Please stop the assault on Oregon's rural lands. While rural areas have had slow economic recovery, subdivisions are not the answer. They are a band-aid that obscures, but does not solve the real problems that plague rural economies - that the federal farm bill does very little for farming families, and instead serves processors like Monsanto and Tyson.

More subdivisions destroy the value of cities and towns - places where expensive infrastructure is concentrated in order to provide farms and working forests with labor, markets, and education and training hubs. Oregon has been a pioneer in smart growth and preservation of critical natural resources when other states have sprawled until their rivers run dry (<a href="http://www.smithsonianmag.com/science-nature/the-colorado-river-runs-dry-61427169/">http://www.smithsonianmag.com/science-nature/the-colorado-river-runs-dry-61427169/</a>). While other states have sprawled in ways that made public transit expensive and impractical, raising the cost of living for their residents (<a href="https://www.perc.org/articles/how-can-cities-reverse-urban-sprawl-increase-transit-use-reduce-emissions">https://www.perc.org/articles/how-can-cities-reverse-urban-sprawl-increase-transit-use-reduce-emissions</a>).
