

Oregon lawmakers must act now to protect and stabilize Oregon families and communities!

Today, current law provides little protection for tenants against sudden no-cause terminations and huge rent increases. 4 out of 10 Oregonians rent their homes across the state are at constant risk of upheaval, even if they have paid their rent on time and followed the rules of their lease.

Extremely low vacancy rates across the state mean that tenants who have been evicted without cause, or forced out by rent increases, are suddenly facing homelessness.

When families are evicted, they lose more than a home – they lose their communities, their savings, and their hope for the future.

I called her in for an academic warning when she broke down crying so embarrassed that she was homeless, her rent increased more than what she could afford so she was couch surfing not sure where she should be & didn't always have clothes on her.
