SUMMARY

Defines terms related to appeals. Separates provisions relating to appealability from provisions relating to reviewability.

Lists specific judgments and orders that defendant and state may appeal, including trial court denial of restitution or award of restitution in amount less than that requested by state.

Requires nonjurisdictional showing of colorable claim of error in defendant's notice on appeal from certain trial court decisions. Reorganizes provisions concerning appellate procedures. Revises provisions concerning service of notice of appeal on opposing party and filing of notice.

Expands appellate court authority to review sentences in misdemeanor cases. Expressly provides for appellate court authority to review trial court's decision to merge or not to merge determinations of guilt. Describes intermediate decisions of trial court that appellate court has authority to review.

Reorganizes provisions concerning trial court authority to enter corrected judgment or supplemental judgment awarding restitution during pendency of appeal. Describes scope of appellate court authority to review corrected or amended judgments.

Reorganizes and revises provisions describing dispositional authority of appellate court.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

APPEALS GENERALLY

1 **SECTION 1.** ORS 138.005 is amended to read:

2 138.005. As used in ORS 138.010 to 138.310[,]:

3 (1) Unless the context requires otherwise, the terms defined in ORS 19.005
4 have the meanings set forth in ORS 19.005.

5 (2) **“Appealable” means, in reference to a judgment or order ren-**
6 **dered by a trial court, that the judgment or order is, by law, subject**
7 **to appeal by a party.**

8 (3) **“Colorable claim of error” means an argument that is plausible,**
9 **grounded in the facts of the case, and reasonable under current law**
10 **or a reasonable extension or modification of current law.**

11 (4) **“Reviewable” means, in reference to a particular decision of a**
12 **trial court on appeal from an appealable judgment or order, that the**
13 **appellate court may, by law, consider the decision and resolve an issue**
14 **regarding the decision.**

15 (5) **“Sentence” means all legal consequences established or imposed**
16 **by the trial court after conviction of an offense, including but not**
17 **limited to:**

18 (a) **Forfeiture, imprisonment, cancellation of license, removal from**
19 **office, monetary obligation, probation, conditions of probation, dis-**
20 **charge, restitution and community service; and**

21 (b) **Suspension of imposition or execution of any part of a sentence,**
22 **extension of a period of probation, imposition of a new or modified**
23 **condition of probation or of sentence suspension, and imposition or**
24 **execution of a sentence upon revocation of probation or sentence**
25 **suspension.**

27 **APPEAL BY THE DEFENDANT**
28

29 **SECTION 2.** (1) Sections 3, 6, 10, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of this 2017 Act
30 are added to and made a part of ORS 138.010 to 138.310.

31 **SECTION 3.** (1)(a) A defendant may take an appeal from the circuit

1 court, or from a municipal court or a justice court that has become
2 a court of record under ORS 51.025 or 221.342, to the Court of Appeals
3 from a judgment:

4 (A) Conclusively disposing of all counts in the accusatory instru-
5 ment or conclusively disposing of all counts severed from other
6 counts;

7 (B) Convicting the defendant of at least one count; and

8 (C) Imposing sentence on all counts of which the defendant was
9 convicted.

10 (b) For the purposes of this subsection, if the trial court merges a
11 determination of guilt on one count with a determination of guilt on
12 another count and imposes a sentence on the merged determinations
13 of guilt, the trial court has conclusively disposed of the merged
14 counts.

15 (2)(a) A defendant may appeal a judgment ordering payment of
16 restitution but not specifying the amount of restitution.

17 (b) A defendant may appeal a supplemental judgment awarding
18 restitution.

19 (3) A defendant may appeal a judgment or order extending a period
20 of probation, imposing a new or modified condition of probation or of
21 sentence suspension, or imposing or executing a sentence upon revo-
22 cation of probation or sentence suspension.

23 (4) A defendant may appeal an amended or corrected judgment en-
24 tered after the judgment of conviction and sentence.

25 (5) A defendant may cross-appeal when the state appeals pursuant
26 to ORS 138.060 (1)(d).

APPEAL BY THE STATE

29

30 **SECTION 4.** ORS 138.060 is amended to read:

31 138.060. (1) The state may take an appeal from the circuit court, or from

1 a municipal court or a justice court that has become a court of record under
2 ORS 51.025 or 221.342, to the Court of Appeals from:

3 (a) An order made prior to trial dismissing or setting aside **one or more**
4 **counts in** the accusatory instrument;

5 **(b) An order allowing a demurrer;**

6 [(b)] (c) An order arresting the judgment;

7 [(c)] (d) An order made prior to trial suppressing evidence;

8 [(d)] (e) An order made prior to trial for the return or restoration of
9 things seized;

10 [(e)] (f) **For a felony committed on or after November 1, 1989, a**
11 judgment [*of conviction based on the sentence as provided in ORS 138.222*],
12 **amended judgment or corrected judgment of conviction;**

13 (g) **For any felony, a judgment, amended judgment, supplemental**
14 **judgment, corrected judgment or post-judgment order, that denied**
15 **restitution or awarded less than the amount of restitution requested**
16 **by the state;**

17 [(f)] (h) An order **or judgment** in a probation revocation hearing finding
18 that a defendant who was sentenced to probation under ORS 137.712 has not
19 violated a condition of probation by committing a new crime;

20 [(g)] (i) An order made after a guilty finding dismissing or setting aside
21 **one or more counts in** the accusatory instrument; **or**

22 [(h)] (j) An order granting a new trial[; *or*].

23 [(i) *An order dismissing an accusatory instrument under ORS 136.130.*]

24 (2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, when the state chooses
25 to appeal [*from*] an order [*listed in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection*]
26 **described in subsection (1)(a), (b) or (d) of this section**, the state shall
27 take the appeal to the Supreme Court if the defendant is charged with mur-
28 der or aggravated murder. [*The orders to which this subsection applies are:*]

29 [(a) *An order made prior to trial suppressing evidence; and*]

30 [(b) *An order made prior to trial dismissing or setting aside the accusatory*
31 *instrument.*]

1 [(3) *In an appeal by the state under subsection (2) of this section, the Su-*
2 *preme Court shall issue its decision no later than one year after the date of*
3 *oral argument or, if the appeal is not orally argued, the date that the State*
4 *Court Administrator delivers the briefs to the Supreme Court for decision.*
5 *Failure of the Supreme Court to issue a decision within one year is not a*
6 *ground for dismissal of the appeal.*]

7 **SECTION 5.** ORS 136.120 is amended to read:

8 136.120. (1) If[, *when the case is called for trial,*] the defendant appears
9 **at the time set** for trial and the [*district*] **prosecuting** attorney is not ready
10 and does not show [*any*] sufficient cause for postponing the trial, the court
11 shall [*order*] **dismiss** the accusatory instrument [*to be dismissed, unless, be-*
12 *ing of the opinion that the public interests require the accusatory instrument*
13 *to be retained for trial, the court directs it to be retained*] **unless the court**
14 **determines that dismissal is not in the public interest.**

15 (2) **If the court dismisses the accusatory instrument under sub-**
16 **section (1) of this section and:**

17 (a) **The instrument charges a felony or Class A misdemeanor, the**
18 **dismissal is not a bar to another action for the same offense unless**
19 **the court so orders.**

20 (b) **The instrument charges an offense other than a felony or Class**
21 **A misdemeanor, the dismissal shall be a bar to another action for the**
22 **same offense.**

PROCEDURE

28

29 **SECTION 6.** (1) **If a defendant appeals a judgment of conviction**
30 **based only on a plea of guilty or no contest, the notice of appeal must:**

31 (a) **Include a statement that the defendant has reserved an issue for**

1 **appeal under ORS 135.335; or**

2 **(b) Identify a colorable claim of error reviewable under section 13**
3 **of this 2017 Act.**

4 **(2) If a defendant appeals from any of the following judgments or**
5 **orders, the notice of appeal must identify a colorable claim of error**
6 **reviewable under section 13 of this 2017 Act:**

7 **(a) A trial court's judgment or order:**

8 **(A) Revoking probation;**

9 **(B) Extending the period of probation;**

10 **(C) Imposing a new condition of probation;**

11 **(D) Modifying an existing condition of probation; or**

12 **(E) Revoking a sentence suspension; or**

13 **(b) A judgment resentencing the defendant pursuant to a decision**
14 **by an appellate court or a circuit court granting post-conviction relief.**

15 **(3) The requirements of subsections (1) and (2) of this section are**
16 **not jurisdictional, but the appellate court may dismiss the appeal if**
17 **the notice of appeal fails to contain the required statement or fails to**
18 **identify the colorable claim of error and the defendant fails to correct**
19 **the deficiency after having been given the opportunity to do so.**

20 **SECTION 7.** ORS 138.071 is amended to read:

21 138.071. (1) Except as provided in this section, a notice of appeal must be
22 served and filed not later than 30 days after the judgment or order appealed
23 from was entered in the register.

24 (2) If a motion for new trial or motion in arrest of judgment is **timely**
25 served and filed, a notice of appeal must be served and filed within 30 days
26 from the earlier of the following dates:

27 (a) The date of entry of the order disposing of the motion; or

28 (b) The date on which the motion is deemed denied.

29 (3) A defendant cross-appealing [*must*] **shall** serve and file the notice of
30 cross-appeal within 10 days of the expiration of the time allowed in sub-
31 section (1) of this section.

1 [(4) *If the trial court enters a corrected or supplemental judgment under*
2 *ORS 138.083 or under any other statutory provision while an appeal of the*
3 *judgment of conviction is pending and:]*

4 [(a) *A party intends to assign error to any part of the corrected or supple-*
5 *mental judgment, the party must file an amended notice of appeal from the*
6 *corrected or supplemental judgment not later than 30 days after the party re-*
7 *ceives notice that the corrected or supplemental judgment has been entered.]*

8 [(b) *A party does not intend to assign error to any part of the corrected or*
9 *supplemental judgment, the party need only file a notice of intent to proceed*
10 *with the appeal not later than 30 days after the party receives notice that the*
11 *corrected or supplemental judgment has been entered.]*

12 **(4)(a) When an appeal is pending and the trial court enters an**
13 **amended, corrected or supplemental judgment, or an amended or cor-**
14 **rected order that is appealable under ORS 138.060, section 3 of this 2017**
15 **Act or any other statutory provision:**

16 **(A) If the appellant intends to assign error to any part of the**
17 **amended, corrected or supplemental judgment, or amended or cor-**
18 **rected order that is appealable, the appellant shall file an amended**
19 **notice of appeal from such judgment or order not later than 30 days**
20 **after the appellant receives notice that such judgment or order has**
21 **been entered.**

22 **(B) If the appellant does not intend to assign error to any part of**
23 **the amended, corrected or supplemental judgment, or amended or**
24 **corrected order that is appealable, the appellant need only file a notice**
25 **of intent to proceed with the appeal not later than 30 days after the**
26 **appellant receives notice that such judgment or order has been en-**
27 **tered. The notice of intent to proceed is not jurisdictional.**

28 **(b) As used in this subsection, “appellant” means the attorney of**
29 **record in the appellate court for the appellant or, if the appellant is**
30 **not represented by an attorney, the appellant personally.**

31 (5)(a) Upon motion of a defendant, the Court of Appeals shall grant the

1 defendant leave to file a notice of appeal after the time limits described in
2 subsections (1) to (4) of this section if:

3 (A) The defendant, by clear and convincing evidence, shows that the
4 failure to file a timely notice of appeal is not attributable to the defendant
5 personally; and

6 (B) The defendant shows a colorable claim of error in the proceeding from
7 which the appeal is taken.

8 (b) A defendant is not entitled to relief under this subsection for failure
9 to file timely notice of cross-appeal when the state appeals pursuant to ORS
10 138.060 [(1)(c) or (2)(a)] **(1)(d)**.

11 (c) The request for leave to file a notice of appeal after the time limits
12 prescribed in subsections (1) to (3) of this section must be filed no later than
13 90 days after entry of the order or judgment being appealed. The request for
14 leave to file a notice of appeal after the time limit prescribed in subsection
15 (4) of this section must be filed no later than 90 days after the party receives
16 notice that the **order or** judgment has been entered. A request for leave
17 under this subsection must be accompanied by the notice of appeal, may be
18 filed by mail and is deemed filed on the date of mailing if the request is
19 mailed as provided in ORS 19.260.

20 (d) The court may not grant relief under this subsection unless the state
21 has notice and opportunity to respond to the defendant's request for relief.

22 (e) The denial of a motion under paragraph (a) of this subsection is a bar
23 to post-conviction relief under ORS 138.510 to 138.680 on the same ground,
24 unless the court provides otherwise.

25 [(6) *As used in this section, "party" means the attorney of record in the*
26 *appellate court for the party or, if the party is not represented by an attorney,*
27 *the party personally.*]

28 **SECTION 8.** ORS 138.081 is amended to read:

29 138.081. (1) An appeal shall be taken by causing a notice of appeal in the
30 form prescribed by ORS 19.250 to be served:

31 (a)(A) **When the defendant appeals,** on the district attorney for the

1 county in which the judgment is entered[, *when the defendant appeals,*] or,
2 if the appeal is under ORS 221.360, on the plaintiff's attorney; or

3 **(B) When the state appeals,** on the attorney of record for the
4 defendant[,] or, if the defendant has no attorney of record, on the
5 defendant[, *when the state appeals*]; [and]

6 (b) On the trial court transcript coordinator if a transcript is required in
7 connection with the appeal; and

8 (c) On the [*clerk of the*] trial court **administrator.**

9 [(2)(a) *The original of the notice shall be filed with the clerk of the court*
10 *to which the appeal is made.*]

11 [(b) *Proof of service of the notice of appeal shall be indorsed on or affixed*
12 *to the original filed with the Court of Appeals or the Supreme Court.*]

13 **(2)(a) If the state cannot effect service on the defendant as provided**
14 **in subsection (1)(a)(B) of this section, the trial court may order alter-**
15 **native service in accordance with ORCP 7 D(6) on proof of the state's**
16 **due diligence in attempting to effect service.**

17 **(b) Alternative service is not perfected until the time established**
18 **by the court for response expires and the state files with the appellate**
19 **court the affidavit or declaration of alternative service.**

20 **(3) The notice of appeal signed by the appellant, along with proof**
21 **of service of the notice, must be filed with the administrator of the**
22 **court to which the appeal is taken. Proof of service of the notice of**
23 **appeal may either be part of, or accompany, the original notice when**
24 **filed.**

26 138.185. [(1) *In an appeal to the Court of Appeals, when the notice of appeal*
27 *is filed, or when the appeal is perfected upon publication of notice as provided*
28 *in ORS 138.120, the record in the trial court shall be prepared and transmitted*
29 *to the State Court Administrator, at Salem, in the manner and within the time*
30 *prescribed in ORS chapter 19.*]

31 [(2)] The provisions of ORS 19.250, 19.260, 19.270, **19.365, 19.370, 19.380,**

REVIEWABILITY

20

21 **SECTION 13. (1) On appeal by a defendant, the appellate court has**
22 **authority to review the judgment or order being appealed, subject to**
23 **the provisions of this section.**

24 **(2) The appellate court has authority to review only questions of**
25 **law appearing on the record.**

26 **(3) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the appellate court**
27 **has authority to review any intermediate decision of the trial court.**

28 **(4) On appeal from a judgment of conviction and sentence, the ap-**
29 **pellate court has authority to review:**

30 **(a) The denial of a motion for new trial based on juror misconduct**
31 **or newly discovered evidence; and**

1 **(b) The denial of a motion in arrest of judgment.**

2 **(5) The appellate court has no authority to review the validity of**
3 **the defendant's plea of guilty or no contest, or a conviction based on**
4 **the defendant's plea of guilty or no contest, except that:**

5 **(a) The appellate court has authority to review the trial court's**
6 **adverse determination of a pretrial motion reserved in a conditional**
7 **plea of guilty or no contest under ORS 135.335.**

8 **(b) The appellate court has authority to review whether the trial**
9 **court erred by not merging determinations of guilt of two or more**
10 **offenses, unless the entry of separate convictions results from an**
11 **agreement between the state and the defendant.**

12 **(6) On appeal from a judgment ordering payment of restitution but**
13 **not specifying the amount of restitution, the appellate court has no**
14 **authority to review the decision to award restitution.**

15 **(7) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (8) and (9) of this**
16 **section, the appellate court has authority to review any sentence to**
17 **determine whether the trial court failed to comply with requirements**
18 **of law in imposing or failing to impose a sentence.**

19 **(8) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (9) of this section,**
20 **for a sentence imposed on conviction of a felony committed on or after**
21 **November 1, 1989:**

22 **(a) The appellate court has no authority to review:**

23 **(A) A sentence that is within the presumptive sentence prescribed**
24 **by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.**

25 **(B) A sentence of probation when the rules of the Oregon Criminal**
26 **Justice Commission prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment**
27 **but allow a sentence of probation without departure.**

28 **(C) A sentence of imprisonment when the rules of the Oregon**
29 **Criminal Justice Commission prescribe a presumptive sentence of**
30 **imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation without departure.**

31 **(b) If the trial court imposed a sentence that departs from the**

1 **presumptive sentence prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal**
2 **Justice Commission, the appellate court’s authority to review is lim-**
3 **ited to whether the trial court’s findings of fact and reasons justifying**
4 **a departure from the sentence prescribed by the rules of the Oregon**
5 **Criminal Justice Commission:**

6 **(A) Are supported by the evidence in the record; and**

7 **(B) Constitute substantial and compelling reasons for departure.**

8 **(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the appellate**
9 **court has authority to review whether the sentencing court erred:**

10 **(A) In ranking the crime seriousness classification of the current**
11 **crime or in determining the appropriate classification of a prior con-**

15 **(9) The appellate court has no authority to review any part of a**
16 **sentence resulting from a stipulated sentencing agreement between**
17 **the state and the defendant.**

18 **(10)(a) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is**
19 **entered before expiration of the applicable period under ORS 138.071**
20 **(1) or (2) during which the original judgment can be appealed, the ap-**
21 **pellate court has authority to review the judgment, including the**
22 **corrections or amendments, as provided in this section.**

23 **(b) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is entered**
24 **after expiration of the applicable period under ORS 138.071 (1) or (2)**
25 **during which the original judgment was or could have been appealed,**
26 **the appellate court has authority to review, as provided in this section,**
27 **only the corrected or amended part of the judgment, any part of the**
28 **judgment affected by the correction or amendment, or the trial court’s**
29 **decision under section 20 of this 2017 Act not to correct or amend the**
30 **judgment.**

31 **(c) As used in this subsection, “judgment” means any appealable**

1 **judgment or order.**

2 **(11)(a) On a defendant's cross-appeal under section 3 (5) of this 2017**
3 **Act, the appellate court may, in its discretion, limit review to any**
4 **decision by the trial court that is inextricably linked, either factually**
5 **or legally, to the state's appeal.**

6 **(b) The failure to file a cross-appeal under section 3 (5) of this 2017**
7 **Act does not waive a defendant's right to assign error to a particular**
8 **ruling of the trial court on appeal from a judgment.**

9 **SECTION 14. (1) On appeal by the state, the appellate court has**
10 **authority to review the judgment or order being appealed, subject to**
11 **the provisions of this section.**

12 **(2) The appellate court has authority to review only questions of**
13 **law appearing on the record.**

14 **(3) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the appellate court**
15 **has authority to review any intermediate decision involving the merits**
16 **of, or necessarily affecting, the judgment or order from which the**
17 **appeal is taken.**

18 **(4)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, on**
19 **appeal from a judgment of conviction of any felony, the appellate**
20 **court has authority to review only the sentence as provided by sub-**
21 **sections (5) and (6) of this section.**

22 **(b) The appellate court has authority to review whether the trial**
23 **court erred in merging determinations of guilt of two or more of-**
24 **fenses, unless the merger of determinations of guilt resulted from an**
25 **agreement between the state and the defendant.**

26 **(5) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (6) and (7) of this**
27 **section, the appellate court has authority to review the sentence im-**
28 **posed on conviction of any felony to determine whether the trial court**
29 **failed to comply with requirements of law in imposing or failing to**
30 **impose a sentence.**

31 **(6) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (7) of this section,**

1 for a sentence imposed on conviction of a felony committed on or after
2 November 1, 1989:

3 (a) The appellate court has no authority to review:

4 (A) A sentence that is within the presumptive sentence prescribed
5 by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

6 (B) A sentence of probation when the rules of the Oregon Criminal
7 Justice Commission prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment
8 but allow a sentence of probation without departure.

9 (C) A sentence of imprisonment when the rules of the Oregon
10 Criminal Justice Commission prescribe a presumptive sentence of
11 imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation without departure.

12 (b) If the trial court imposed a sentence that departs from the
13 presumptive sentence prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal
14 Justice Commission, the appellate court's authority to review is lim-
15 ited to whether the trial court's findings of fact and reasons justifying

DETERMINATION ON APPEAL

17 SECTION 15. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the
18 appellate court may affirm, reverse, vacate or modify the judgment
19 or order, or any part thereof, from which the appeal was taken.

25 tify, is unable to communicate about the abuse or sexual conduct because
26 of fear or other similar reason or is substantially likely, as established by

21 (H) Whether the declarant's young age or disability makes it unlikely
22 that the declarant fabricated a statement that represents a graphic, detailed
23 account beyond the knowledge and experience of the declarant;

24 (I) Whether the statement has internal consistency or coherence and uses
25 terminology appropriate to the declarant's age or to the extent of the
26 declarant's disability if the declarant is a person with a developmental dis-
27 ability;

28 (J) Whether the statement is spontaneous or directly responsive to

1 (d) This subsection applies to a child declarant, a declarant who is an

3 velopmental disability. For the purposes of this subsection, “developmental
4 disability” means any disability attributable to mental retardation, autism,
5 cerebral palsy, epilepsy or other disabling neurological condition that re-
6 quires training or support similar to that required by persons with mental
7 retardation, if either of the following apply:

8 (A) The disability originates before the person attains 22 years of age, or
9 if the disability is attributable to mental retardation the condition is mani-

27 (22) Evidence of a final judgment, entered after a trial or upon a plea of

31 prosecution for purposes other than impeachment, judgments against persons

1 other than the accused. The pendency of an appeal may be shown but does

3 (23) Judgments as proof of matters of personal, family or general history,

6 (24) Notwithstanding the limits contained in subsection (18a) of this sec-
7 tion, in any proceeding in which a child under 12 years of age at the time
8 of trial, or a person with a developmental disability as described in sub-
9 section (18a)(d) of this section, may be called as a witness to testify con-
10 cerning an act of abuse, as defined in ORS 419B.005, or sexual conduct
11 performed with or on the child or person with a developmental disability by

22 appeal from the order pursuant to ORS 138.060 [(1)(c) or (2)(a)] **(1)(d)**.

23 (4) If the court determines that the defendant previously was convicted
24 of the offense and that the conviction is valid, or if the defendant does not
25 file and serve a notice under subsection (1) of this section, the previous
26 conviction shall be admitted at trial or, if the previous conviction is relevant
27 to an enhancement fact described in ORS 136.770 (4) or 136.773 (1), during
28 the sentencing phase of the proceeding. If the previous conviction is admit-
29 ted, the defendant may dispute whether the defendant previously was con-
30 victed of the alleged offense but may not challenge the validity of the
31 conviction. If the previous conviction is a material element of the charged

1 offense or is an enhancement fact, the state must prove the previous con-
2 viction beyond a reasonable doubt unless the defendant stipulates to the fact
3 of the previous conviction in accordance with ORS 136.433.

4 (5) For purposes of this section, a previous conviction is not valid if:

5 (a) In the proceedings resulting in the conviction, the defendant was not
6 represented by counsel and was deprived of the right to counsel in violation
7 of the state or federal Constitution and the defendant is entitled under either
8 Constitution to challenge the validity of the prior conviction in the pro-
9 ceeding before the court.

10 (b) Before the defendant committed the charged offense, the previous
11 conviction was vacated by the court of conviction, reversed or set aside by
12 a court of competent jurisdiction, expunged or pardoned.

13 **SECTION 23.** ORS 137.020 is amended to read:

14 137.020. (1) After a plea or verdict of guilty, or after a verdict against the
15 defendant on a plea of former conviction or acquittal, if the judgment is not
16 arrested or a new trial granted, the court shall appoint a time for pro-
17 nouncing judgment.

18 (2)(a) The time appointed shall be at least two calendar days after the
19 plea or verdict if the court intends to remain in session so long. If the court
20 does not intend to remain in session at least two calendar days, the time
21 appointed may be sooner than two calendar days, but shall be as remote a
22 time as can reasonably be allowed. However, in the latter case, the judgment
23 shall not be given less than six hours after the plea or verdict, except with
24 the consent of the defendant.

25 (b) Except for good cause shown or as otherwise provided in this para-
26 graph, a court shall not delay for more than 31 calendar days after the plea
27 or verdict the sentencing of a defendant held in custody on account of the
28 pending proceedings. Except for good cause shown or as otherwise provided
29 in this paragraph, a court shall not delay for more than 56 calendar days
30 after the plea or verdict the sentencing of a defendant not held in custody
31 on account of the pending proceedings. If the defendant is not in custody and

1 the court does not pronounce judgment within 56 calendar days after the plea
2 or verdict, any period of probation imposed as a part of a subsequent judg-
3 ment shall begin to run from the date of the plea or verdict.

4 (3) If the defendant is in custody following the verdict, the court shall
5 pronounce judgment as soon as practicable, but in any case within seven
6 calendar days following the verdict if no presentence investigation is or-
7 dered, and within seven calendar days after delivery of the presentence re-
8 port to the court if a presentence investigation has been ordered; however,
9 the court may delay pronouncement of judgment beyond the limits of this
10 subsection for good cause shown.

11 (4) If the final calendar day a defendant must be sentenced is not a judi-
12 cial day then sentencing may be delayed until the next judicial day.

13 (5)(a) At the time a court pronounces judgment the defendant, if present,
14 shall be advised of the right to appeal and of the procedure for protecting
15 that right. If the defendant is not present, the court shall advise the de-
16 fendant in writing of the right to appeal and of the procedure for protecting
17 that right.

18 (b) If **the trial court sentences** the defendant [*is sentenced*] subsequent
19 to a plea of guilty or no contest or upon probation revocation or sentence
20 suspension, or if **the trial court sentences** the defendant [*is resentenced*]
21 after [*an order by*] **judgment of** an appellate court or a post-conviction relief
22 court, the court shall advise the defendant of the limitations on
23 [*appealability*] **reviewability** imposed by [*ORS 138.050 (1) and 138.222 (7)*]
24 **section 13 of this 2017 Act in person or, if the defendant is not present,**
25 **in writing.** [*If the defendant is not present, the court shall advise the de-*
26 *fendant in writing of the limitations on appealability imposed by ORS 138.050*
27 *(1) and 138.222 (7).*]

28 (6) If the defendant is financially eligible for appointment of counsel at
29 state expense on appeal under ORS 138.500, trial counsel shall determine
30 whether the defendant wishes to pursue an appeal. If the defendant wishes
31 to pursue an appeal, trial counsel shall transmit to the office of public de-

1 fense services established under ORS 151.216, on a form prepared by the of-
2 fice, information necessary to perfect the appeal.

3 **SECTION 24.** ORS 137.079 is amended to read:

4 137.079. (1) A copy of the presentence report and all other written infor-
5 mation concerning the defendant that the court considers in the imposition
6 of sentence shall be made available to the district attorney, the defendant
7 or defendant's counsel at least five judicial days before the sentencing of the
8 defendant. All other written information, when received by the court outside
9 the presence of counsel, shall either be summarized by the court in a mem-
10 orandum available for inspection or summarized by the court on the record
11 before sentence is imposed.

12 (2) The court may except from disclosure parts of the presentence report
13 or other written information described in subsection (1) of this section which
14 are not relevant to a proper sentence, diagnostic opinions which might seri-
15 ously disrupt a program of rehabilitation if known by the defendant, or
16 sources of information which were obtainable with an expectation of
17 confidentiality.

18 (3) If parts of the presentence report or other written information de-
19 scribed in subsection (1) of this section are not disclosed under subsection
20 (2) of this section, the court shall inform the parties that information has
21 not been disclosed and shall state for the record the reasons for the court's
22 action. The action of the court in excepting information shall be reviewable
23 on appeal.

24 (4) A defendant who is being sentenced for felonies committed prior to
25 November 1, 1989, may file a written motion to correct the criminal history
26 contained in the presentence report prior to the date of sentencing. At sen-
27 tencing, the court shall consider defendant's motion to correct the presen-
28 tence report and shall correct any factual errors in the criminal history
29 contained in that report. An order allowing or denying a motion made pur-
30 suant to this subsection shall not be reviewable on appeal. If corrections are
31 made by the court, only corrected copies of the report shall be provided to

1 individuals or agencies pursuant to ORS 137.077.

2 (5)(a) The provisions of this subsection apply only to a defendant being
3 sentenced for a felony committed on or after November 1, 1989.

4 (b) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, the
5 defendant's criminal history as set forth in the presentence report shall sat-
6 isfy the state's burden of proof as to the defendant's criminal history.

7 (c) Prior to the date of sentencing, the defendant shall notify the district
8 attorney and the court in writing of any error in the criminal history as set
9 forth in the presentence report. Except to the extent that any disputed
10 portion is later changed by agreement of the district attorney and defendant
11 with the approval of the court, the state shall have the burden of proving
12 by a preponderance of evidence any disputed part of the defendant's criminal
13 history. The court shall allow the state reasonable time to produce evidence
14 to meet its burden.

15 (d) The court shall correct any error in the criminal history as reflected
16 in the presentence report.

17 (e) If corrections to the presentence report are made by the court, only
18 corrected copies of the report shall be provided to individuals or agencies
19 pursuant to ORS 137.077.

20 (f) Except as provided in [*ORS 138.222*] **sections 13 and 14 of this 2017**
21 **Act**, the court's decision on issues relating to a defendant's criminal history
22 shall not be reviewable on appeal.

23 **SECTION 25.** ORS 138.697 is amended to read:

24 138.697. (1) A person described in ORS 138.690 may appeal to the Court
25 of Appeals from a circuit court's final order or judgment denying or limiting
26 DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) testing under ORS 138.692, denying appointment
27 of counsel under ORS 138.694 or denying a motion for a new trial under ORS
28 138.696.

29 (2) The state may appeal to the Court of Appeals from a circuit court's
30 final order or judgment granting a motion for DNA testing under ORS
31 138.692 or granting a motion for a new trial under ORS 138.696.

1 (3) The time limits described in ORS 138.071, the notice requirements de-
2 scribed in ORS 138.081 and 138.090 and the provisions of ORS 138.225,
3 138.227[, 138.240, 138.250] and 138.255 **and section 15 of this 2017 Act** apply
4 to appeals under this section unless the context requires otherwise.

5 (4) A circuit court shall appoint counsel to represent a person described
6 in ORS 138.690 on appeal in the same manner as for criminal defendants
7 under ORS 138.500.
