Vision: Lifelong health for all people in Oregon


Mission: Promoting health and preventing the leading

- » Ensuring equitable access to quality health_care


2017-19 Public Health Division Organizational Chart



The State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) priorities


- Prevent and reduce tobacco use

Per capita cigarette pack sales in Oregon, 1997 and 2015




Since TPEP started, Oregon's per capita cigarette pack sales have declined by more than 50%.

Obesity among Oregon adults and youth, 2001-2015



Presence of sealants in Oregon children aged 6 to 9 years old






Population health measures: Substance use

Rate per 100,000 population





Rate per 100,000 population






KPM: Childhood Immunization Rates (Population)

The number of fully vaccinated 2-year olds increased by 23% from 2013 to 2015.



Hepatitis C deaths in Oregon and the US, 2000-2015


Age-adjusted rate per 100,000 population



General Fund in the OHA Public Health 2017–19 Governor's budget









Public Health Division Budget 2017–19 Total Funds by Service









Public Health Division Major program changes 2015-2017

Additions

- Marijuana Legalization (HB5047)
- Marijuana Youth Prevention Campaign (HB2014)
- Public Health Modernization planning and assessment
- Emergency Preparedness and Response investment
- Extend dental pilot and expand dental sealants (SB606/660)

Reductions

- General Fund reduced and Medical marijuana ending balance redirected to be used as part of the per capita distribution to local public health programs
- Caseload and funding adjustments for C-Care and BCCP



Public Health Division Major program changes 2015-2017

New Responsibilities

- Public Health Modernization (HB3100)
- DEQ/PHD Cleaner Air Oregon Initiative
- Prescription Drug Monitoring Program
- Oregon Health Licensing Office Transfer
- Care Assist Prescription Drug Program Transfer
- Substance Abuse and Tobacco Prevention Transfer



Governor's Budget 2017-19 funding - HB 5027

Investments

- Support to continue the collaborative work with DEQ on the Governor's Cleaner Air Oregon Initiative (POP)- \$720,290 in General Funds
- Increasing the price of a pack of cigarettes by 85 cents to provide additional funding to support tobacco cessation strategies that target youth and vulnerable populations. (\$4.5 million)
- Support for Other Fund fee increases to fund the current service level for licensing Hospice, In-Home Care, Health Facilities Plan Review, Newborn Screening, Oregon Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program, Toxic Free Kids Act, and Immunization Alert Registry.

Reductions

5-10% administrative reduction
