Senator Frederick

- 1) What is the impact to the community and to OSP with the Pendleton Forensics Lab closure
- 2) What is the impact to the community and to OSP with the reduction of the Drug Enforcement Section?
- 3) I would like more information on SafeOregon.

Response:

1)

- A) Impact of the Pendleton lab closure on community:
 - a. Crime scene response to locations in eastern Oregon is likely to be delayed by as much as five hours (or potentially more during winter weather).
 - b. Some forensic testing will be delayed by up to a week due to shipping time.
 - c. Same-day "rush" testing of drugs will no longer be available.
 - d. Local law enforcement agencies will bear evidence shipping cost to lab.
 - e. Community will lose a convenient education and training resource for law enforcement.
 - f. Community will lose several more family wage jobs.
- B) Impact of Pendleton lab closure on OSP:
 - g. Lab system will benefit from moving under-utilized supervisor position to an undersupervised lab.
 - h. Processing efficiency will improve due to analysts working in an adequate facility.
 - i. Lab will experience more analyst time-loss due to long travel times to and from eastern Oregon counties for testimony or training
 - j. OSP lab personnel will lose the benefit of familiarity with eastern Oregon police agencies, and familiarity facilitates and improves our work.
 - k. OSP will bear the cost of shipping evidence back to police agencies
- 2) The Oregon State Police (OSP) has 27 General Fund Drug Enforcement Section (DES) positions and the Governor's Recommended Budget has identified a cost savings measure by eliminating 19 of the 27 positions. This reduction would also eliminate an additional 3 Other Funds DES positions. If this cost saving measure moves forward during the 2017-2019 Legislative session, the remaining 8 DES Detective positions would be focused internally for

investigative purposes related to OSP drug investigations. The exact location where the 8 DES Detective positions would be located in Oregon has not been identified by the Department.

This cost saving measure would mean that OSP would no longer participate in any interagency Drug Enforcement Section Task Forces. The DES is comprised of detectives and sergeants assigned to 14 interagency drug teams located throughout Oregon. This reduction would eliminate OSP's participation on all of these drug teams. A number of these drug teams, especially in rural Oregon, provide a multi-county service. These drug teams are Oregon's only law enforcement resources dedicated to the detection, removal, and prevention of illegal drugs in local communities. Many rural sheriff offices and city police departments rely on OSP personnel to enable these teams to function. Consequently, the withdrawal of OSP may cause many of these drug teams to suspend operations. The following counties would be negatively impacted by the loss of OSP personnel: Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Union, Umatilla, Morrow, Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Marion, Polk, Yamhill, Lincoln, Lane, Tillamook, and Clackamas.

Goal: School Safety Tip Line

Allow students, and other members of the public to use voice, text, phone, photos and videos to confidentially or anonymously transmit messages and information regarding potential harmful or criminal acts against students, school employees, or school property.

- Focus started with public schools PK-12
 - 570,857 students
 - 19 Education Services Districts
 - 211 School Districts
 - 1200+ schools
- Opening to private schools PK-12 now.



Role: Oregon State Police

- HB 4075 directed OSP to set-up and maintain a statewide school safety tip line.
 - Entered into a 5 year contract with vendor.
- Partner with WESD, and others, to make sure the tip line intersects with a threat assessment as necessary.
- Adopted Temporary Rules moving to Permanent Rules by June, 2017.







When Law Enforcement is notified:

Tips are triaged and assessed for level of severity, timeliness, and assistance needed.

CRITICAL immediate or imminent threat of violence, potential self-harm, potential harm or criminal acts.

2 minute notification.

URGENT ongoing or past incidents of violence, self-harm, or criminal acts. High potential for occurring again.


10 minute notification.

90%+

STANDARD peer to peer interactions that schools typically deal with (student arguments, school rule violations). 1 hour notification.

From a Principal of one School using SafeOregon today

"In the two weeks [...] since our launch of SafeOregon we received 20 reports, 18 have been legitimate including bullying [...], suicidal feelings, sexual harassment, and drug use. Action taken has ranged from consultation with law enforcement, suspensions, or counseling the student or group of students.

In one particular instance, a student reported a girl posting suicidal thoughts on social media. SafeOregon called school administration, and the police were involved. The girl was taken to the hospital for evaluation, potentially saving her life. Another student reported her friend was being bullied. [...] The victim came up to me later, gave me a hug and thanked me for protecting and supporting him.

During lunch, students can be heard casually talking about SafeOregon. [...] Students don't always have the maturity or support to navigate a situation alone. SafeOregon has provided our students the opportunity to feel safe so they can be ready to fearn at high levels and be a contributing member of our school community."
