Oregon Medical Marijuana Program

- Administered by Oregon Health Authority (OHA).
- OHA registers:
 - Individuals (patient) with a qualifying medical condition
 - Caregivers to assist the patient
 - Growers and grow sites
 - Dispensaries
 - Processing sites



OMMP Statistics 1 year Comparison

Highlights of HB 2198 Effective August 2, 2017



Transfers from OMMP growers to OLCC licensees

- Allows a medical marijuana grow site to transfer up to 20 pounds of usable marijuana per year to an OLCC licensed wholesaler or processor. (Sec. 8).
- An OMMP grow site must track such transfers in CTS (OLCC's tracking system). (Sec. 8a)
- Must have been registered with OHA on or before August 2, 2017 to be eligible. (Sec.8e)



OMMP Grow Site Plants Limits

Changes to OMMP grow site plant limits:

- If grow site is at a patient's residence and the patient or patient's caregiver is the grower, limited to 12 mature and 24 immature plants, including recreational plants, regardless of zoning.
- If grow site within a city & zoned residential:
 - 12 mature, 24 immature* plants at an address
 - 24 mature, 48 immature* plants if grandfathered
- If grow site outside city or not zoned residential:
 - 48 mature, 96 immature* plants at an address
 - 96 mature, 192 immature* plants if grandfathered
 - * Over 24 inches in height; No limit on immature plants under 24 inches. (Sec. 11)



OMMP Site Inspections

- On-site grow site inspection authority granted in 2015.
- In October 2016, OHA began limited number of on-site inspections of grow sites
- Comprehensive grow site inspection procedure created with stakeholder input and developed over 8 months.



OMMP Grow Site Inspections

- Routine inspections of grow sites began in September 2017, applying the new plant limits.
- OMMP realized additional communication to registrants was needed.
- Inspections were halted
- Took additional time to educate the growers.





OMMP Grow Site Inspections

- OMMP continues to refine the inspection process.
- Focus is on continuous improvement
- Complying with and enforcing the laws
- Supporting the medical marijuana growers
