Food Insecurity

A household is "food insecure" if


- it is "uncertain of having, or being able to acquire, enough food to meet basic needs of all household members
- because they had *insufficient money* and other resources for food".

A household has "very low food security" [until 2006 was identified as "food insecure with hunger"] if

- •"one or more household members were *hungry*, at least at some time during the year,
- because they couldn't afford enough food"


