Opposition to HB 2937 and HB 2938

We are rural Yamhill County property owners.

And have witnessed the effects of the increase in rural dwellings.

Within the last 10 years or so, and during this time that we supposedly have protections/restrictions in place to protect our rural areas,

we have seen many houses and other rental units (cottages, RVs, "apartments") and built in areas we thought were protected from such development.

Presently there seem to be many loopholes that have allowed additional residences, and temporary rentals.

Ultimately, in some cases, this indirectly leads to the parceling of our land and makes it more difficult and expensive to farm.

Farm equipment movement and dealing with multiple property owners is costly both in time and money. Availability of land from year to year makes agricultural planning difficult.
