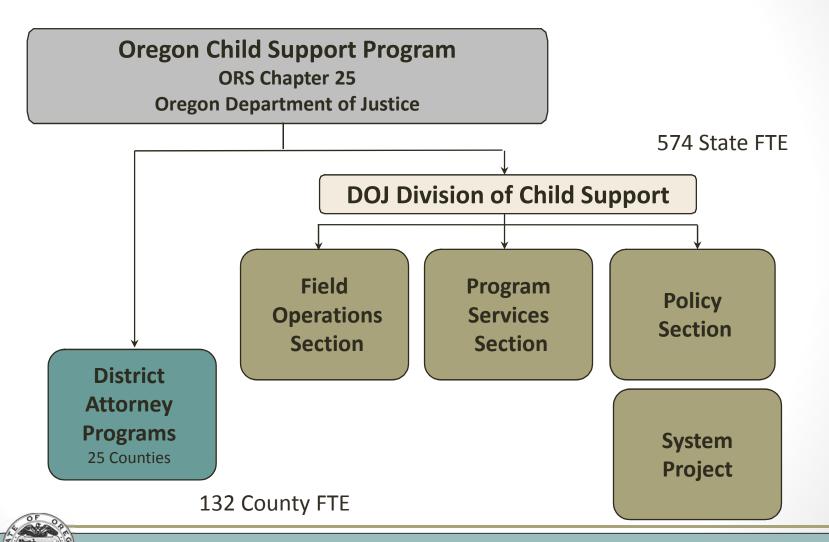

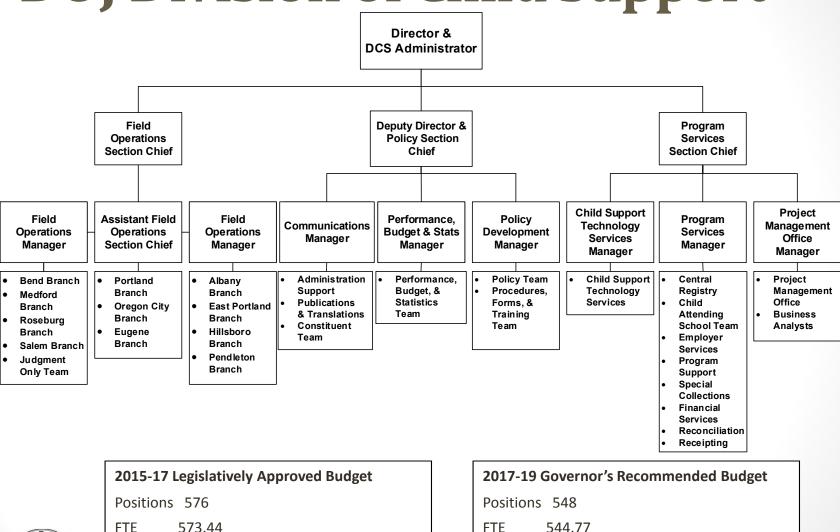

Whom do we serve?

Oregon's program provides services for all families

- who are currently or were formerly receiving Temporary
 Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or Medicaid
- who have never received public assistance and apply directly for child support services
- when a child is in the care and custody of the state Child
 Welfare system (including the Oregon Youth Authority)

There is no "means test" for services



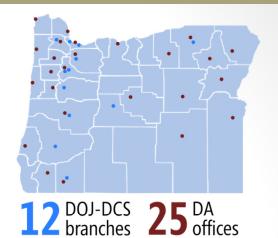
What do we do?

- Locate parents and assets
- Establish paternity/parentage
- Establish child and medical support orders
- Enforce orders and collect payments
- Modify and adjust child support orders
- Manage accounting and recordkeeping
- Receive and distribute collections

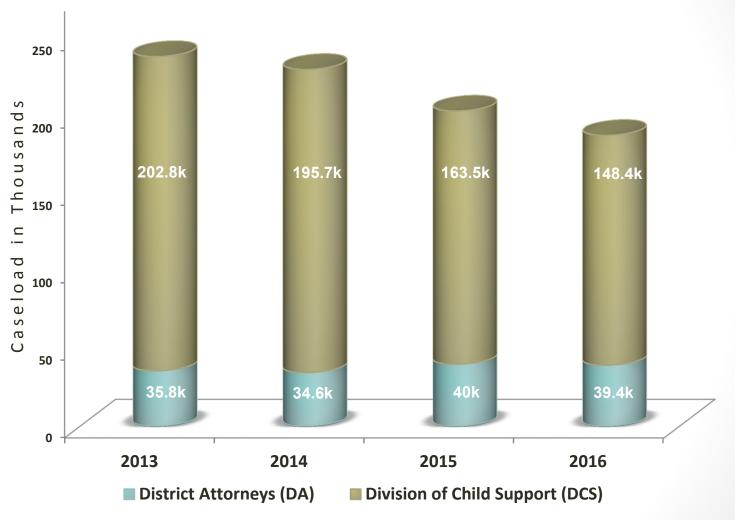

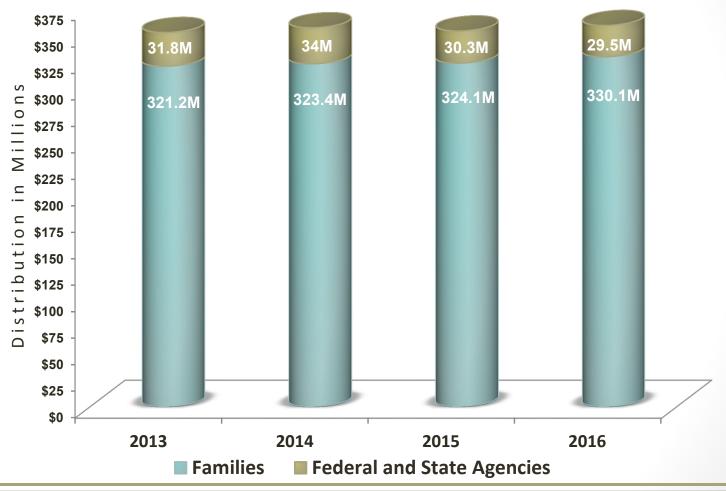
Enforcement & Collection

Some of the proverbial "tools in the tool box"

- Income withholding and mandated new hire reporting
- Employer health insurance or cash medical
- Unemployment and workers compensation withholding
- Interception of federal disbursements, state and federal tax refunds, and lottery winnings
- Compliance agreements
- Bank data matches and garnishments
- Professional, recreational, and occupational license restriction
- Federally mandated passport restriction
- Liens on property and money awards

Leveraged Funds

Investing state funds in the Child Support Program yields a high return on investment.

- Every \$1 of state general funds spent on child support is matched by \$2 of federal funds
- In FFY 2016, the Oregon Child Support Program collected \$365
 million, including \$330.1 million for families, reducing the need
 for public assistance and avoiding additional costs for taxpayers
- In FFY 2016, the Oregon Child Support Program recovered
 \$29.6 million for state agencies

231 - Declining Recoveries

Revenue Restoration Package

Ongoing loss of recoveries resulted in 070 – Revenue Reduction

DCS collects TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) recoveries as revenue for operations expenses

- State assigned TANF recoveries continue to decline due to law changes
- TANF caseloads diminishing both nationally and in Oregon
- Increase in percentage of collections going to Oregon families

Reduction in Other Funds operating revenue results in related loss of matching federal funding.

• \$1.7 million reduction in recoveries + \$3.3 million related reduction in federal match = **total reduction of \$5 million**



241 - Information Technology

Child Support System Project

All states must maintain a child support automated system that meets federal certification requirements.

- Oregon's current system (CSEAS) is one of the oldest systems in the nation, using components and databases from the 1970s that are obsolete, difficult to use, and complex to maintain
- The Program is working with its federal oversight office on a multi-year, federally-prescribed process to replace its federally-certified system
- Policy Package 241 allows the Program to stay in compliance with federal requirements, compete for federal incentives, keep up with increasing caseload demands, and meet information security requirements

Reduction Impact

A 15% reduction would result in drastic Program impacts

Loss of 112 positions throughout the Division of Child Support.

Cascading Effect

- Collections for families reduced by \$126 million per biennium
- Pass-through funds to families reduced by \$850,000 per biennium
- Oher agency collections reduced by \$3.5 million per biennium
- Program recoveries used for operating would be reduced by \$2.9 million per biennium; reducing federal funding by \$5.7 million; Additional loss of \$8.6 million

Families Suffer

- Caseload per FTE would increase by 24%
- Modifications and order establishments decline by 24% each

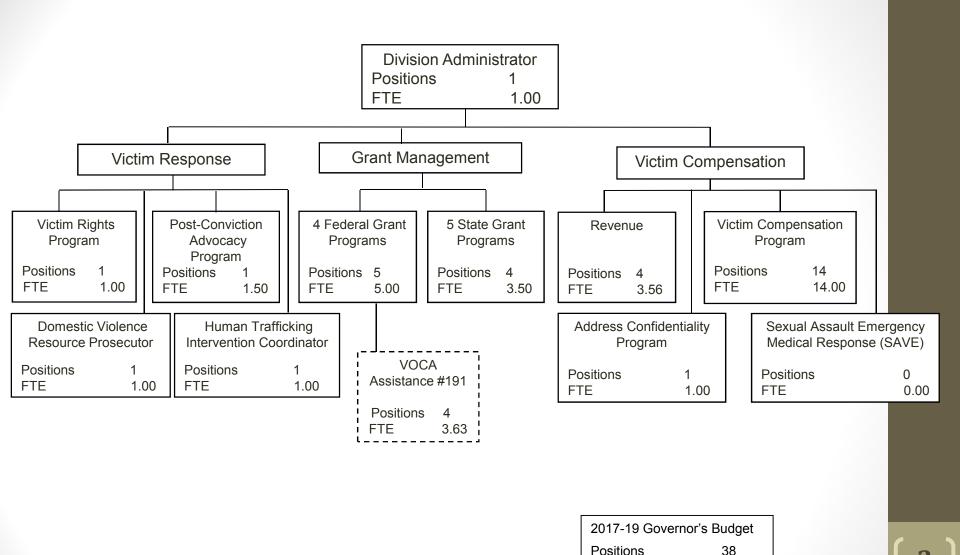

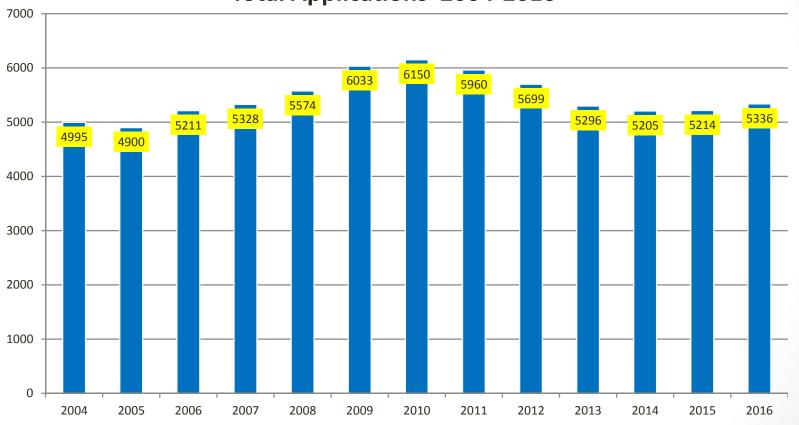
Financial compensation to victims of violent crime

Total Compensation Claims Received

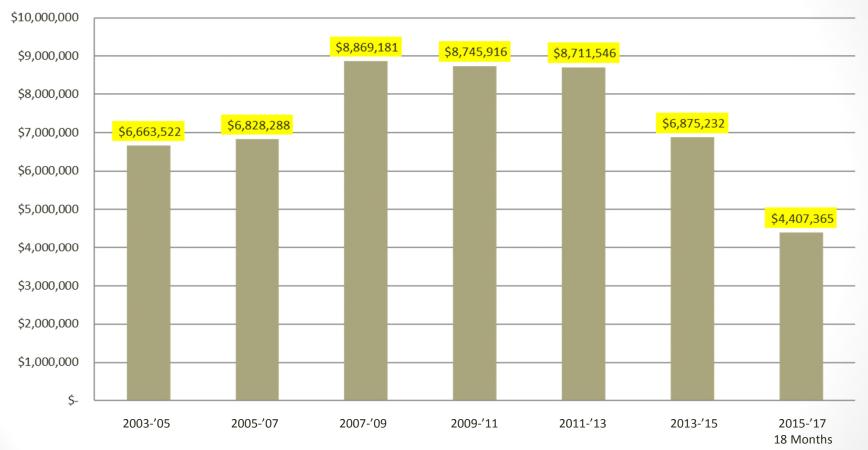
Total Applications 2004-2016





Compensation Payments

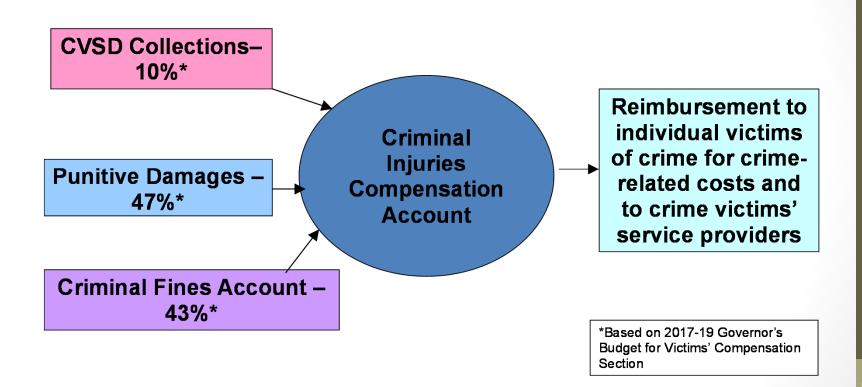
Payments 2003-2016

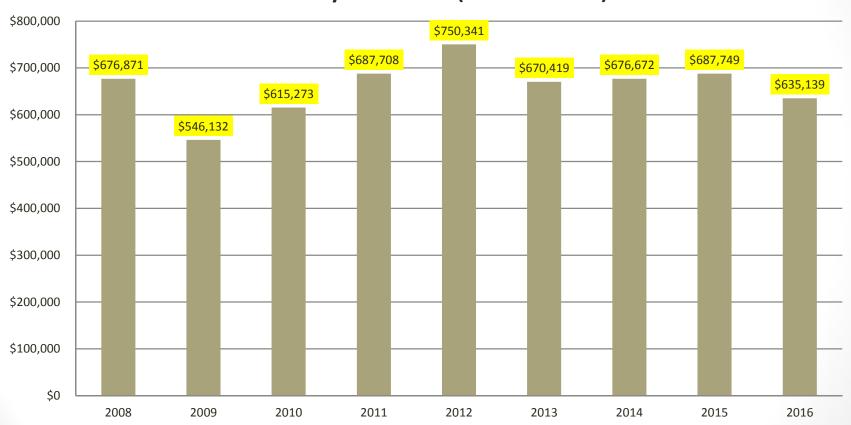
2 revenue agents collect \$1.3 million each biennium

Child Abuse Multidisciplinary Intervention (CAMI) Grants

36 MDT Grants: \$10.4 million granted in 2015-2017

5 RSP Grants: \$1.1 million granted in 2015-2017

Services provided:

- Coordinated investigation of child abuse
- Child-sensitive investigations, exams, interviews
- Statewide training for professionals conducting child-abuse assessments



Oregon Domestic and Sexual Violence Services Fund

77 grants totaling \$8.9 million for 2015-2017

Services include: shelter services, safety planning,

24-hour hotline, advocacy, information and referral

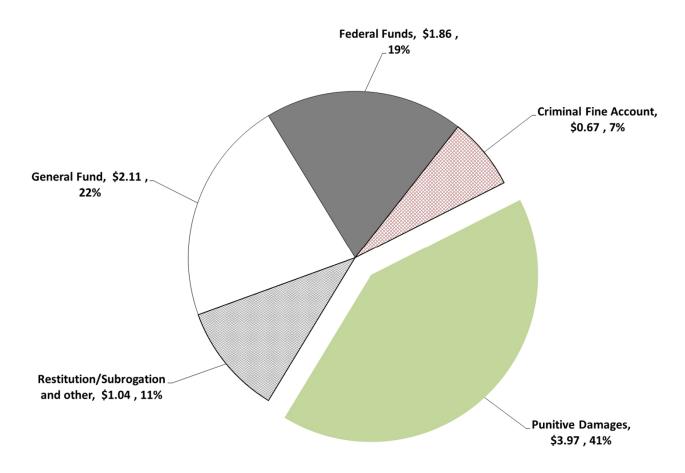

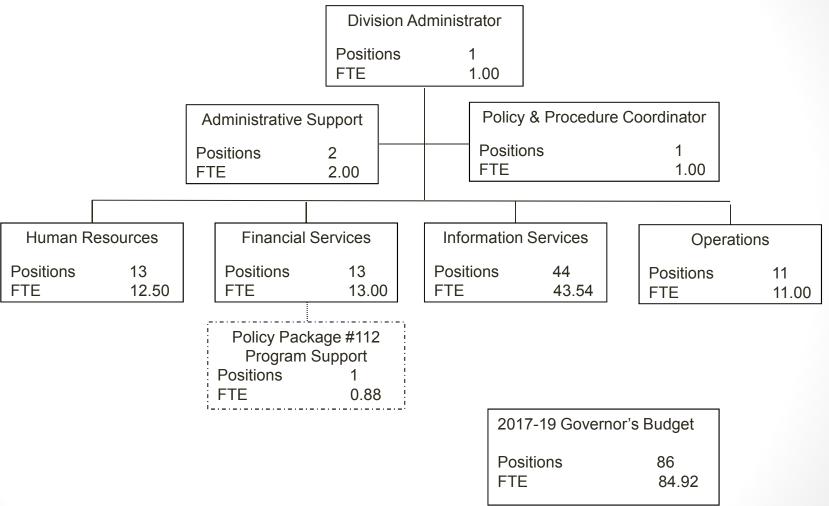
Primary Responsibilities

Provide business support functions:

- Human Resources Services, including Payroll
- Accounting
- Technology Delivery
- Facilities and Operations



Organization





Human Resources/Financial Services

- Automated multiple manual processes and redesigned crime victim payment process and moved online.
 - Reduced errors and processing time
 - Increased efficiency
 - Improved security and privacy of information
- Decentralized Human Resources Analysts, allowing inperson support in Portland, Eugene and Roseburg offices.



Information Services

- Created automated workflows for the recruitment and personnel processes, Crime Victims application/reimbursement process, DA Resource portal, and charitable activity reporting.
- Implemented Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) phones, replacing 20 year old legacy phone technology.
 - Also allows roving helpdesk technicians
- Replaced failing video conferencing system with new secure technology that integrates with our VoIP system.
- Scored a favorable security assessment from Secretary of State.



Information Services

- Package 101 Rebaselining IT Costs (\$2.7M limitation)
 - Not project related Addresses current technology budget shortfall.
 - Primarily Hardware/Software lifecycle.
 - Meet federal mandates
 - Reduce escalating support and maintenance costs
 - Reduces the likelihood of a data breach
 - Ensures performance of statewide legal and child support work.



Operations

• Consolidated multiple divisions from four locations into two facilities in Salem and Bend, and consolidated another division into an existing DOJ facility in Salem.

Partnered with landlords

- Upgraded building lighting
- Created sustainable and efficient working environments
- Added water bottle filling stations and composting stations to reduce waste
- Returned four vehicles to DAS Fleet.



Major Budget Drivers

- DOJ Program needs and priorities, based on both client needs and state/federal regulations.
- Rapid rate of technology change and constantly morphing information security requirements.
- Regulatory requirements Leave Laws, Affordable Care
 Act, Internal Revenue Service, Criminal Justice Information
 System (CJIS), Health Insurance Portability and
 Accountability Act (HIPPA), and Payment Card Industry
 (PCI).



Major Changes

- Increased support requirements resulting from the Child Support System Project.
- Transitioning mobile DOJ workforce.
- Upgrading Department's websites.
- Increased complexity and number of regulatory issues due to cyber security threats.
- Modernizing our legal practice software.
 - Case Management, Document Management, Billing, Time
 Capture



Program Efficiencies

- Automated and streamlined the production of several dozen Child Support online forms.
- Implemented new security technology and process improvement where possible.
- Implemented analysis process for all technologies at point of maintenance renewal or life cycle replacement point.
- Partnered with another agency to re-utilize systems furniture.
- **Developed new processes** that centralized work orders, allowing time for refined attention with a faster response time.
- Continue to improve automated HR systems.
