WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Establishes Deaf, Deaf-Blind, and Hard of Hearing Fund, separate from General Fund, and continuously appropriates money in fund to Department of Human Services for use administering programs for deaf, deaf-blind, or hard of hearing individuals. Directs Public Utility Commission (PUC) to transfer certain percentage of surcharges collected in Residential Service Protection Fund to Deaf, Deaf-Blind, and Hard of Hearing Fund. Sunsets January 2, 2020. Takes effect 91st day following adjournment sine die.

BACKGROUND:

Oregon law establishes the Oregon Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Program in the Department of Human Services (DHS). The program is funded through DHS' General Fund appropriation. The Residential Service Protection Fund, established in 1987, is a separate fund in the state treasury that collects money from surcharges placed on telecommunication subscribers by the Public Utility Commission. The Residential Service Protection Fund includes an Account for Low Income Customers and an Account for the Deaf.

Senate Bill 1023 creates a separate Deaf, Deaf-Blind, and Hard of Hearing Fund for DHS to use in administering programs for deaf, deaf-blind, or hard-of-hearing people. The measure also directs the Public Utility Commission to transfer a certain percentage of money from the Residential Service Protection Fund to the Deaf, Deaf-Blind, and Hard of Hearing Fund.
