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Context for Cleaner Air Oregon

- There are many sources of air toxics that create health risks, including mobile sources (diesel), wood stoves, and wildfire
- Health risks from localized industrial air toxics emissions can be significant
- At the same time, another key determinant of health is poverty


Why Cleaner Air Oregon?

- Federal environmental law focuses on ambient (area-wide) air quality, not localized impacts from particular facilities
- Community concerns about localized impacts can create uneven and unpredictable results
- All want a predictable system for addressing industrial air toxics



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Policy Development for Cleaner Air Oregon



- Technical review of programs in other states
- Broad public engagement
- Rules advisory committee
 - Discussion draft rules
 - Fiscal Impact Statement

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Governor's Guiding Principles

- Protective of health
- Grounded in science
- Predictable for businesses and communities



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
Key elements

- Assess risks using facility-specific data
- Risk action levels
- Greater flexibility for existing facilities
- Implementation starts with highest risks, including highest potential impact
