### House Bill 2625 – Forfeiture (Position: Support)

March 29, 2017

Dear Chair Barker, Vice Chairs Olsen and Williamson, and Committee Members:

The Oregon Veterinary Medical Association supports House Bill 2625.

With regard to larger-scale animal neglect and cruelty cases, we believe that prosecutors should have discretion when considering charges – and this bill provides that allowance.

In reviewing HB 2625, we find that a forfeiture petition of impounded animals does not deny an owner of due process. A contested hearing and finding of probable cause by a judge is required before an animal is forfeited. In addition, the animal owner still has the opportunity to avoid forfeiture by paying a bond that would allow for the animal's care before trial.

We ask that you also support this legislation, and appreciate your consideration.
