What is Differential Response?

"Safe Children - Strong, Supported Families"

Differential Response is a family-centered approach for families struggling with issues of child abuse or neglect.





Why Differential Response?

Child Safety

Family Preservation

 Safe and Equitable Reduction of Children in Foster Care





Alternative and Traditional Tracks

Traditional Response (TR)

The most serious reports of child abuse or neglect.

Alternative Response (AR)

Removing dispositions and recognizing family as the experts of their own families are two parts of Alternative Response.



Early Oregon Findings

Children are just as safe in DR counties as non-DR counties


Child safety is not diminished

Families, workers, and community partners are satisfied


 No statistically significant differences in re-reports, recurrence of abuse or child removal

Child Fatalities Due to Abuse/Neglect





Benefits of Practice Change

- ✓ Keeping children safe in their home when appropriate
- ✓ Positive relationships with community partner organizations
- ✓ Workers feel supported with the increased training
- ✓ Families say they feel positively engaged





Child Safety Outcomes

Today...

- Children are just as safe in DR counties as non-DR counties
- Child safety is not diminished
- Community partners and Tribes are more satisfied
- No statistically significant differences in re-reports, recurrence of abuse or child removal

Next 3 years...

- Re-reports reduced over time
- Re-abuse reduced over time
- Foster care entry reduced over time
- Long term costs neutral
- Reduce disproportionality



Lessons Learned

- Take time to plan and prepare
- Solicit & use stakeholder buy-in
- Facilitate peer-to-peer learning
- Ensure service availability & strengthen community relationships
- Implementation of change is a developmental process

- Staffing Shortages/ Workload
- Fidelity to Oregon Safety Model
- Fidelity to DR Model
- Fidelity to Screening
- Accountability
- Culture Change
- Improved Data
