

Thanks to investments by the State of Oregon and others, College Possible has grown significantly in serving students in urban and rural Oregon. Now is the time to build and sustain a formal partnership with the State of Oregon and College Possible to increase post-secondary educational success and remove systemic barriers for Oregon's low-income students. It takes both a strong education system and community partners who deliver quality programs and measurable results to improve student outcomes. College Possible Portland is a natural extension of Oregon's investments in education and workforce development, and funding will increase the number of students and schools served. Working with the State, we believe this investment will be a preventative approach to avoiding future social needs/costs, help students transition to and complete, both a high school and college education, and better prepare them for the workforce of tomorrow.

Current students served in 6 large east Multnomah County high schools, 8 small rural high schools, and colleges (including 12 partner Oregon colleges)

- 530 low-income junior and senior high school students in east Multnomah County;
- 150 low-income juniors and seniors served through out Statewide Initiative pilot program;
- 823 current college students;
- 1,000 high school 9th and 10th graders receive college awareness courses;
- Strong focus on ACT improvement, college visits, applications for scholarships/aid, FAFSA completion, financial literacy and community involvement;
- 14 high schools, 12 districts, and 12 partner colleges are in place; and
- Serve low-income (100%), first generation (90%), students of color (69%), and women (71%)

Excellent Outcomes

- Average ACT increase last school year of 25%;
- 96% of high school graduates in College Possible Portland accepted to college;
- 85% enrolled in college immediately, and 85% of first year students persisted to year two; and
- Provide intensive one-on-one coaching for up to six years in college.

How we have met and will meet further Oregon needs

- Opportunity we set high expectations using AmeriCorps coaches creating opportunities for low-income students to persist to graduation through College Possible's innovative approach, while also providing financial literacy and community involvement experiences;
- Equity we serve primarily students that come from cultural, economic and racially diverse groups, with the majority of students being first generation college students, women and students of color;
- Geography partially due to Oregon's 2015-17 investment in College Possible we were able to expand outside
 of Portland/Multnomah County into eight rural schools and districts through our Statewide Initiative as
 committed to in our application for funding;
- Program Scale partially due to Oregon's 2015-17 investment in College Possible we more than doubled the number of low-income students served in the Portland metro area, and now have twelve college partners Oregon; and
- Leverage the State's investment in other programs will be leveraged by College Possible through not only
 stronger results for students, but also through donations from other donors including individuals, public
 entities, corporations, foundations and scholarship donors. It is also an investment in Oregon's future
 employment needs through connected strategies such as internships, etc.

An investment in College Possible will serve more Oregon students and has a triple payback

 Improves individual student college success through our near peer mentoring, financial literacy education, and community service



- Helps prepare a stronger workforce for employers including under represented careers in STEM and other high paying jobs; and
- Reduces state and local social costs by breaking the cycle of poverty, including the impacts of multigenerational poverty

State's Investment in College Possible

The State's initial two investments in College Possible of \$350,000 during the biennium budgets of 2015-17 and 2018-19 was instrumental in our growth and ability to serve more students in Oregon. During this time period we exceeded each goal put forth in our original proposal to the State, including:

- Doubled the number of low-income students served in the Portland metro area's highest need schools;
- Expanded college programming to support low-income students on at least four college campuses across the state;
- Pilot a program to serve low-income students throughout the state via a virtual and in person coaching model built on a national platform

Return on Investment (ROI)

College Possible has a very high ROI. For each \$6,000 investment in our students (two years of high school and up to six years of college), graduating from college vs high school lowers their risk of unemployment from 5.2 percent to 2.7 percent and increases their annual earning potential from \$36,000 on average to \$60,000 on average (US Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2016). Additionally, they will likely earn over \$1 million dollars more in their life-time than their peers who did not earn a bachelors degree.

Three-year Vision for Strategic Growth

College Possible Portland is poised to scale in the next three years. All three of our programs, Traditional High School, College Success and our Statewide Initiative pilot program have experienced exponential growth over the last few years and we continue to struggle to meet the exceeding demand in our State. Our three-year vision is to scale our Statewide Initiative program out of the pilot phase and move into another region in Oregon. We currently serve students in Eastern Oregon, in Umatilla and Morrow Counties and in the Northwestern corner of the state in Columbia and rural Washington County. We are currently evaluating the next region of the state to begin serving additional rural students and are looking towards moving south of Portland Metro – deeper into the Willamette Valley and possibly the northern coast.

At the same time, we expect to continue to grow our Traditional High School program by starting a partnership with the Beaverton School district in Washington County – we will begin recruiting our first class of rising juniors in the spring of 2019. Our College Program will continue to grow with each additional graduating high school class and we expect to go from serving 823 college students in the 208-19 school year to 1,125 college students by 2020. The total number of students we expect to serve in the next three years will grow from 1,150 students in 2017-18 to 1,885 low-income students across the state of Oregon in 2019-20.


