HB 2038 maintains current funding levels of Oregon's Farm to school program state wide. Organizations such as Supa Fresh in Tigard producing for their own schools would be amazing. Organic and small farmers should definitely be the only ones allowed to be a part of this program. It's a way to help both the student eat healthy and for these true small farms and organizations such as Supa Fresh dedicated to best practices stay alive in Oregon.

HB 2085 Beginner farm tax credit to encourage landowners to lease land to those interested in farming. With the most tax credits going to organic and/ or transitioning to organic certified land.

HB 2469 allowing for local regulations of genetically engineered crops to protect farmers whose crops may be at risk of contamination due to lack of state oversight.

On that note, please vote yes on HB 2739 allowing farmers who discover unwanted genetically engineered material on their land to seek damages from patent-holders of those crops. Again, this supports the small farmer who gets little to no help except from the consumer.
