As a dog lover who has known and enjoyed the company of many Border Collies over the years, in no way do I mean to disparage this amazing breed of dog. They are known for their keen intellect, nonstop work ethic, and boundless energy. Border Collies have indeed played an important role in Oregon's history, and continue to lend their talents and abilities throughout our state as working stock dogs, therapy animals, and family companions.

Sadly, as I write this, it is likely there are dozens, and maybe even hundreds of purebred Border Collies languishing in Oregon animal shelters, along with a wide assortment of other purebred and mixed-breed dogs. Rather than showcase one particular breed over another, we would prefer to see Oregon lawmakers support HCR 16, the bill to designate shelter dogs as the official Oregon state dog.

Oregon's animal shelter community works tirelessly to do a largely thankless job in caring for the homeless dogs who for whatever reason find themselves awaiting adoption in both public and private animal shelters. Shelter professionals work to rehabilitate these animals, many of whom have been abandoned, abused, and neglected, and match them to good, permanent, loving homes. For their resilience in the face of adversity, their unconditional love, and their willingness to love again after enduring mistreatment at the hands of humans, we believe shelter dogs have earned the right be recognized as Oregon's official state dog.
