As a stream ecologist I have worked on watersheds in Eastern, Central and Western Oregon for decades. Thus, I've seen firsthand the value of flowing waters and riparian zones in grasslands of our arid plateaus, woodlands of our valleys, and forests of our mountains. I believe that personnel of ODFW are absolutely critical to the management of water quality, natural resources and recreational values of these streams and rivers. Despite appalling underfunding these dedicated individuals are our frontline people-power in maintaining and conserving our aquatic resources. They deploy skills as scientists understanding the environment, as well as managers and communicators working with communities.

I believe fully funding the water program budget detailed in the Policy Option Package should be given high priority if we are to maintain the environmental quality standards for which our state is famous.
