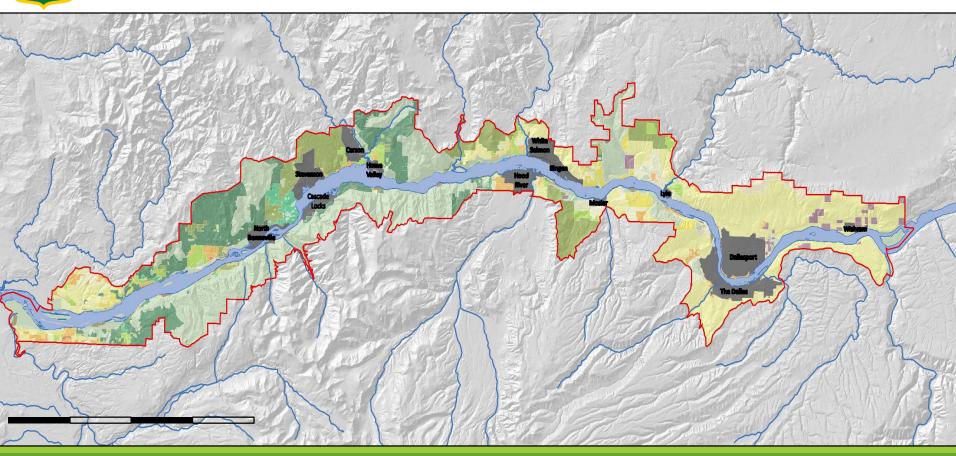

85 miles of the Columbia River 292,500 Acres



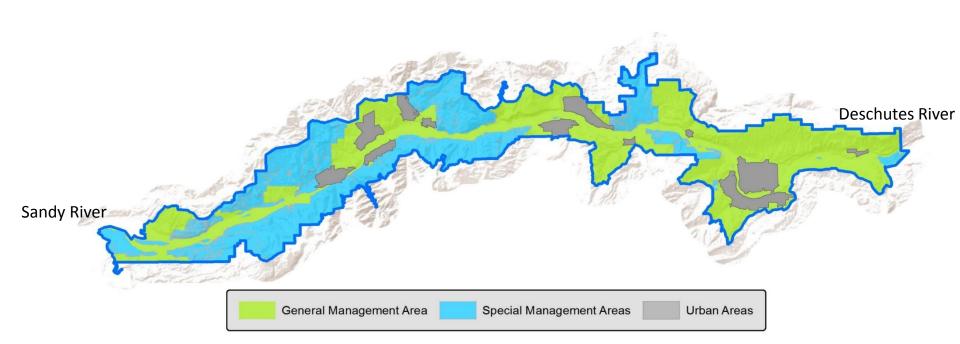

Purposes of National Scenic Area Act (Sec. 3)

Passed by Congress in 1986:

- (1) to establish a national scenic area to protect and provide for the enhancement of the scenic, cultural, recreational, and natural resources of the Columbia River Gorge; and
- (2) to protect and support the economy of the Columbia River Gorge area by encouraging growth to occur in existing urban areas and by allowing future economic development in a manner that is consistent with paragraph (1).





Columbia River Gorge Commission

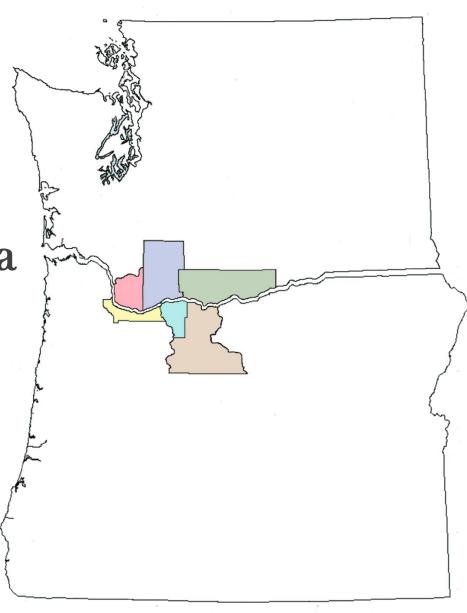
- Bi-state regional planning agency created by an <u>interstate compact</u> between Oregon and Washington under the authority of a federal National Scenic Area Act
- Mission is to establish, implement and enforce policies through a long-range comprehensive management plan for the bi-state Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area to fulfill purposes of the Act



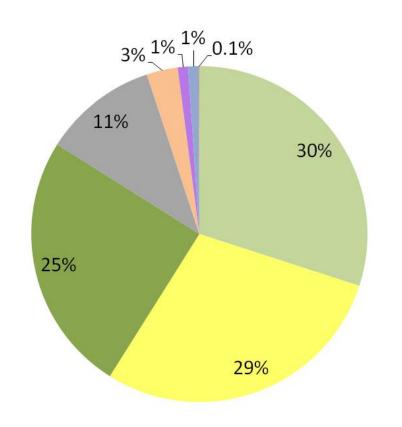


The National Scenic Area

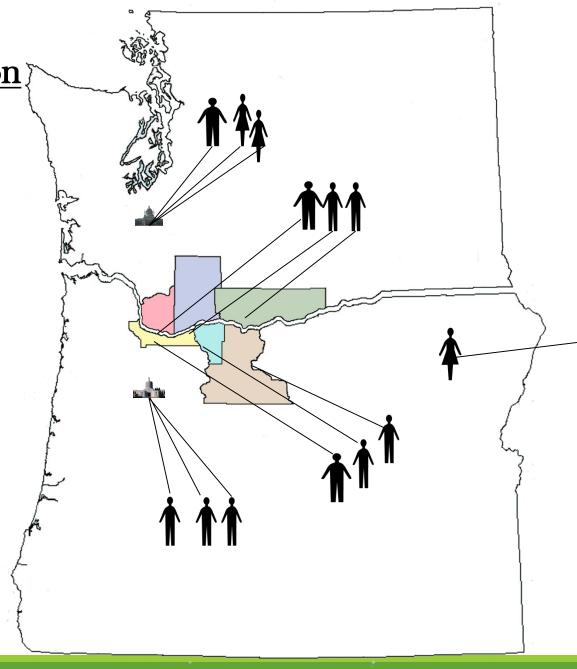

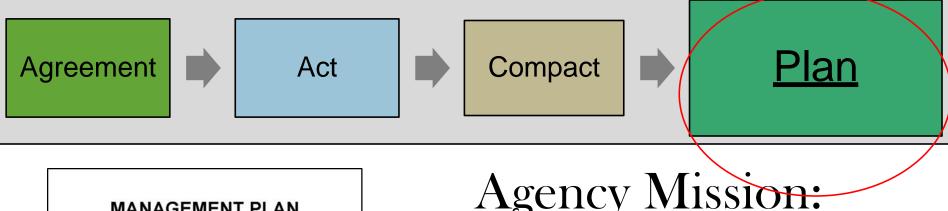
13 Members

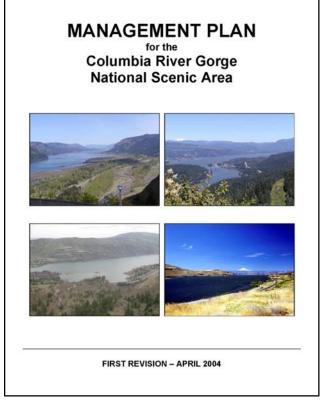
Each county selects one county resident to be a member of the Gorge Commission.

The Governor of each state selects three people to be members of the Commission.

The United States Secretary of Agriculture selects one USFS employee to be a member of the Gorge Commission, but they do not have a vote.

- NSA Act Requirement to Review the Management Plan is 2 Years Overdue
- Need to Pro-Actively Engage and Respond to the Public, Agencies and Treaty Tribes in the Gorge 2020 Management Review Process
- Rapidly Growing Regional Recreation Demands Requires a Coordinated Bi-state Interagency Response with Gorge Commission
- Need for Thorough and Consistent Review of All County Development Applications
- Continue to Review, Issue Permits, Do Inspections for Klickitat County
- Need for More Bi-state Coordination Around Regional Issues in the NSA
- Increased Demand for Gorge Commission to Review, Provide Support or Comment on Proposed Projects with Impacts on NSA Resources

- ❖ Requirement for Oregon and Washington to Fund Equally



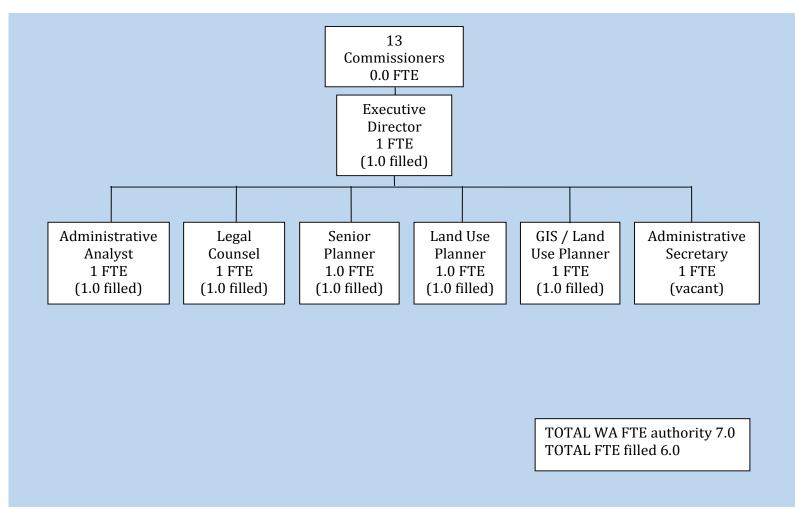

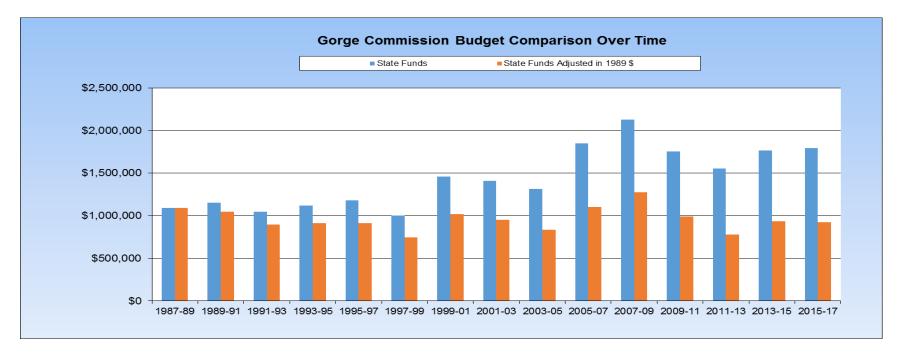


Organizational Chart: 2015-2017

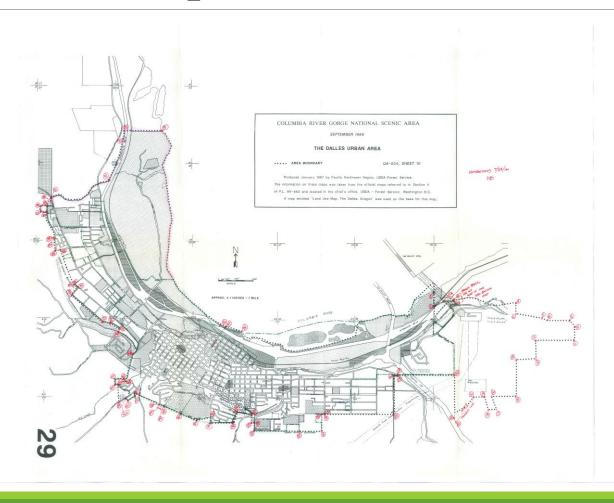

Urban Area Legal Descriptions Example: The Dalles





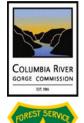

Act's Standards for Management Plan

- ❖ Protect and enhance agricultural lands, forest lands, open spaces, recreation resources, educational and interpretive opportunities. Sec. 6(d)(1)-(4)
- Prohibit major development in special management areas. Sec. 6(d)(5)
- Prohibit industrial development outside of urban areas. Sec. 6(d)(6)
- Require that commercial, residential, and mining operations take place without adversely affecting scenic, cultural, recreation, and natural resources. Sec. 6(d)(7)-(9)



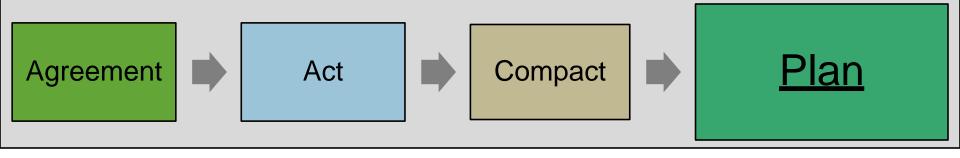


GORGE 2020 Review and Revision

Revision: Actual changes to the Management Plan to address the identified issues.

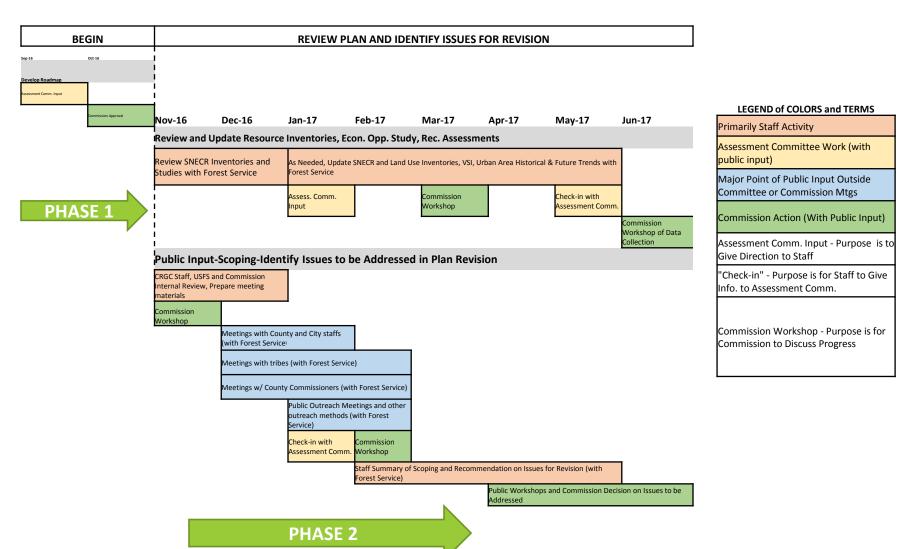

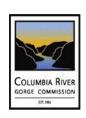

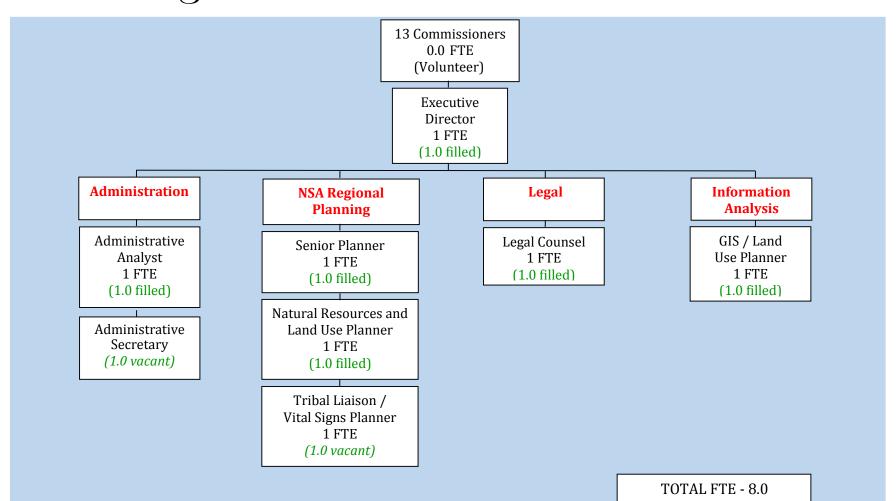

POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 103

Title: Vital Signs Indicators and Treaty Tribe Engagement

Governor's Recommended Budget: \$125,000

GORGE COMMISSION REQUEST: Additional resources to more proactively engage with the four Treaty Tribes in the Management Plan Review Process and further develop the Vital Sign Indicators Monitoring and Evaluation Program.

This will enable the Commission to:

- Improve communications and collaboration with the public, agencies, and treaty tribes in a Government to Government consultation process.
- Improve administrative efficiencies and improve customer service
- Contract with experts needed for further developing the revisions to the Management Plan



POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 101

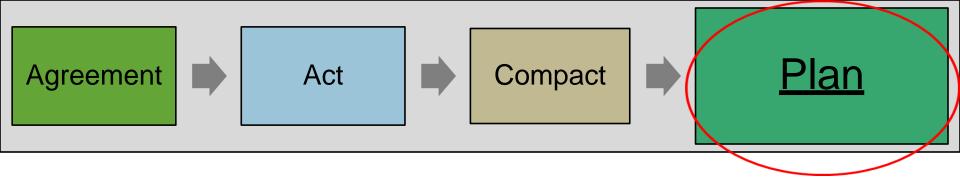
Title: Oregon Commissioner Expenses

Governor's Recommended Budget: \$13,709

GORGE COMMISSION REQUEST: Additional resources to increase support of Oregon Commissioner expenses. The Oregon Commissioner funding at the current service level has been inadequate to meet the Commission's engagement level.

The additional funding will:

- Allow Oregon Commissioners to engage in Commission business at the same level as their Washington colleagues
- Enable the Commission to cover actual costs of Commissioner engagement in Commission business. The 13-member Commission meets every month and the 6-member Executive Committee meets every month as well, with both meetings requiring travel and compensation.

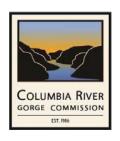
Proposed Reductions from Current Levels



5%: Reduce travel, IT support and security, equipment services and maintenance, eliminate legal services

10%: Plus eliminate all non-essential travel (public meetings and compliance monitoring) and substitute phone calls for in-person meetings, reduce # of Commissioners meetings and travel

15%: Plus reduce 3 senior positions to .85 FTE and halt all work on the Gorge 2020 management plan update
