timelines by which an applicant may apply to participate in the pilot program and the form of the application.
 - (5) The office shall accept an applicant to participate in the pilot program based on the applicant's ability to demonstrate that the applicant will develop and implement a coordinated strategic plan to decrease rates of school absenteeism by using trauma-informed approaches to education, health services and intervention strategies. The plan must:
 - (a) Coordinate the services provided by:
 - (A) The school;
 - (B) The school-based health center or the administrator of the school-based system described in subsection (3)(a)(B) of this section; and
 - (C) Coordinated care organizations, public health entities, nonprofit youth service pro-

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28 29 viders, community-based organizations, social justice groups and similar groups that are located in the community;

- (b) Require professional development and support for school staff, including educators, school district professionals, counselors, nurses, classified staff and other staff of the school district to create a culture in the school district and community that is informed about how to understand, recognize and respond to trauma;
 - (c) Provide for at least one full-time trauma specialist who:

- (A) Is permanently assigned at the school-based health center or at the location where the school-based system described in subsection (3)(a)(B) of this section is provided; and
- (B) Oversees the implementation of the plan, including coordinating the services described in paragraph (a) of this subsection and providing the professional development and support described in paragraph (b) of this subsection;
- (d) Indicate how services coordinated under paragraph (a) of this subsection are provided based on a trauma-informed approach and with an understanding, recognition and responsiveness to the effects of trauma on education, absenteeism and school completion;
- (e) Use evidence-based and evidence-informed approaches and national models that are tailored to the community to ensure that data is collected and the effectiveness of the pilot program is determined;
- (f) Provide matching community funding, or resources that are the monetary equivalent of matching funding, in a ratio determined by the office by rule; and
- (g) Pursue additional funding opportunities, including funding under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (P.L. 114-95).
 - (6) The office shall identify at least five applicants to participate in the pilot program.
- (7) The office shall award grants to pilot program participants from moneys appropriated to the office for the pilot program.
- (8)(a) The office, in collaboration with the Oregon Health Authority and the Department of Education, shall provide coordination among school districts participating in the pilot program.
- (b) The office may coordinate with a statewide nonprofit organization that has experience in supporting school-based health centers and student health organizations for the organization to provide technical assistance to school districts participating in the pilot program.
- (9) Each participating school district shall provide regular reports on the progress of the pilot program to the office to enable the office to:
 - (a) Determine the effectiveness of the pilot program; and
- (b) Submit a report and recommendations for legislation to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to education as required under subsection (10) of this section.
- (10) No later than October 15, 2019, the Chief Education Office, the Oregon Health Authority and the Department of Education, in collaboration with the statewide nonprofit organization described in subsection (8) of this section, shall submit a report to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to education. The report must provide individual and comprehensive evaluations on the outcomes of the pilot program and include any recommendations for legislation based on the results of the pilot program.
 - SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2016 Act is repealed on January 2, 2020.
- SECTION 3. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-

ated to the Chief Education Office, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the Gen-
eral Fund, the amount of $5,750,000$, which may be expended for the pilot program designed
and implemented under section 1 of this 2016 Act.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> This 2016 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2016 Act takes effect on its passage.

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
