I knew he needed more of his steroid meds and that's the protocol in the er for him. Our nurse got his iv going and administered his solu-cortef. Within 20 minutes he was feeling better. The reason I'm telling you this is because when the ER doc who had never met us before came in he said that for a gashing head wound he wouldn't normally give extra steroids. I looked at him in shock and said that that was against what the specialists advise. So this is why SB215 would save lives. What if I didn't have a protocol in place?
